


MINCE PIES From

A VERY IMPRESSIVE SHOW

Artists and craftspeople from the area made an impressive showing at the fourth annual Art Exhibition and Craft Fair held on 7th November. A very good attendance made for an exciting afternoon, with many stalls bursting with high quality, hand made gifts. On display were paintings, drawings and needlepoint by local artists as well as some 3D work by two craftswomen.

I especially enjoyed the use of light in 'The Artist's Daughter' by Peter Griffin, a very accomplished oil painter. A well observed pencil sketch by Ken Hunnybun, 'A Venice Backwater' also caught my eye. Watercolourists were well represented. Julia Kent's 'Autumn Country Lane' featured a superb use of the medium, and Don Fell's peaceful lake scene, 'A Still Day' included gentle, cool colours to create atmosphere. Janet Mayo's 'Embleton Beach' had lovely evening light, while Paul Roger's 'Grip of Winter' created a cold, quiet, winter feel.

Other work worth mentioning were Chris Talbot's 'The Old Ash Tree' with its strong light, a dramatic 'Houses of Parliament' by Cynthia Hunt, some good reflections in work by S.K. Mason, pastels by Jean Vann, and some clean, colourful watercolours by Sid Jordan.

The exhibition showed a good selection of styles and subject matter. Everything was well presented and professional looking. Everyone involved should be proud of a very impressive show.

As you read this the Methodist Church will have. I am sure, had a successful Christmas Bazaar. We always enjoy the atmosphere and goodwill that it brings.



This milestone was referenced at the annual


Remembrance Day ceremony in Ratby Church.

Council School, Ratby. Nr Leicester. December 18th 1928

Dear Mother,

I am writing this letter to wish you a very HAPPY Christmas and a Bright New Year. I hope you are ready for Christmas.

We are going to trim our classroom up at Christmas. I would like a handkerchief.

Hoping you will like my letter.

I remain your loving daughter

CAROL SINGING CHRISTMAS 1940

It was a beautiful. Cold, clear moonlit night, so my brother Francis and I decided to go carol singing along Markfield Lane. Back in 1940 there were houses only down one side of the lane, no street lights, and all the houses had blackout curtains owing to the War.


Off we set, gas masks over our shoulders, giving the 'lane' a once a year treat of our rendering of 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing' and 'Away in a Manger.'

We arrived at the bungalow on Groby Road. (now a riding stables) and began the first verse of 'Silent Night' just as the air raid sirens blared.

Francis and I took off for home up Markfield Lane at a fair rate of knots, but funnily enough we never saw or heard an aircraft that night. Was somebody trying to tell us something?'

Our daughter Doreen slept at the end of the caravan. When she went to bed a table had to be folded down and replaced by the bed made up with cushions. She never liked to be completely separated from the rest of the family, so the partition was only ever partially closed.

This could be a problem at Christmas, when I was trying to keep her presents secret. One particular year she wanted a black doll, which was very popular at the time. I had bought the doll, and planned to knit its clothes while Doreen was asleep. The trouble was that I would be quietly getting on with this task a few feet away from her bedroom, when she would suddenly shout out that she wanted to go to the loo.

The next few seconds were crucial as I scrambled to hide the doll before she pulled back the partition. How we managed to keep the doll a secret until Christmas morning I shall never know!






RATBY VILLAGE SOCIETY


....I thought that bit by bit I'd let you know why you want to join us.




ST. PHILIPS and ST. JAMES

'FOR EDUCATION THERE'S MASTERCARD'

The government removes the cap on university fees.

With the current recession, the importance of university has risen drastically. Forty or fifty years ago university was not an option for many, who left education due to the expenses involved and the pressure to enter work. Today university is the next step in education, and the only way to be sure of a well paid job in the future.

The government announcement to remove the cap on university tuition fees has resulted in widespread discontent throughout the country. The proposal is to allow universities to charge up to £9000 a year, a staggering increase from £3290. Despite the fact that universities choosing to charge over £6000 a year will have to offer bursaries or other forms of financial aid to encourage students from poor backgrounds to apply, this is still a colossal blow to students everywhere wishing to continue their education. Tensions have begun to rise in the coalition government as a result of these proposals, as the Liberal Democrats have been campaigning to abolish tuition fees for six years. Lib Dem party members have permission to abstain from any vote that would result in increased fees. and although many members have claimed they will vote in opposition to the scheme, it is unlikely that this will be enough to have any effect on the plans, leaving students who voted Lib Dem feeling deceived.

It is evident, therefore, that tuition fees will rise. In addition the government has put restrictions on the amount of students universities can accept, and as a result university places will be harder to obtain.

As a student planning to go to university in 2011, the increase in fees may not affect me, however, the repercussions will. Universities are expecting a huge surge in applications from students trying to avoid the immense price the government has put on education. As a result more applicants will be turned away, leaving college students wondering what to do next. The proposal will have devastating long term effects. The demand for jobs will be higher, and as a result work will be harder to obtain, and companies will have higher expectations of their applicants.

Even the students who manage to get a place and take out a loan will leave university with huge debts that they will spend their lives trying to pay.

Who has the right to put a price on education? The government's plans will destroy the dreams of students all over the country. Education is now just something else the poorest families can't afford.
