George Eliot, (Mary Anne Evans) lived at South Farm on the Arbury Hall Estate. Her father, Robert Evans, was the Estate Manager for the 7000 acres of land.

The Hall was built in the 1670's by Sir Richard Newdigate, using some designs by Christopher Wren.

When Newdigate died childless in 1806, the estate passed to his cousin Francis Parker of Kirk Hallam, Derbyshire. Robert Evans, his agent, came with him. Mary Anne was born in 1819.

Early memories of the countryside around Arbury Hall are recorded in her novels. Mary Anne often sat with

Well done and thanks to Ratby Parish Council and the Village Society for planting them.







Footpaths R40 and R51 across the A46 Leicester Western Bypass

Local Parish Councils and M.P.'s David Tredinnick and Andrew Robathan are disappointed by the news that the Department of Transport do not intend to provide footbridges on these routes. The Minister of Transport had concluded that the expenditure could not be justified. The sketch plan opposite shows their proposed 'circular route'.

Andrew Robathan has suggested that local representatives should visit the minister. Further details awaited!

Traffic Calming

The Parish Council has written to Leicestershire County Council to support resident's requests for traffic calming on Tyler Road.

The reply has confirmed earlier responses to the Parish Council from Cawrey Ltd. The design of the road with a T-junction is intended to slow traffic. Other measures to reduce speed would be prohibitively expensive.

The Parish Council has also written in support of traffic calming measures outside Brookvale High School and Groby College, where accidents have recently occurred.





Air Pollution

Millions of tons of harmful gases and particles are released into the air each year, and some of it reaches our lungs. One in every five people is particularly at risk:-very young children, the elderly, people suffering from asthma, bronchitis and emphysema, and those with heart disease.

What causes the pollution?

<u>Smoke</u> particles from traffic and coal-burning power stations carry cancer - causing chemicals.

<u>Nitrogen dioxide</u> is produced when fuel is burnt in cars and power stations. It irritates the lining of our lungs. Diesel vehicles produce more smoke.

Ozone is caused when traffic pollutants combine in bright sunshine. Ozone stings eyes, nose and throat, and can cause headaches. It irritates the lungs and causes chest pain and coughing.

Carbon monoxide is a poisonous gas from exhaust fumes. It affects the ability of blood to carry oxygen in the body, a risk for those with heart disease. It may also retards the growth and development of unborn children. Cigarette smoke is a source of carbon monoxide.

<u>Lead</u> from petrol accounts for 80% of levels in the air. It threatens the development of children.

Acid air occurs when Sulphur Dioxide and Nitrogen Dioxide are changed into acids. It can be breathed into the lungs, causing coughing and wheezing.

What can we do about it?

- Leave your car at home whenever possible! Use unleaded petrol for those essential journeys, and fit a catalytic converter.
- * Use public transport when you can. Another good reason to fight for better bus services.
 - Buy a bike or walk those short



This year the group will follow the Gold Rush trail of 1849 from Los Angeles to Alaska, travelling in a variety of ways, flying, busing and walking between camp sites, with help from the Army. The journey will last 27 days, from 5th July to August 2nd. In August there are just 20 minutes of darkness in Alaska so let's hope they won't be too tired!

The expedition is being organised by the 'Jolt' (Journey of a Lifetime Trust). The charity was set up to give disabled or disadvantaged youngsters a challenging adventure. The Trust's patron is the well known explored Sir Ranulph Fiennes. Previous expeditions have included journeys through the Australian Outback, South America and along the Silk Road to Islamabad.

Andrew's school and Ratby Scout Group sent CV's listing Andrew's achievements. 60 students from the original 200 were interviewed at Harrow School. On the day of the interview, Andrew, and his father Paul Clarke were amazed at the sight of top-hatted Harrow School boys walking 4 deep for a mile from the School!

A panel of 6 people from all walks of life, including a T.V. celebrity interviewed the students. Andrew was one of the final 23 chosen for the adventure.

He has to raise £500 in sponsorship for the trip, and has already made a good start.

Sarah Mellor, of 13 Nicholas Drive is heading for Rumania with two fellow university students this summer. They plan to spend their holiday working in the Children's Home featured in Anneka Rice's T.V. Challenge.

Sarah is nearing the end of her second year of a BSc Nursing Course in Birmingham, and has just four weeks holiday for the trip. She will live with a Romanian family, experiencing their food shortages and daily ration of 2 hours water supply! The orphanage is close to the Ukrainian border, 80 miles from Chernobyl and is home to 500 children and young people between the ages of 3 and 26. Some of the young people, who are physically or mentally handicapped live in, others are brought in daily for education and physiotherapy.


Sarah will be working on the 4th floor of the building, and will need to be physically fit for the regular trips down to the playrooms on the ground floor.

Her caring skills will be invaluable in this work with children who previous lack stimulation has impaired their development. Most os us will remember the film footage from the television programme showing children rocking or lying in bare cots.

In some areas May 1st was known as Garland Day. Garlands were made from spring flowers tied to a stick with ribbons hanging down. Some had dolls tied into them.



May Day was a time for Maypole dancing. The May Queen was crowned, and in some places "Jack in the Green", represented Summer.

We have already written about May 29th, Oak Apple Day. In Aston on Clun in Shropshire this day was also known as Arbor Tree Day. A tree in the centre of the village was decorated with flag which stayed in place for the whole year. Tradition says that the Lord of the Manor got married on May 29th, and the villagers decorated the tree to celebrate. The bride gave the villagers money to continue the tradition.

Spring was traditionally the time for well-dressing in Derbyshire.

Villagers press wet clay onto the specially shaped boards, which have usually been soaked thoroughly in the village pond! Then flower

you have never seen a well-dressing, why not go and see this year?

Several villages dress their wells in May - Tissington, Ashford in the Water, and Wirksworth, for example. Others dress their wells in June, Youlgreave, Rowsley and Bakewell.

Well dressing is now a popular tourist attraction. Leaflets with dates of dressings and demonstrations can be found in Leicester Information Centres and libraries.



Easter Activities

Easter activities were organised for the village children at the Church Rooms.

The theme this year was the gospel story, told by the woodland folk of Captain Beaky and his band.

Spring Customs

April the First is of course 'April Fools Day'. Don't forget that you must play your tricks before midday - after that the joke is on you!

"April Fool's past and gone, You're the fool and I am none."

In France it is called "un poisson d'Avril", and in Scotland a 'gowk' (cuckoo).

The origin of the tradition is unclear.

On April 6th there used to be candle auctions. A candle was lit, and a pin stuck in about $2\frac{1}{2}$ cm from the top. People would start bidding for a piece of Church land to be let to poor people for the year. Whoever was bidding when the pin dropped became the owner of the land. A fund raising idea here?



There are many traditions associated with Easter. Good Friday is the day to eat Hot Cross buns. Buns baked on Good Friday were thought to last a year before going mouldy. Some people believed that hardened old hot cross buns could protect a house from fire! We don't recommend it! Sailors were supposedly saved from shipwreck by taking one to sea!

Good Friday was traditionally a good day to plant potatoes, because the Devil was supposed to have no power over the Earth on that day.


Eggs are associated with Easter for two main reasons.

On Shrove Tuesday, all eggs were used up for pancake making before Lent, when no eggs would be eaten.

Decorating Eggs

You can colour eggs in a variety of different ways. Try adding food colours to the water they are boiled in.


Or cover your egg with onion skins fastened with string or elastic bands in a criss-cross pattern. Then boil them. This produces a marbled pattern in natural brown shades.


