## **About Ratby**





After tea on Christmas Eve the fire would be laid with wax paper, sticks and a bucket of coal fetched in ready for the morning. We had a fire on all day at Christmas, banked down at night with slack (fine coal dust) hopefully to keep the room warm all night and making the fire easier to start on Christmas morning. At bedtime I was given a clean white pillowslip to hang on the bed rail at the bottom of the bed. There was no saying: 'I want this or that,' so it was exciting to discover what might be inside the pillowslip on Christmas Morning. There would always be an apple, orange and some nuts. The gifts I can remember having at various times were a post office set, a sweet shop, a Rupert Bear Annual, a book called 'Jill and Judy in the Playhouse' which I still

have, and a pot doll with the name 'Rosamund' on it. Sometimes there were games, Snakes and Ladders, and one called 'Puzzle Corner.'

Over the Christmas period we exchanged visits with two other families, each taking it in turns to provide supper. The evenings were spent playing games, singing carols and songs with piano accompaniment.

We always went to see my Grandma and my father's brother and family, who lived in Barrow-on-Soar. On our way we would travel along Slash Lane. The gipsies always camped there for the winter months. I believe they used the wood from the willow trees to make clothes pegs. My father would always take sweets from the shop to give to the children.


We had tea at my Auntie's house. We would have sandwiches, tinned peaches with evaporated milk and seed cake, which she bought from a shop in Barrow.

If the weather was cold there would be ice on the inside of the windows, and a small Kelly Lamp would be lit in the outside toilet to stop the water from freezing \( \frac{1}{3} \)

There was no central heating, no refrigerator, no TV, DVD or I Pod. Just the magic of Christmas.

There is an issue with the '10 trip' tickets. I bought one from a 26 driver which I used on both 26 and 27 bus journeys. But two Inspectors got on one of the 27 journeys, had a good look at my ticket and told me it was invalid on the 27 route, and took it off me.

I checked with a 26 driver this week and he told me that I should be able to use their £20 '10 Trip' ticket on all Arriva Routes. The same ticket from a 27 driver costs £14.

Ratby is, we believe, the first village in the Borough and probably only the second in the County to be equipped with a Zebrite Belisha Beacon. If you have driven by the school after dark recently you cannot fail to have seen them. With their LED technology and vandal resistant cast aluminium construction they are not only much brighter but also cost less to maintain. However, the initial outlay is somewhat more than County Highways can afford so your Parish Council is very grateful to Cawrey Homes for this very generous gift. We were amused to hear that the County Highways staff arrived at the crossing before the contractors so that they could repossess the old globes and bulbs for recycling elsewhere — our gain benefits someone else too.



Your Parish Council is once again exploring with County Highways the possibility of installing a light controlled pedestrian crossing on Groby Road to help young people on their journey to and from school. First, we are seeking their advice on the viability and appropriateness of a crossing in that position. Second, being aware that there is no money in the Highways fund for any further road improvements in Ratby, we are asking them how much it would cost. And finally, we are asking them when it could be scheduled into their programme of works even if that is ten years hence! When we have the answers we shall consider what to do next.

Your Parish Council is also looking at ways of illuminating areas on both Ferndale Park and the Burroughs Recreation Ground where vandalism occurs. We have a lot of technical matters to consider before going down this route and of course must decide if it is cost effective; we would welcome constructive comments from residents who might be affected by lighting in these areas.

You all know by now that the Community Speed Watch is up and running with a training session taking place this month and monitoring commencing shortly afterwards. Again, we must say thank you to those who have undertaken the task.

Your Parish Council seems to have been very safety conscious this month but for those craving something a little more exciting - for the young at heart in the community - we have agreed to refurbish the BMX track on the Burroughs Road Recreation Ground and hope to be able to report some progress on it early next year.



Finally, those who objected to the proposed new development on Groby Road Ratby, will have received letters from HBBC saying that if you still object to the revised application you have to re-submit your objection. It is our intention to send everyone a sample letter which you can sign and send into the Parish Council office by the 16 December 2009 so that we can take them all to HBBC for you.
