VILLAGE SOCIETY NOTES

At our June meeting members enjoyed a talk by Virginia Wright, a Blue Badge guide, entitled "In the footsteps of Susannah Watts". Slides showed the Leicester of two hundred years ago to illustrate the guide book which she wrote in 1804 (anonymously, because lady authors were not encouraged at that time). Susannah came from a comfortable background but the family's investment in the 'South Sea Bubble' and her father's subsequent death meant that their home (Dannet's Hall) was sold and they moved to a smaller house. She had to earn a living writing poems and doing translations. She was widely read and developed a social conscience, concerning herself about the poor and becoming involved in the abolition of the slave trade.

The slides, showing Leicester in Susannah's time, made one realise how much the city has lost since then. Early photographs of the Assembly Rooms, theatres, markets and streets were fascinating. The Roman milestone, which workmen found being used as a garden roller, proved that Leicester had been a Roman camp. The Jewry Wall would not have been seen as clearly as today. Buildings were clustered around it and Susannah wrote that it "would have to remain an interesting mystery" as its use was not fully appreciated then. An interesting old drawing of the Shambles (butchers' shops) was shown, with one house dated 1646. This area is now part of St. Nicholas Circle. The Victorians pulled down a lot of old houses and modern development has removed much more. St. Margaret's Church, built with money raised by putting a farthing on all hearths in Leicester, was nicknamed the 'Smoke Farthing'. A drawing of High Cross Street showed cobbled streets, narrow pavements, old buildings, the County Prison and the Free Grammar School. Susannah would have known Daniel Lambert, son of the Bridewell Keeper, and the old Guildhall. Little thoughts and asides crop up all through her book and she obviously did not think much of Richard 111, describing Bow Bridge as where "the monster Richard really passed".

Susannah Watts was buried in the churchyard

into old Leicester and provided an interesting talk and a lively discussion afterwards, much enjoyed by all.


RATBY HISTORY GROUP

Ratby's allotments are situated beside the churchyard, and in Taverner Drive, opposite the Community Orchard.



"OUTSTANDING" RESULTS IN SCIENCE AND FRENCH PRAISED BY INSPECTORS


Brookvale High School, in Groby, helps students "achieve well", whilst enjoying school, feeling safe, and making an "outstanding contribution to the community", OFSTED reported.

Brookvale was given a "good" rating overall, with "excellent progress" since its previous inspection, led by "the highly effective head teacher and senior leadership team".

Inspectors said: "Teaching is good and often outstanding, and the school makes very good use of its specialist language college status to enhance the curriculum."

Two areas for further development identified were to ensure all lessons challenge and engage students, and to ensure advice on how students can improve their work is consistent with best practice.

In the letter from the lead inspector to the students themselves, the students were told: "We were very impressed with how proud you are of your school."



RECIPE SPICY INGLE CHICKEN

Serves 6

Ingredients

12 skinless, boneless chicken thighs. 3 level tbsp medium curry powder 2 level tbsp paprika 1 level teaspoon ground cinnamon 10 garlic cloves, crushed. (optional) 6 tbsp olive oil

Method

- 1. Scissor the chicken into large bite sized pieces and place in an ovenproof dish.
- 2. Add the curry powder, paprika, cinnamon, garlic and olive oil, and stir well, making sure chicken is well covered. Cover and chill in fridge for 30 minutes or longer to marinate.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 200C/400F/GAS MARK 6.
- 4. Uncover the chicken and bake for 35 minutes.
- 5. Serve with savoury rice or couscous, and a vegetable of your choice.

It is great placed in a sturdy foil dish to cook outside on a gas barbecue.
