Thankyou to all the Parents for coming along and supporting us on the night.


The evening raised just over £40.00 which we spent on the Christmas Party. Our special thanks to Santa Claus who made a surprise visit at the party.

4oz sugar (113 grams)	2 eggs - separated
loz flour (25 grams)	1 lemon
1/2oz butter (12 grams)	1/3 print milk

Butter to grease a generous pint dish

Method

1.

- Heat oven No4 (350F) (160C)
- 2. Rub butter into flour
- Add sugar, lemon rind, juice & egg yolks Beat with wooden spoon until smooth
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- 4. Gradually beat in the milk
- 5. Fold stiffly whisked egg whites using metal spoon
- Pour into prepared dish and place in middle of oven.

Reduce heat if browning too much.

Bake for 35-45mins.

I read with much interest 'Hoz's' article in February's Wot! entitled 'Ratby's Crowning Glory'

I would suggest that the dedication to St Phillip & St James has always existed and that Ratby Church never was named in honour of St. George.

The large manor of Groby once incorporated several other villages, including Ratby, Glenfield, Anstey, Bradgate the Newtowns (Linford and Unthank) Cropston, Swithland, Stanton under Bardon and parts of Desford, Markfield and Rothley.

In 1338 King Edward III granted to Henry Lord Ferrers and his heirs the right to hold at Groby a weekly Friday market and an annual fair on St Georges Day (23rd Apirl). Both market and fair are long gone.

St Phillip and St James day 1st May, a date still celebrated by a fair or 'wake' in Ratby -though nearer 12th May since the 11 days adjustment of the calendar in 1752, when English dates were brought into line with Europe.

John Nichols' history of Leicestershire refers to Ratby Church as St Georges but in my opinion, Nichols researchers confused the regular fair at Groby with the Saints "wake" at Ratby in the same parish.

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Dear Editor

Ratby Parish Council would like to clarify its position concerning the proposed pedestrian crossing near to the Primary School.

We have for many years stressed the importance of improved safety measures at that location and fully support the proposed crossing. A strip of land in front of the Library Car Park was sold for a nominal figure to enable LCC to widen the footpath but this work has not yet been carried out.

The quoted cost of the crossing is £7000 but installation is unlikely before 1998/1999. The suggestion that the work might be brought forward if the Parish Council provide all or part of the cost is incorrect. The full cost would have to met by us.

The Parish Council precepts for 1995/6 and 1996/7 had already been finalised and do not include the crossing cost.

Improvements and maintenance of Highways is the responsibility of the County Council, who include the costs in their annual precept for Council Tax.

As the responsibility is not that of the Parish Council we feel it is inappropriate to levy an additional Charge to Ratby Council Taxpayers to meet such costs, and in any event we would be unable to do so until 1997/98. Such an additional levy could will be considered as paying twice for the work (to County and Parish Councils) which amounts to approximately £2.50 per taxpayer (£5.00 per household).

A notice of the intended installation has been put on display at the site by LCC and we hope that they may be able to carry out the work earlier than anticipated, although it is recognised that priority is given to the locations at highest risk. On assessing the requirement for our crossing, LCC found we were slightly below the minimum criteria but were able to recommend and authorise its inclusion on their work list.

A gate to the entrance of the car park has now been installed. Agreement has been reached to replace the "Sputnik" which was removed due to its poor condition. The new Sputnik should be available for the summer and will be in the "Infants" section which is due to be enclosed with a dog-proof fence and self shutting gate. Will parents please supervise children entering and leaving this area to avoid accidents.

Presentation to retiring Clerk

A pair of Wedgwood Spode plates was presented to Mrs Linda Laywood at the February meeting in recognition of the six years excellent service to the Council. A floral bouquet was also given to Linda.

Dog Fouling

Complaints from residents are still being received concerning the increasing incidence of dog fouling of footpaths and narrow grassed verges. This thoroughly objectionable practice is unsightly and frequently results in children treading the mess into their homes. It is an offence to permit dog mess to be left unremoved by their owners, whether the dog is accompanied by its owner or not. Anyone who sees such an offence taking place should telephone the Environmental Health Officer at Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council who will initiate proceedings to bring the owner before the Courts.

Borough Council's Council Tax increase

Councillor Robin Bennett was questioned about the exorbitant increase in the Borough's Council Tax charge for 1996/1997. His explanation that this was due to "inflation" and the reduction in the Government grant" was not accepted and he was requested to object strongly at the Borough Council's meeting on Thursday 7th March when

voting was due to take place. The **Borough** Council charge has been increased from $\pounds 4.92$ (1995/1996 charge) to $\pounds 32.04$ (1996/1967) an increase of $\pounds 27.12$ (651%) to be paid by every householder in the Borough. This is the first Council Tax levied by the new Council elected in May.

Wildlife Survey

The Parish Council support the forthcoming survey and although the Parish Council will not be involved, several Councillors have indicated their intention to participate as individuals.

Youth Activities

The Parish Council are holding a second meeting with the Youth Officers, and interested parties including Youth Representatives on 26th March to discuss proposals for future activities.

Senior Citizens Bus Passes

Leicestershire County Council advise that a charge of $\pounds 2.50$ per pass is being introduced for the year commencing 1st April 1996.

Litter Picker

A vacancy exists for a Part Time Litter Picker in Ratby. The duties involve 2 hours per day for 5 days each week and the rate of pay is £3.45 per hour. This is an excellent opportunity to supplement SITA's regular team to keep the village free of litter. Interested persons should apply to the Clerk to the Parish Council, 8 Desford Lane, Ratby and their applications will be forwarded to SITA.




We retraced our steps, very tired and glad to get out in the fresh air. Next thing we all agreed was a bath and change.


Round the Next Bend (An Extract)



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



Brian Walters, the district Commissioner for Leicester West presented James with his badge at Scouts

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

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
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
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
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


In this months article we report that Ratby has suffered several Burglarys specifically at the Co-op, Frasers and at the Post Office. In January a total of 20 Crimes were reported.

To make matters worse Bingy wasn't coming at all and the whole thing had been a big joke. Happy days!



NIGERIAN FRAUD SCAM

Leicestershire County Council's Trading Standards Department is alerting the public to a scam know to be operating throughout the Country which could result in businesses losing significant sums of money from their bank accounts. The scheme involves a business proposition in the form of a letter inviting selected individuals to assist in transferring large amounts of money from the Central Bank of Nigeria into their UK bank accounts.

The money, five hundred thousand United State dollars, is claimed by the scam operators, to have resulted from an over-invoices contract paid fo about five years ago by a foreign contractor. The proposal, which is described in the letter as 'risk free', promises a 25% return after the transfer period of 30 days, to individuals who allow the money to be paid into their bank account. The operators claim to be Civil Servants and are therefore forbidden to open a foreign account themselves.

At the Band's well attended Annual General Meeting, Band secretary, Mrs Sheralyn Newman gave an excellent report on the Band's activities over the past year. A very busy, highly successful and most varied programme was fulfilled and Sheralyn thanked the many people who had helped to make it so.

The Band had held 94 full rehearsals, 5 section (full day) practices and no less than 26 major concerts - all well supported. RATBY SPEED REDUCTION SCHEME

Following consultations with the Parish Council and local residents, the above scheme was approved by the County Council, to reduce road casualties, and will be implemented starting on 18th March 1996 for a period of approximately 6 weeks.
