
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Ratby Chemist - Under New Management





Ratby clinched the coveted award with its prospectus which outlined, in detail, the blueprint which the band drew up in the early 1970s to nurture young players.

But more than the band's on-going dedication to the cause of young musicians was its underlying motivation for championing the young which most impressed the judges.

"We hope that the musical experience given to the children by the tuition, and by the corporate life of the band, will enrich their future lives," read Ratby's prospectus

Ratby's determined bid to cultivate novices, which began with the formation of the Ratby Junior Band in 1973, has, undoubtedly paid dividends.

For of the 34 members who make up the senior band an impressive 22 were taught from their early years with The Ratby Band.

Said secretary Lynne Plant: "although it is very difficult to be exact about the numbers of youngsters who have progressed through the Senior Band in the past 17 years, it certainly exceeds 60".

Even before the formation of the Junior Band, the Senior Band donated instruments to the local Junior School to facilitate the formation of a school bands which, in turn, spawned the Junior Band.

At this time there were ability classes from which young players graduated to the Junior Band but, in 1986, Ratby formed a special Training Band to cope with the spiralling interest in brass banding by novices.

A grading system now exists which tests ability, sight reading and basic theory.

But despite Ratby's obvious credentials for the Award other entrants more than worthy of a mention were: Tredegar Town, St Austell, Kilmarnock Concert Brass, Southend and Wantage Silver.

LOCAL PLAN

North Eastern Parishes Local Plan

The Inspector's report following the Local Plan Inquiry has now been ratified by the Borough Council.

The main conclusions which affect Ratby are summarised below.

Land between Markfield Road and Stamford Street

Cawrey Ltd. were represented as an objector to the Local Plan at the Inquiry.

Ratby Parish Council were in support of the Local Plan. The final decision is that this land should remain as open countryside.

Land South East of Ferndale Drive, Ratby

Cawrey Ltd. and Ratby Parish Council proposed that 0.6 acres of land adjoing the S.E. side of proposed housing site NE/RES2 (f) should be added to extend the site for development. This was agreed. The Inspector said "I concur with the Council's view that a small amendment to the proposed housing area is justified in order to establish a logical settlement boundary along the disused railway line".

Land between the village and the Motorway

The Council agreed that "the retention of open countryside between Ratby and Groby in the form of a green wedge was endorsed by the Secretary of State when approving structure plan policies L/ST7 and L/ST8. Any built development would undermine the physical separation of the settlements. Substantial planting has been recommended along the whole northern edge of the Church Farm Estate to reduce motorway noise levels and its visual impact".

The highway authority stated that development of either area north and south of Groby road would "have adverse traffic implications for the inadequate road network in the village."

The conclusion is "that there is no strategic need for additional housing land at Ratby in this local plan". The Inspector also said "Allowing housing to advance to either side of the existing motorway would severly diminish the minimal gap between Ratby and Groby and compromise the function of the green wedge to preserve the physical identity of the two settlements".

Land West of Ratby

Messrs J.E. and W. Ball objected to the local plan. They maintained that a road structure should be constructed along the western boundary of the village from Markfield Road to Desford Road, to enable further development to take place.

Ratby Parish Council supported the Local Plan and wrote written counter-objections.

The Case for the Council - "The objector's farm of 136 acres makes a significant contribution to the setting of Ratby. Further housing is unjustified, and in this area would be an unwanted intrusion into open countryside. The County Ecologist considers that a massive expansion of Ratby in this area would have serious implications for ecological and archaelogical interests. The highway authority consider that a link road as proposed would have a minimal effect on diverting existing traffic away from the village centre..... On the other hand the traffic generated by substantial development would add to flows in Ratby and neighbouring villages. Offsetting benefits have not been clearly demonstrated".

The Inspector stated "What the objectors appear to have in mind is the construction of a local distributor road for housing. I consider there is no strategic need for additional housing land to be allocated in the village for the plan period and I find no other compelling reason for the construction of the suggested road."

Green Wedge between Groby and Ratby

J.S. Bloor objected to the local plan, stating that 19 acres of land between Groby Road/Ratby Road and Sacheverell Way should be excluded from the green wedge proposal because of the unnecessary constraint this would place upon its potential for housing.

Both Ratby and Groby Parish Councils and Councillor Mrs Pat Butler supported the local plan.

The Inspector concluded that the land is a significant part of the open area needed to maintain the separate identity of the two settlements.

Land West of Station Road, Ratby - Green Buffer between Ratby and Kirby Muxloe

LATE NIGHT "RED NOSE" EXTRA

Ratby Parish Council and Ratby Village Society, and three individuals counter-objected.

