

## RATBY COMMUNITY ORCHARD PLANTED

The people of Ratby can now be proud that they have a community orchard. On the crisp, bright sunny day of Sunday 6th December 1999 over 30 volunteers; one having "raced" down from Edinburgh; planted 30 fruit trees, 100 whips, (small shrubs and bushes), and nearly 400 bluebells. Some had planned to come and lend a hand, others just got involved when they were walking to have a look at the pond and the totem pole.

Careful planning had gone into the day, the Group had researched and chosen 26 different English apple varieties and a crab apple, a medlar and a quince tree. All the trees have been labelled with their names so if you go down to have a look, you can find such delights as the Ard Cairn Russet, tasting of bananas or the Gladstone tasting of raspberry or red currant. There are lots of varieties that taste of apples too. After two or three years of careful tending, the first fruits should begin to be available for the people of Ratby to sample

The Community Orchard is real group effort. The project has received invaluable help from the British Trust For Conservation Volunteers who did a lot of the fencing and the construction work and managed to secure funding from the Barclays Bank Site Savers Scheme. The Project is on land gifted to the Parish Council by Cawrey, the Builders, who also helped with the loan of heavy equipment. It is supported by Ratby Parish Council, and the Village Society.

If your child is between the ages of three and four years old or less and not attending Pre-school, then drop in to Ratby Pre-School in the Church Rooms in Church Lane to either put their name down for when they are of age or. to join the Pre-school. If you wish, you and your child will be welcome to stop awhile and sample the activities. A glowing report given by Ofsted inspectors during the last term can be read.

Leaders Janet Simmonds, Sue Poynor and Linda Evans will be on hand to welcome you in a warm and friendly atmosphere where children come first.

The Pre schools staff's approach to the curriculum covering all the learning outcomes was highly praised in Ofsteds report.

The school is open every weekday morning from 9.15am to 11.45am and 1pm to 3.30pm on Tuesday for all ages of Pre-school children. On Monday and Thursday afternoons 1.00pm to 3.30pm, children 4+ only are catered for, in a more structured environment preparing for entrance to Ratby school. At least four visits to the school are undertaken during their last term at Pre-school familiarising the children with the school and its teachers.

TheCandlelit procession will also being taking place.



#### LOCAL HISTORY BOOKS INVESTIGATED

Do you have a fascination for local history? Local teacher and historian Mr David Ramsey of Groby has spent the last 20 years researching material for five books entitled "Bradgate and its Villages." He has just completed the third paperback which he hopes will answer some of the frequently asked questions and hitherto unknown facts about the myths and legends of Old John ,Bradgate and surrounding villages dating from 1086 to 1976. Ratby's labour force, then a large village compared to other villages in the area was used extensively with many familiar village names appearing in his book. Original maps, photographs and research obtained from the Dunham Massey papers the Nation Trust archivist at the John Rylands Research Institute at the University of Manchester .bring to the reader fascinating facts . That Bradgate derived its name from a village called Broadgate which was sighted between the now Field Head and Markfield village, now the site of a newly built housing estate. That the bricks to build Kirby Muxloe Castle and Bradgate were made and fired on dimple fields now adjacent to Cropston reservior. Shadowy remains can still be seen near to buildings. A gamekeeper was employed and responsible for the game in Ratby and the villages as far away as Hugglescote. That in 1902, 173 Ratby men worked at Groby quarry. Book two lists the extravagances of food and drink and of the enormous amounts of fish taken from Groby pool and the river Lynn and shopping trips to Cambridge to bulk buy. I personally could not put these books down and cannot wait to visit these areas in a new light and look for evidence from the past. Can't wait to read David's fourth book on local family surnames. His books £4.95 can be obtained from Malcolm Hornsby Antiquarian in Churchgate Loughbourgh ,Newtown Linford Post Office ,The Map Shop Shepshed, Coalville books.or Mr Ramsay at Carmen Grove, Groby. My research into local history lead me to discover that Davids wife Gloria was a teacher at Ratby County Primary School for many years; perhaps many of you will

remember her friendly smiling face.


## RATBY COMMUNITY ORCHARD NEEDS YOU

The work done to create the Ratby Community Orchard has only just begun. We now have an orchard, a wildlife pond, a totem pole, and an improved woodland edge with blue bells. The next step is to finish off the pond by pumping out the water and lining it with sub soil. We also need to mulch the apple trees with rotted manure and to plant the remaining flower bulbs. It is planned to do all this on Saturday 20th February. In the longer term we will need to plant the pond and when the trees have grown, do some pruning.

Ratby people are welcome to come along and help out. There are lots of different ways to get involved. Its not all getting dirty and heavy digging! You are also welcome to come along and have look on the day and not do anything. We welcome your interest and support!

#### **Bacon and Onion Roll**

#### Pastry

8 oz (225g) Self Raising Flour

4 oz (110g) Shredded Suet (or firm cold butter or marg grated)

Little cold water to mix

#### Filling

1 Onion Finely chopped
5-6 Rashers of streaky bacon - chopped
1 tsp Mixed dried herbs (or 2 tsps fresh herbs)
Shake of Black Pepper
Little Salt

#### Method

Oven Temp Gas 6, 200C or 400F

- 1. Mix flour & fat with little water to make soft (not sticky) dough
- 2. Roll into oblong about  $8 \times 7$  inches
- 3. Lightly fry filling ingredients for 5-7 mins and spread over pastry
- 4. Roll up like a Swiss Roll
- Seal ends with a little water
- 6. Wrap loosely with foil and place on greased baking tray
- 7. Bake for 30 mins
- 8. Open up foil to allow pastry to brown, and bake for further 5 mins
- Serve with hot vegetables or crispy salad
