DO YOU THINK RATBY HAS TOO MUCH SPEEDING TRAFFIC?

RATBY PARISH COUNCIL

Do you think Ratby has a problem with speeding traffic? If you do, Ratby Parish Council needs your help.

The council has decided to apply to participate in a Community Speed Watch.

This campaign aims to encourage drivers to slow down in areas which do not qualify for a speed camera, but where motorists still speed. Does that sound familiar to you?

The parish council has three key areas in mind: Markfield Road. Dane Hill, and Station Road.

Which one gets chosen doesn't really matter just so long as the message gets out that Ratby doesn't welcome speeding drivers.

Community Speed Watch depends on local volunteers and if you feel strongly enough about speed we hope you'll step forward for training. We need 16 of you to volunteer to do that and one of you to volunteer to be the scheme co-ordinator. But don't worry it's only a short term contract of about 6 weeks! Hopefully, the scheme will operate in the autumn of 2009.

Being caught in the act by CSW doesn't just incur a gentle warning - although that is the first step. This scheme is supported by Leicestershire Police and if people do not reduce their speed, enforcement could follow.

We feel Ratby could benefit from the scheme and we need 200 residents to support our application so please sign up before the end of August 2009, in Ratby Post Office.

X1 Coalville to Leicester ARRIVA have now re-routed this service down the A50, despite the local campaign. Has this caused you problems? What are your views? Write in to Wot and let us know.


What is Walk National Forest?

RECYCLING IN RATBY

The article about recycling in our last issue prompted a letter from a villager, and some questions from other villagers. These queries are answered below by Charlotte Long, Assistant Waste Minimisation & Education Officer, Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council

1. Where does all the material for recycling actually go to?

During the last year, materials collected at the kerbside by the Borough Council for recycling were sent to the following destinations:


- Paper recycled by AbitibiBowater/ Bridgewater Paper in Ellesmere Port, Cheshire
- Glass recycled by Berryman/ Ardagh in Doncaster and Knottingly, Yorkshire
- Steel cans recycled by Corus, in Port Talbot
- Aluminium cans recycled by Novelis, in Warrington
- Organic waste (garden waste and cardboard) composted at Manor Farm, Aston Flamville, Leicestershire

All these are processed and recycled on site. Paper collected at the kerbside should be recycled and back on the shop shelves within 7 days! In addition to this materials were also sent to:

- Textiles recycled by Salvation Army Trading, in Wellingborough, Northants; Ragtex, in Leicester; and TRAID, in Wembley
- Plastic & Cardboard sent to Casepak in * Leicestershire

All of these materials are baled up on site and transferred elsewhere for processing dependant on the market values at the time.





2. Is it possible to put cardboard in the brown bins as well as in the bags?

Cardboard can still be put into the brown garden waste bins, but this may soon be phased out. Recycling cardboard in the clear bags is a much more sustainable way of dealing with our waste. When cardboard is sent for recycling it can be recycled over and over again. Composting means the cardboard has only a one time use.

3 Where does the garden waste go, and if it is composted will the process kill diseased plants and weeds such as dandelions?

Garden waste is taken to a local farm composting sites. The waste is tipped straight from the vehicle onto the site. There is no sorting process, which means it is important that only suitable materials are in the load. Here the waste is shredded and arranged into windrows (large Toblerone shaped heaps about 3m high and 10m long). The heaps are turned regularly to help oxygen to pass through; this speeds up the composting process. The heaps can get up to quite high temperatures (much higher than a domestic compost bin) to kill common garden weeds such as dandelions.

After 12 to16 weeks the compost is ready. It is then sieved to remove large particles (which are put through the process again) and used for land improvement on the same farm.

We ask that residents do not put Japanese knotweed or Giant hogweed into the brown bins as these are very strong weeds that will not be killed by the composting process. Also please avoid putting diseased plants into the garden waste bins as this could potentially spread disease amongst the farm crops. To help to keep the best quality compost possible please ensure only suitable materials are put in the brown bin. If in doubt, leave it out!

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News from Ratby Neighbourhood Watch.


The neighbourhood watch team will be holding their next meeting on Wednesday 28th October in the Church Rooms at 7.30pm.

Part of the group's remit is to ensure that as many residents in Ratby are aware of what crimes have been reported locally, what trends are appearing and how this information can be used to protect property, and make the village a safe place in which to live.

Currently co-ordinators in the group leaflet houses in the streets were they live giving this information. However this means that the some of the residents in Ratby are not leafleted! It is essential that the group have feedback from the residents in Ratby regarding the best locations to put this information on a weekly/monthly basis to ensure all within our community have access to it. The police make weekly reports to the group, but there may be other matters that go unreported, such as anti social behaviour, and issues that arise from road use. The group relies on its network of co-ordinators to bring this information to their attention. The

more co-ordinators the group has the more information it receives to circulate.

Please attend the meeting on the 28th : it is an opportunity to have your say and also an opportunity to find out more about getting involved.

Inaredients



This new online service has been set up by Leicestershire County Council Library Services and provides a wide range of information which can be accessed at home on the internet.

The subject topics vary from art to health and from family history to music - even newspapers and magazines - so there is plenty of information to interest all age groups.

Whatever information you seek, just pop into your local library or use our Online Reference Library in the comfort of your own home by visiting <u>www.leics.gov.uk/reference</u>.

There is normally a subscription fee upon registering for the Online Reference Library service, however Leicestershire libraries are providing the service absolutely free to members of the library service. All you need is your library card number.

If you are not already a member, you can join by downloading a form and taking it to your nearest library with proof of identification. Or you can register online by completing the form and a library card and a PIN will be sent to your home.

There are additional services available only in libraries themselves which include the Ancestry Library Edition, a great place to research into your family tree. Or if you're looking for value for money, our Which? Consumer Reports will help you to decide and compare prices.

For those musicians around, you can find your favourite artist or album by clicking onto the SearchMuze online resource program.




SCOUT COMPETITION