The Inspector stated that the main issue was the impact of development on the approach to Ratby and on the green buffer.

He said "the removal of existing vacant and derelict buildings and on-site landscaping would be beneficial, and that the 0.56 hectare addition to built up area most of which would be landscaped car-parking would result in an insignificant extension of urban development beyond the existing outbuildings".

The Inspector therefore recommended that the local plan be modified to "define a site for a proposed place of worship or similar community facility".

We have printed this summary so that Ratby people are kept informed of decisions affecting the village. We suggest that you keep this information for future reference!



Leicestershire Structure Plan

The Draft Written Statement is now available in Ratby Library for reference.

The enclosed map clearly shows green wedges between Ratby, Groby and Glenfield. This is also reinforced in the statement. Green wedges will be protected and improved.

BUT there is no mention of a green wedge between Ratby and Kirby Muxloe. Kirby Muxloe falls within a Transport Corridor and such areas will be considered for substantial development.

Could this mean that the Rothley Valley and its washland are threatened with develop-

A considerable amount of the countryside to the North West of Ratby is designated as an area of particularly attractive countryside.

Major development is not intended to take place in areas that are attractive, green wedges, or sites of ecological or archaelogical interest. This must surely include the Burroughs Woods and Ratby Iron Age fort.

It is important that people read this report and send in comments.

The Council wants to make sure you have an opportunity to comment on the Draft Replacement Structure Plan. The Plan seeks to best meet the needs of the people who live, work or conduct business in Leicestershire. If you have any comments on the proposals as they stand, or feel important points have been missed out we would welcome your views now.

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

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Western Bypass

When I became your County Councillor in 1977 I quickly realised I must specialise in highways because of the major problems of Ratby and Groby. My first significant success was the construction of New Parks Boulevard, which gave H.G.V.'s from the Scudamore Road Industrial Estate access to the A50, without pounding through Ratby's very narrow Main Street. Unfortunately rapidly increasing traffic flows have almost outweighed the very considerable benefits.

With your other elected representatives from Parish and Borough Councils, I have opposed the Western Bypass, as have the other villages on the route. This was not from a King Canute like attitude of trying to hold back the tide, but from the certain knowledge that any new link into the motorway network would bring pressures for development which, even if refused at local level, would with the Western Bypass be more likely to succeed on Appeal.

Traffic flows are continuing to increase and many people travelling from the large new residential areas of Markfield and Groby prefer to come through Ratby (difficult though this is), than on the heavily over-trafficked A50. Groby villagers find it difficult to get on to the A50 from the slip road!

I have just received a copy of the D of T's projected traffic flows as they will affect Ratby in 1994 (when the W.B.P. is programmed to open). They predict substantial reductions on:-

- 1) Markfield Lane 36%
- 2) Main Street 37.2%
- 3) Station Road 29.9%
-) Groby Road 6.2%

There will be an increased on Desford Lane of +21.6%. Had it not been for this increase the other figures would have been proportionally better. there will be a very large increase in traffic on the A50 in Groby which is a matter of considerable concern for me. The new Public Inquiry on the W.B.P opens on 17th March, it will be largely devoted to the new junction at Kirby Muxloe.

Structure Plan

Under the original 1973 Structure Plan

ever expanding City and our historic village as well as between Groby, Ratby, Glenfield and Kirby Muxloe.

I have been on the Working Party for the Role Forward of the Structure Plan, which will take us up to the year 2006, and have emphasised the importance of our green wedges and even tried to get one new one!

The name of the game this times appears to be 'transport choice'.

There will be increased emphasis on Public Transport. On our side of the county the proposed re-opening of the Ivanhoe Line (the old Leicester - Ashby - Burton-on-Trent Line), would remove some traffic from the A50 and the proposed 'Parkway' station at Desford (leave your car and catch a commutor train) could be a great attraction in our area.

I have met the Minister of Transport, Roger Freeman, on several occasions recently he is enthusiastic about what we are trying to achieve with the Ivanhoe Line, which leads me to be optimistic that we shall receive the support we need nationally.

The Structure Plan is now out for consultation and you can see a copy at the Library. It should be studied in conjunction with the recently adopted Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Councils, North Eastern Parishes Local Plan (Groby, Ratby and Desford) which is also available at the Libray. Your views will be welcomed at County Hall.

Throughout the week we are targetting 'youth' and to this end we will be having a large input into all local schools on the subject of crime prevention. Both Brookvale and Groby Community College will be forming Junior Crime Prevention Panels to look at crime problems in the area and to come up with suggestions to prevent these problems. Also all pupils will be undertaking work on 'Home Security' and hopefully their new knowledge will be passed on to their parents

Junior school pupils are not being forgotten in all this and PC John Alexander will be visiting the school during the week and talking to them about crime prevention and personal safety.

