Emma has already made a name for herself by heating the boys in a recent breast-stroke swimming event



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
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
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
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PEN-STYLE GLITTER GLUES -**HAZARD WARNING**

The contract for refuse collection has been awarded by HBBC to SITA who will replace FOCSA. To be considered is the limiting of free collection of garden refuse to one bag per week with any extra bags being subjected to a charge. The Parish Council have expressed great concern because of the possibility of an increase in illegal dumping of garden rubbish in the countryside. We are insisting that standards of service must not deteriorate following the change of contractor.

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


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






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Alison Seddon after 10 years. She has taken early retirement due to family commitments in Lancashire.






'Trivia Quiz' was the subject of the November meeting, conducted by Mr Norman Eggington, and it was just that! Members huddled together in groups of four to give one another moral support in attempting to answer inconsequential and abstruse questions such as "Which British coin weighs exactly 5 grams?" and "What is significant about the dates 12th March 1945 and 23rd April 1956?" Guesswork paid off in a number of cases and after much frustrating mind searching, and not a little laughter, the winning team was declared, perhaps not surprisingly, led by the erudite Fred Harding.

(If you really want to know the answers to the two questions above they are :

the 20p - and the dates are the only two this Century to have consecutive numbers 12.3.45 and 23.4.56!)

Although the Society does not meet in December, it was active in support of National Tree Week by giving assistance to the Woodland Trust which had organised a tree planting event on one of its newly acquired sites at Old Hays. As the Society (a corporate member of the Woodland Trust) had taken a leading role in the raising of money locally for the purchase of the land one of its members took delivery, at this house, of 500 whips (tiny trees), a like number of plastic sleeves and some thousand support canes in readiness for the big event. At 9.00 am Peter Leeson of the Woodland Trust collected all of the above and on arrival at the site, north of Burroughs Road, he and the member marked out the area (approx 1 acre) to be planted. Then for the next $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours the same member erected the canes at about six feet apart to mark the spots where the trees were to be planted. By 10.00 am the first volunteers had arrived together with another officer of the Woodland Trust who had brought with him enough spades to arm a battalion of the Pioneer Corps! At the height of the activity there were fifty adult volunteers which included some local residents, ten members of the Village Society plus a dozen or so children. Some of those who took part, including a couple from Shropshire, are regulars at these events wherever they take place - plantoholics or treedopholes?

Incredibly by shortly after midday all of the whips had been planted whereupon Peter Leeson produced a large bag of acoms, enough to complete the planting of the area. By one o'clock the job was done in a heartening spirit of co-operation and good humour. It was satisfying to know that we had done a little towards replacing the County's tree population after all that which had been lost during the construction of the Western Bypass.

The Annual General Meeting and Members Supper will take place on 20th February. New members always welcome to join.

On Tuesday 19th March an illustrated talk 'Gardens Large and Small' will be given by Mr Peter Barton at 8.00 pm in the Welfare Hall.

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
Once again the people of Ratby have shown their support for LOROS by their generous donations during the recent House to House Collection.

Copy of an article relating to the toast to John O'Gaunt.

They'll drink a toast to John O'Gaunt

Enderby villagers will gather round a hogshead in the local pub on Bank Holiday Monday, smoke long clay - pipes, bid hard cash for a crop of grass - and drink a toast in beer to a famous figure from 14th century - England.

These curious goings - on are part of the annual sale of A fine summer doth show!' the, "wether" ---- which is a two acre piece of common land in Enderby. It was given to the villagers of Ratby in 1390 by John O'Gaunt as a reward for entertaining him at their spring fair.

Since then for nearly 600 years the ceremony of selling the grass crop of the two - acres has continued. Nor do the villagers forget their medieval benefactor -- they drink the health of John O'Gaunt

The bidding continues each Whit holiday with a minimum stake of £4. last year the "wether" went for £5.

"An old coin was passed round -- it's always the same and when a bidder holds it he can bid. This ceremony takes place at the Nag's Head, Enderby. Traditionally a boar's head is cut up into sandwiches which are eaten when the bidding finishes. 10 inch churchwarden clay pipe s are also smoked after the sale. The feast was first held in 1821 at the White Lion in Leicester, until 1859 when it moved to the Nag's Head.

