The Trading Standards Department warns businesses of the start of Entry Hunting Directory the Season. Many firms will receive letters to say that their name is to be entered in a Directory. Some will ask for corrections or agreement to a text, others will ask for money to be sent.


The Director of Leicestershire's Trading Standards Department warns:

"These letters appear to be timed to arrive when senior staff in companies are like to be on leave. Junior staff may easily get the impression that an order has already been placed. My advice is to alert your staff to the possibility of these documents and only reply if you really want to be included".

"It is difficult to check if the actually concerned companies publish the directories as most are based abroad; Germany, Switzerland and Lichtenstein being favourite bases".

The message is "If in doubt - chuck it out".





This meeting was held to clarify planning issues on areas of washland of the Rothley Brook and its tributaries. The Parish council also showed a video recording containing evidence of a black liquid entering the little brook. A representative of the NRA said that unconsented discharge can be the subject of prosecution. He advised the Council that any such evidence should be reported immediately by telephone to the NRA.







Bradley left the 'Wolsey' to train as a toolmaker. His first job was for Daimler in Coalville, until the end of the 2nd World War, when Daimler moved to Coventry. He then joined the Auster Aircraft Company, and worked in their experimental section at Rearsby.

Later he joined Ratby Engineering (where Cardinal Broach is now) and set up their tool room for them in Peckleton. At that time, Ratby Engineering made machines for manufacturing fishing nets.

Besides his distinguished working life, Bradley has been a District Councillor for 16 years and a Parish Councillor for 26.

After their retirement in the same year, he and his wife enjoyed travelling. He is proud of his driving record. In all the years from his first car, a 1928 Austin 7 to his 1978 Ford Escort of today, he has never lost his no-claims bonus!!

The photograph we printed in 'April' WOT of Ratby Old Boys Football Team prompted Mr Bradley Moore of Station Road to ring us up. He can identify everyone in this picture.

Bradley Moore was born in Melrose Villa, 33 Station Road on July 26th 1902.

Here he is aged $1\frac{1}{2}$ in a photograph taken at the Neal Brothers Studio which was to the rear of former buildings on the Coop site.



The Moores were a Ratby family. Bradley's Lawson Moore worked as a milkman's lad father was born in Chapel Lane, opposite for Percy Geary before starting work at what was the saddle-makers. His mother the Wolsey, where he later became Manager. had been born in the end house at Staffords Yard. His Dad was known as 'young Dodger Their father also ran a hairdressers' shop Moore' - Grandad being (of course), Old (where 'Julies' is now) and Bradley Dodger Moore, who used to sell rabbits remembers leaving work on Wednesdays to and poultry. take down a sugar bowl full of pennies for their change.

Uncle Billy Moore was known as Billy Tumbler and lived in the farm opposite Freemans, the Butcher.

He recalls vividly the building of the Methodist Chapel in 1910, when, only 8 years old he help to lay the stone which bear his name - G.B. Moore. He is now the only person living whose name appears on those foundations stones.

Although christened George, he has always Bradley Moore's own wedding was held on been known as Bradley. He was named after Boxing Day 1936. He met his future wife, a Kirby Muxloe lady, a family friend. Mrs Annie (known as Nancy) Walters through Bradley-Hughes had tragically drowned whilst the Chapel. Nancy taught in the Sunday trying to save a child at Mablethorpe. school. At that time she was living with

Many Ratby holidaymakers may have seen the Bradley-Hughes shelter built to commemorate her courage on the sea front there. Younger brother, Lawson was named after a minister.

Bradley attended the village school when Diggory Nicholas was Head. He remembers writing on slates in the infant class. Mrs Nicholas was Head of the Infants, and 'codger' Hunt was an uncertificated teacher who also worked as a reporter for the Mercury.


Another vivid recollection is of the day when the First World War was declared. He was a newspaper delivery boy and recalls standing by the petrol station (now County Travel) on the morning of August 4th 1914. 'Prince' Sutton came by and asked "has war been declared lad? - Well I expect I shall have to go."


He left school at the age of 13 and was expected to work with his father at Tylers in Stamford Street (later 'Wolsey'). For two weeks he worked for nothing to learn the job. His first week's wage was 2s 6d.

When Bradley's father took ill in 1918, he took over his machine, and became the youngest ever operator at the age of 16. He and Wilf Taylor used to go into work on Sundays to make stockings for the household at Buckingham Palace.

Whilst living at Melrose Villa he enjoyed making wedding cakes for a hobby. Gearys had bought the bakery from Copsons, and the cakes would be baked in their ovens when they had cooled down on Sundays. Even so, the cakes still needed to be surrounded by a layer of bran. He has made and decorated cakes for many of the Geary family.




BUTTERCUPS

Just a few facts about the rest of the butter cup family (Ranunculaceae). It is a large mixed family having at least 45 members growing in the wild. Gardeners have created many more hybrids, which do sometimes escape from captivity.

Buttercups have adapted to grow in all sorts of situations. During walks through Martinshaw Woods you should be able to find Marsh Marigold growing in the very muddy patches where you don't want to walk; a really proud and handsome plant, large obvious flowers and stiff solid leaves. Later on in the year shy and spindley

Goldilocks will be found beside the rides. This plant often trys to disguise itself by mutating its petal formations. Sometimes shedding some of its petals as soon as the flower opens and other times the

Nectaries grow to look like the petals - just look at its leaves and it won't be able to hoodwink you.



Water crowfoot is white flowered with a stem of about $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches in length. as its name suggests it actually grows in fresh water, and the leaves have made adaptions as to whether the plant is living in a fast flowing stream or around the edges of a muddy pond. There are at least ten different leaf combinations and all have different names from common water crowsfoot (Ranunculus aquatillis) to three lobed crowfoot (Ranunculus triportitus).

Then of course there is the gardeners enemy - the creeping Buttercup - it gets every where.


Have you been into the field of Ridge and Furrow at the end of Cottagers Close? There you could find 3 different sorts of

Buttercup. The Lesser Celendine, around the edges of the field and under the hedge. The Meadow Buttercup which likes to have its roots in damp soil will be growing in the furrows whilst on the top of the ridges you should find the Bulbous Buttercup How will you know which is which if you haven't a Flora in your pocket? Well

the easiest way is to look at the Sepals - Meadow Buttercup has erect sepals and the sepals belonging to the bulbous Buttercup are turned down.

Here are a few more jottings about Buttercups.

The yellow and white wild water lilies are the largest of the English family and the water crowfoots the smallest. Christmas Roses (Hellebore Niger) are cousins so


too are Travellers Joy (Clematis Vitalba), Meadow Rue (Thalictrum Havum), Monks Hood (Aconitum Napellus) and the lovely wind flower or wood anemone (anemone nemorosa).

If you are lucky enough to visit Austria and walk in the Mountains and Woods, there you will see Hepatica Noblis a truely beautiful noble blue "Buttercup" with 3 lobed leaves.

I must stop jotting for this issue, so I can start for the next.

Ratby School Parent/Governors Meeting


This annual meeting was held on Tuesday May 19th in the School Hall.