We are organising two major displays at the Beaumont Leys shopping centre during the week. The first is on Monday 15th April and is based on Autocrime. At this display we will have on show a 'Crime Free' car a large "

vehicle alarm display, a motorcycle security display, free security window etching and a display of vehicle security leaflets along with a promotion for Vehicle watch.

The second display is on Friday 19th April and covers both Personal safety and Home Security. Local schools will be putting on dramatic productions around themes of personal safety, and there will also be a local school steel band and a magician to keep you entertained. Also on show will be home security equipment and an alarm display We will also be offering a free security

postcoding service for valuable items brought to the centre.

Also of interest to residents of Ratby will be the 'Crime Free' house, based on a showhouse at the David Wilson site at Leicester Forest East. The house has been set up so that all the physical security features of good home security can be seen in situ and in action.

We have also organised a Crime Prevention 'Roadshow' which will be visiting all the villages in our area throughout the week with a display of home security items, personal safety and vehicle security advice and also a large display of Crime Prevention leaflets. John Alexander will also be on the stand for any advice specific to Ratby. We will also be offering a free ultra violet postcoding service for items brought to the display.

The 'Roadshow' will visit Ratby on Wednesday 17th April between 10.00 a.m. and 12.00 noon and will be sited outside the village hall.

What is Playdough?

Playdough is a toy which children play with, a bit like plasticine but softer. Is that all it is? What do children get out of it? Why is the Playdough table at Playgroup the most popular and busiest during the morning?

Playdough is a soft, squidgy, mouldable toy. It can be made into anything a child wishes. It can be cakes, biscuits or sausages for a picnic. It can be slithery snakes, wiggly worms or slimey snails. It can be rolled, squashed, squeezed and punched.

What better way for a child to explore its imagination or release its frustrations? Perhaps we adults could do with a pound (or should I say half a kilogram) of Playdough to pummel in times of stress. We can learn a lot from watching children at play.

We have been asked at Playgroup for the recipe to make Playdough, as it works out a lot cheaper than buying the brand named types from shops, so here it is. Ingredients remain the same whether for child or adult.

2 cups plain flour

- 1 cup salt
- 4 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 2 cups water
- Food colouring (optional)

Mix all dry ingredients together in saucepan Add liquids and food colouring if required. Cook slowly, stirring continuously until the dough forms a ball. When cool enough, take dough out of the pan and knead for a couple of minutes. Put pan in soak immediately.

If kept in a polythene bag or sealed container, this Playdough will keep for a couple of months. Have fun!

PRESS RELEASE

LEICESTERSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL SETS BUDGET FOR 1991/92.

Leicestershire County Council has established its spending budget for 1991/92.

At a precept of £539,739,710, it matches the Standard Spending Assessment (S.S.A.), a figure Central Government considers would provide a standard level of service for residents of the country.

This means that Leicestershire County Council will be be charge capped.

The budget was fixed at a full Council meeting and incorporates elements of growth and savings.

The largest area of growth in the benefit budget has been allocated for communi implementing the Children's Act. 18 scheme.

The greatest saving has been made by reducing the subsidy of school meals. This will mean an increase of 10p on the price of a meal, bringing the cost up to 90p.

Central Government has stated that, if the S.S.A. figure was adhered to, the Community Charge payment would stand at £380.67 per head for residents Leicestershire. The Council has matched this figure but it does not take into account adjustments that districts need to make for their spending plans or for collection of the community charge. So the amount paid per head will vary from district to district. Individual community charge payers may also be able benefit from the Government's community charge reduction

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Editorial

The centre page of this issue is devoted to an advertisement placed by a Groby architect on behalf of a group of local business people and land owners. This is not an official plan. It is a proposal that these individuals wish to put before the people of Ratby for their consideration.

It is the intention of this group of local business people and land owners to put forward these proposals at the public enquiry concerning the A46 - Leicester Western Bypass. It is also understood that the Kirby Muxloe objectors to the road scheme, look on these proposals favourably. Benefits, in terms of traffic flow arise for Kirby Muxloe out of these proposals. Large scale developments in Ratby could mean that traffic which now uses Desford Lane through Kirby Muxloe could travel along the new proposed road at Ratby.

Where do we stand?

This magazine is produced by Ratby Scouts and you will notice that in the scheme a new building is allocated to us. This is not a matter on which we have been consulted or indeed have asked for from the proposed developers. Nor is it a matter that will make us biased in favour of the proposal. It has been our practice, and continues to be so, to put before the people of Ratby the facts as we know them and invite you to make your views known through this magazine and parish council.