BUS USERS HAVE THEIR SAY

Leicestershire County Council is inviting

applications from regular bus users to join it's Bus

4 lean chops - lamb or pork

25g (loz) butter

1 teaspoon oil

1 small onion (chopped)

4 tablespoons tomato ketchup

2 tablespoons vinegar

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1 tablespoon worcester sauce

1 teaspoon made mustard

Salt and Pepper to taste

Method

- 1. Trim and season chops
- 2. Fry lightly to brown in hot oil and butter. Remove and place in casserole dish.
- 3. Lightly fry onion in pan.
- 4. Add all other ingredients to pan, stir well
- 5. When boiling pour over chops.
- 6. Cover casserole.
- 7. Cook for 10 mins in oven 200°c/400°f/Gas Mark 6.
- 8. Baste then lower heat to 180°c/350°f/Gas Mark 4 for a further 30 - 40 minutes
- 9. Serve with plain boiled rice or jacket potatoes and green vegetables


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Users Panel and influence the way bus services in Leicestershire are operated.

County Councillor Ron Adams. Chairman of the Panel, explains:

"The bus Users Panel has been operating successfully for four years, helping the bus companies and the County council to understand what the passengers really want from their services. Panel members give us their views on a whole range of issues: just at the last meeting we talked about network tickets and making buses more accessible for people with disabilities, amongst other things. Bus company representatives serve on the Panel and many problems can be taken up by them straight away; other matters the County Council looks into.

"Now we are looking for some new members to serve on the Panel. Anyone can put their name forward. All they need to be is a regular bus user (using buses at least once a week) and willing to come to early evening meetings in the centre of Leicester four times a year. In return they will have the opportunity to express their views and help bring improvements in the County's bus services."

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Ratby's Crowning Glory

One does not have to come into Ratby to be aware of its dominating presence for it can be seen from miles around even by thousands of people travelling daily along the M1. However, it has stood on the same site for centuries before motorways existed and has survived the Wars of the Roses, the Reformation, the Civil War and the Commonwealth and, at some time unknown, a change of name. Just when St George's church was renamed St Philip and St James is lost in the mists of time or more likely by the loss of Parish Records during a fire in 1815. Certainly, the oldest part of the present church is the lower part of the tower built around 1230 and there was a vicar instituted some time before 1235. The church was rebuilt and enlarged during the 14th Century including the South aisle whose east window is architecturally unusual

Sir Edward Grey of Groby Hall, Lord of the Manor of Ratby, whose family worshipped in Ratby Church obtained permission from the Archbishop of Canterbury to have a child christened in the private chapel of the Hall and it is believed that the font, which dates from this period and is still in use, was transferred to Ratby Church when Bradgate House was built. Sir John Grey, eldest son of Sir Edward, was married here to Elizabeth Woodville in 1457 and it is possible that the upward extension of the tower was built in celebration of the wedding. One of their two sons, Thomas later became the 1st Marquis of Dorset and built Bradgate House when Sir John was killed at the battle of St Albans, but three years later she married King Edward IV and was crowned Queen in 1465. She had seven more children which included King Edward V and his brother Richard, who were murdered in the Tower of London, and Princess Elizabeth who married King Henry VII the victor of Bosworth Field.



Upon the completion of Bradgate House the Greys worshipped in Newtown Linford church and so Jane Grey, the tragic uncrowned nine day Queen of England would have had no occasion to visit Ratby. After abandoning Bradgate House in the 18th Century the Greys used Stewards Hay as their hunting lodge and once again came to Ratby Church on Sundays.

By 1878 the church was in need of extensive repairs and there was a proposal to build a new church, as had happened the previous year in Glenfield, but the parishioners prevailed upon George-Harry Grey, 7th Earl of Stamford, to help fund the restoration which was completed in 1881. The balcony was removed, a new pulpit and new seating introduced and the organ chamber and Clergy vestry built. It is possible that the North porch also was added at this time. Sir Henry Sacheverel of Old Hays Farm, who instituted a Trust from which the elderly folk of Ratby still benefit, died in 1620 and his tomb in the chancel is another interesting link with the past.

A building of such antiquity, and of historic importance, deserves to be cherished and maintained as part of our county's heritage. Repairs are constantly required to the fabric due to weathering and improvements for the benefit of parishioners are becoming an urgent necessity. A recent Parish Funding Programme, although not reaching its target, has alleviated some of the financial worries of the Church Council. It would be a tragedy indeed that if, after over 750 years Ratby's crowning glory found itself, in today's harsh climate, unable to maintain its fabric and its ministry to the parish.

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




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
