
THE RATBY GOURD SOCIETY'S ANNUAL DISPLAY

No it hasn't vanished for a hundred years and become lost in the mists of time, but for too long the time has remained at 10 past 5!

If you hadn't guessed - I am of course referring to the Parish Church Clock. Everyone uses it, sets their watches by it, looks at it, admires it, is proud of it - but now it is no longer working something needs to be done to save our clock!

But wait! Who can help? - The Doctor, butcher, baker, candle stick maker??? Everyone can help by giving at least a second of their time to save our clock for generations to come.

As a couple living in Ratby we have been Tooking for inspiration - If only there were real timelords to help! Perhaps H G Wells could assist with his time machine? If we could be transported back approx. 85 years to the time when Ratby acquired it's clock ... 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

New Seats - A new bench seat has been installed to replace the one vandalised at the corner of Markfield Road / Main Street and we note that it is already being enjoyed by many. Arrangements are being made for the replacement of the vandalised seat in the Ferndale Drive toddler play area.





A Community For Ra

A small group of people have met twice in Ratby to talk about creating a Community Orchard in the Village. For some time the Parish Council has been considering this possibility. Samantha Forster, the Urban Fringe Officer from the County Council arranged for Paul Hand of 'Bees and Trees' to come to the Library and give a stimulating presentation on Community Orchards. We all got excited by the idea and organised another meeting in November.

We've now decided on some aims which include creating an attractive and interesting area, fostering a sense of community, helping preserve native and local apple trees and encouraging wildlife. So far representatives from a cross-section of the Community have attended or expressed interest.

We've selected the site on Taverner Drive for the first part of the Project. We've taked about the idea that people in the Village who are interested in having fruit trees on small sites near their house could be involved in looking after those trees. We've also talked about the idea of people planting trees in memory of their loved ones. We're working with the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers to apply to Barclays Bank for financial support.

We now need help. We need information about any local varieties of apples or other fruit that may have been traditionally grown in the area. We need to know if there are any varieties of fruit, especially apples, that Ratby people would like to eat. We need local people of all ages with enthusiasm or expertise or both to get involved in designing, preparing the site, planting and caring for the trees and eventually eating the fruit! We need representatives of local organisations to involve their members.

TWELFTH NIGHT is sometimes called Twelfth-day Eve. Old Christmas Eve or the Eve of the Epiphany. After the change from the Old to the New Style, certain districts continued, as far as possible, to keep their Christmas on 6 January, and to wassail their apple trees on 17 January, sometimes called Old Twelfth Night, or on 18 January, sometimes called Old Twelfth Day.

Twelfth Night is the start of the period when farmers used to wassail their orchards; this was believed to charm the trees which would result in a good crop the following season. Every district or county had its own specific date for carrying out this time-honoured procedure, which reached a peak around 17 January. Much lamb's wool (roasted apples, sugar, ginger, nutmeg, cinnamon, and wine and/or ale) was prepared for the wassail bowl, which was carried to the orchard where a toast was given and echoed by the assembled company in booming tones. The wording of the toast varied from place to place, but the following are typical:

Health to thee, good apple tree,
Whence thou may'st bud and whence thou may'st blow,
And whence thou may'st have apples enow.
Hats full, caps full,
Three bushel bags full
And my pockets full too.

Wassail the trees, that they may bear
Many a plum, and many a pear;
For more or less fruits they will bring
As you do give them wassailing.
Wassail, wassail all over the town,
Our toast is white, our ale is brown;
Our bowl is made of the maple tree,
We be good fellows all, I drink to thee.

By tradition a pilgrimage, made to a holy shrine, has to be undertaken on foot. Those who, nowadays, travel by car, coach, train or plane are not, in reality, genuine pilgrims but Mr Frank Mackey, who gave a talk at the September meeting entitled 'The Pilgrimage to Santiago', considered that riding a bicycle was just as gruelling therefore admissible. Even so he gave the impression that he had made the journey not in spiritual pursuit but out of interest and curiosity. He joined the pilgrims way in western France where he then had some 500 miles to travel before reaching Santiago in Northern Spain, supposedly the burial place of St. Peter the Apostle, (being one of several others in Europe!) Along the route he visited Lourdes and other Holy places photographing the many ancient carvings which were the visual aids of past centuries for those unable to read or study religious history. The trip was not without its hazards for after a spill from his machine he suffered a broken nose and had to be ferries off to hospital by a family in a camper van who had earlier befriended him. Seemingly his bicycle, and camera were more fortunate than he and later, after sampling the hospitality of the Basque people, safely reached his intended goal. No mean feat for one who had not taken up cycling until middle age!

For a complete change, at the October meeting, we enjoyed a talk without slides ~ well, not quite because a trombone was central to the topic of 'Brassy Tales'. This was Croft Silver Band's bass trombone player John Deacon's first public appearance as a raconteur and because he is also an avid angler threw in a few fishy tales for good measure. His two most hilarious stories (though undoubtedly not funny at the time of enactment) happened when he was serving in an RAF military band. One occurred during a concert performance of Tchaikowski's overture 1812 in which sound effects of heavy gunfire and church bells are incorporated. To make it more realistic it was planned to detonate small charges of explosive in large cannisters whose lids, held by flexible cables, would lift at the appropriate moment emitting a BOOM and a puff of smoke. Unfortunately one of the technicians involved had, either by way of a practical joke or being inebriated, put into one of the drums a much larger charge than necessary. At the point in the score when the 'cannon fire' joins in there was a huge explosion and the lid flew up to the ceiling of the hall which soon became filled with smoke.


Performance abandoned!

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
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Ratby Youth Action