In forming an opinion about this plan we believe it is important that you also read the Leicestershire Structure Plan and consider the opinion of two villagers.

Two pointsof view?

One villager might argue that this proposed major development of the village will bring benefits. These might include employment, a greater selection of shops and improved local facilities, such as a new village hall. All of the planned new roads (which almost forms a ring road) might help the traffic problems, especially if they cater for the increased amount of car traffic that would stem from the new housing development and the heavy vehicles from the proposed new industrial estate. Getting industry out of the village might justify building on the green field sites.

New car parks and a pedestrianised village centre form a part of the proposal perhaps on the manner of a mini Beaumont Leys? More facilities in Ratby might reduce the need to go to Leicester or to surrounding larger villages. The proposed bandstand would reflect the success of the village band and could provide a venue for free band concerts.

Another villager might argue that after looking at the proposals then why should Ratby be singled out for such large scale development? Do we really want to grow to the size of Groby and Markfield. Do we want to lose our village identity? We have friendly local shops and pubs, a thriving primary school to which all village children go, helping to create a sense of belonging and a community spirit.

Why do these proposals go way beyond the Leicestershire County Council Structure Plan for Ratby which does not identify the need for major growth in the village. Indeed the Leicestershire Structure Plan identifies inner Leicester and areas of mining in NW Leicestershire as priority areas for future development it makes more sense to site industrial development in former mining areas and where unemployment may be high. Large scale developments may bring with them a rise in crime, which in their turn Beaumont Leys and Glenfield have been prey to. Shouldn't any growth/development be at a pace that preserves the best features of the village as suggested in the Ratby plan. Ratby is already subject to development through the Hall of Worship at one end of the village. to the hotel/golf course/time share units at the other, with Cawreys continuing development in the middle.



The following advertisement has been placed in "WOT" by a Groby Architect on behalf of a number of Ratby business people and land owners to inform the people of Ratby of their proposed development plans.

A New Plan for Ratby

Nearly every issue of your magazine has included adverse comments on the amount of traffic that churns through the village streets, and you have asked for suggestions to solve this chaos.

I put to the village this plan for discussion before submitting it to the Borough and County Councils as a constructive objection to the Leicestershire Structure Plan.

The aims of the plan are to remove all the through traffic out of the narrow and congested streets of Ratby and Kirby Muxloe and to provide breathing space for the existing industries as well as encourage new ones into the area; to have planned growth and a revitalised village centre whilst reorganising the green wedges around the village.

The Highways

The Plan provides for almost a complete ring road which will remove all cross flow traffic and the present industrial traffic out of the village. This allows Main Street to be pedestrianised, provides a village square with community facilities, traffic free shopping, safe school access and easy off street parking, returning the village streets to the people of Rathy

With a new link to the A46 Leicester Western Bypass Ratby will enjoy a quick access to the national road network.

Employment

Some of the present village employers are looking to relocate in larger modern premises. The 40 acres of new employment land with access only from the new road network will provide more secure jobs for the community and retain the traditional Ratby firms. The plan allows for non-conforming industries, for example Casepak Limited, to relocate returning their current sites to housing.

Housing

80 additional acres of housing is planned. This provides for a wide range of properties giving a greater choice, and improving the value of the existing housing stock.

Schools

Additional school places will be required. It is proposed to provide a new area, adjacent to the existing school, to include for safe access for all children together with ample access and parking for parents.

Flooding

The plans allow for water control to eliminate the regular flooding of Kirby Lane, as well as removing the pollution of Ratby Brook. Fishing and amenity lakes will be formed in the landscaped wedges between the employment and residential areas.

Village Amenities

In the heart of the village a new village square is planned with a bandstand as the centre-piece, flanked by a new Village Hall, a pedestrian shopping area and ample free car parking for schools and shops. A

larger population will encourage a wider range of services and retail shops to come into the village.

The flourishing Scout Group will have a new building in the water amenity area.

The present Ratby/Kirby/Glenfield Green Wedge, all but for the roads, will be protected from future development, and will be retained as at present.

Who Pays

Unfortunately most villages grow in a haphazard way, mainly at the mercy of the developer who returns little of his gains to the community. By accepting this long term Plan for Ratby all of the plan can be achieved. The major land owners accept that infrastructure costs must include community and planning gain. A substantial trust fund of some half a million pounds is proposed so that the village can maintain all the community facilities. This trust, managed by the Parish, could be used to assist all sections of the village including the churches, health centre, schools, youth and retirement activities.

I believe that this plan has a lot of merit and should be considered before the hungry developers arrive as surely they will.
