

## **DISCOVERING BURY CAMP**

On Sunday July 18<sup>th</sup> a group of enthusiasts from Ratby and neighbouring villages set off down to Ratby Burroughs to explore the Iron Age Bury Camp and other fascinating historical sites. The event was arranged by Ratby History and Archaeology Society as part of the national Festival of Archaeology. The camp is on private farm land grazed by cattle and a bull, so special arrangements were made with the landowner.

Proceeds from the modest fee charged for the event were shared between the landowner and Ratby Church.

The group was led by History Group member Brian Lewis, who shared some interesting historical facts with us en route, and by Neil Glennister, Ratby's Local Heritage Warden. Current thinking is that the Bury camp was an Iron Age Hill Fort, with its earth work banks which would have been surmounted by wooden palisades. Neil showed us Iron Age pottery fragments that had been recently discovered in the area. The camp will probably have been an organised settlement, with houses, temples and granaries. Further evidence for this, in the form of iron age arrow heads, an axe head, a snaffle bit and chariot lynch pin, have been found in surrounding fields by Neil, and we were able to handle and examine these fascinating relics.

## **BURY CAMP** continued from page 1

The camp and surrounding settlements were inhabited by the Corialtauvi tribe, whose lands covered a large area of the East Midlands. (formerly thought to be named Coritani) Neil showed us Corialtauvi silver and gold coins he had found locally that were created from earlier Coinage minted in Macedonia. Images of Philip of Macedonia and Apollo had been replaced by images of horses and wheels and other symbols important to the tribe.

Dowsing within the site had suggested gates and doorways, and a road, and these findings have been confirmed by a recent survey. Currently it is not possible to excavate the Bury Camp, but we can speculate that it may have been of greater importance than we have previously thought.

The camp was later used by the Romans, and local names, such as Change Spinney, (change meaning 'crossing') and the presence of old footbridges, suggest that the site continued to be a focus for many routes, perhaps a centre for a large area of the county. There is evidence that the Burroughs Road was a major route a thousand years ago.

The group also explored some of the history of the Medieval Deer Park, and nearby Old Hays.

The Bury Camp was probably the original site of the hunting park known as Burgh or Burrough which was likely to have been created in the thirteenth century. It seems to have been later expanded to include land at Old Hays.

The eroding park pale, mound and ditch can still just be seen at the western edge of the woodland.

To the left of the 'crossroads' where Burrough's Road continues as a bridle way to Thornton can be seen the Sacheverell Field. Sir Henry Sacheverell, who lived at Old Hays farm died in 1620 and left £100 to support the poor in Ratby. The trustees bought this field, and proceeds from its rental are still distributed annually to the elderly of the village. Henry's tomb can be viewed in Ratby Church.


#### **BRADGATE LIONS CONCERT**





## Ratby Parish Council RATBY CONSERVATION AREA

Concern had been expressed at the Parish Plan Advisory committee meetings and shared by Parish Councillors that the Ratby Conservation Area was on the English Heritage "At Risk" list.

At the invitation of the Parish Council, residents and Parish Plan Committee members were joined by Mr Barry Whirrity (HBBC Conservation Officer) on a walk around the area. This took in Chapel Lane, Church Lane and parts of Main St. and Station Rd.

During the walk Mr Whirrity pointed out features that diminish the attributes of the conservation area, some of which pre-dated the creation of the Conservation Area in 1985. Most of the features are not covered by planning regulations because they may be replacements or repairs. The group discussed the situation at the end of the walk and it was agreed to encourage the status quo. In other words to maintain the state of the area so that the "At Risk" status can be held back, if not removed.


The Parish Council agreed with the proposal to provide a leaflet to distribute to all properties in the area. This would detail the features creating most concern together with advice from Mr Whirrity about appropriate action and possible funding availability.



## BRIBING STUDENTS TO CONTINUE EDUCATION?

The Education Maintenance allowance is a scheme aimed at encouraging students to continue into higher or further education. The student receives a weekly sum of £10-£30 depending on parental income, with £100 bonuses awarded bi-annually for good grades and behaviour.

From September 2010 the bonus will stop, and the Dept. for Education says that this will result in 80,000 additional college places for disadvantaged students becoming available. This has sparked widespread discussion in colleges as to whether the scheme was effective.

One student in receipt of EMA, stated that 'indirectly it helps you get better grades, it works as a good incentive.'

When asked if they would have left education without the incentive, they replied 'No, but I would be more inclined to skip classes If I didn't get my EMA.'

Some students admit that the money is not spent on educational materials, but on 'fags, booze and shoes,' and one student suggested that some people claim money they are not entitled too, when this could be better spent on 'The elderly...my nana lives on £109 a week, and that has to pay for all living costs.'

I believe that cutting the £100 bonus is a brilliant move by the Government. It is obvious that the money is being spent on wants, not needs. Obviously there will be exceptions, but these students are few in comparison to the great majority who exploit this system. The government has chosen to reduce the amount students are spending on top ups, rather than to let the country plunge deeper into the black hole of recession.

Some interesting thoughts Rebecca. We had to edit due to lack of space. 2.2 million young people have apparently been helped since EMA was created, and evidence suggests that attainment in GCSE and A level by recipients of EMA has increased by 40%. How much would the cost have been if those young people had been claiming income support or job seeker's allowance of £60 a week?

Perhaps what we really need to be doing is looking at how we can restore 'education' to its rightful place in our society as something that is valued for itself, not just for 'outcomes' or as a means to economic success. Any views out there in the village? **Editor.**
