

PINFOLD LEMON PUDDING

Ingredients:

50g (2 oz) margarine 110 g (4 oz) caster sugar 2 medium eggs Juice and grated rind of one lemon 50 g (2 oz) self raising flour 150 ml (1/4 pint) milk

Method

- 1. Separate the eggs, reserving the yolks and beat the whites until they form stiff peaks.
- 2. Beat together the butter and sugar until creamy. Add the egg yolks, flour, lemon juice and rind, beating well.
- 3. Gradually beat in the milk.
- 4. Fold in the egg whites.
- 5. Pour into a well greased oven dish (11/2 to 2 pints capacity)
- 6. Bake for 45 minutes at GAS 4/350F/60C

CHRISTMAS MEMORIES of a 1940S CHILDHOOD in RATBY

Having been gathered from the local hedgerows holly was placed behind the picture frames and over the top of the mirror which hung over the fireplace. Coloured crepe paper was cut into wide strips, twisted and then hung from the corners of the room and tied to the central light flex. Both the living and front rooms were decorated in the same way. Our Christmas tree, which was artificial, was approximately three feet high with very stiff arms which had to be pulled down. We decorated the tree with shiners and large coloured lights. The tree was then placed in front of the window on a table.

We had large paper balls in different colours which hung from the ceiling on a string fixed with a drawing pin. Christmas cards were carefully positioned on a string fixed by drawing pins along a wall in both rooms. The string was hung in a position relative to the wallpaper patterns so that cards would not leave a mark when they were eventually taken down.

There was carol singing with my friend, hoping for pennies at every door, and I remember the Church Sunday School parties. One year I was given a book called 'How far to Bethlehem' which I still have. It is a treasured book as I never had many books, being a child of the 'forties.' Another party I remember was my father's works do. My mother made my dress. It was red with white bias binding trim and a white collar. I have a photograph showing my father playing the drums, and I am behind the Christmas tree because I cried and wouldn't sit with the other children for my tea.

Our Christmas food was always prepared in the days before and up to Christmas Eve. Chicken was a luxury in those days, and only eaten on Christmas day. My mother would kill one of our chickens, or a cockerel, pluck the feathers off and prepare it. A loaf of bread was left out to go stale for making stuffing, with some crumbs left for the bread sauce. My parents grew vegetables so there were carrots, swede and Brussels sprouts, perhaps potatoes, unless they came from a local farmer. The Christmas cake would have been made at the beginning of November and the puddings at the beginning of December. We all had a stir and a wish before the mixture was put in the basins. The suet came in one piece from the butcher, and had to be grated for the puddings.

My mother would buy a fresh tongue, cook it, and transfer it to a cake tin with heavy weights from the scales to compress it. Finally the pastry was made. I remember the cooling tray on the table, laden with mince pies, jam and lemon curd tarts. Now we knew that Christmas was near!

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APPLE DAY AT THE ORCHARD



ANDREW'S ADVENT RUN-250 miles

My Dad, George Hurd, who you may know, suffers from Alzheimer's and I find it very difficult to help him and make his life any better. One big way I can help is to raise both awareness and funds for the Alzheimer's Society to help carers, provide support for families of sufferers, and for important research into the illness.

So, this year I've been thinking hard about a unique way to help and have devised an Advent Calendar with a difference:

Over the 25 days of the Advent Period I will run 400km (250 miles). The distance each day will vary with the shortest being 6k (3.75 miles) and the longest 26k (16.25 miles), average distance obviously 10 miles per day.

The twist to this is that each days distance will be hidden on an advent calendar so I will not know how far I have to run the next day until finishing the previous days run. My only stipulation is that the shortest distance is done on Christmas Day(!).




