Leicestershire County Council's Trading Standards is warning members of the public against bogus fund-raisers selling 'rag-style' magazines.

Attention is drawn to collectors in Leicester who people may believe are students running official 'rag-mag' collections for charitable purposes but in fact are retaining much, if not all, of the money for private profit.

Anybody approached by a collector who appears suspicious should:-

- Ask for the person's Street Collectors or House to House Collectors licence.,
- Ask which charity will benefit from the sale of the magazine and how much will be donated.

You are also advised not to give to collectors who don't have a sealed collecting box.



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

THE BRITISH LEGION

A member of the Ratby and District, Royal British Legion, had in his possession some World War 1 memorabilia, British war and victory medals, a death plaque, letters and scrolls plus letters from the record office Warley (missing Officer's and men).

They were all items belonging to a distant relative, Mrs Fanny Reeves, a widow, whose son 44975 PTE Louis Arthur Reeves 11th Btn Essex regiment, of Holwell Cottages, Stamford St. Ratby. PTE Reeves aged 18 was reported missing in action October 12th 1918, just a month before Armistice.

Until the day she died, Mrs Reeves had always kept her door unlocked, in the hope her son would come back home.

It was suggested at a Legion meeting in Ratby, as there is no known direct relative to present the medals and other items to the War Memorial Museum at the Corillon, Loughborough, where Mr Sam Evans, a volunteer Curator, will have them all displayed in a place of honour before the end of May.

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
Farmers Warned to Maintain Animal Movement Records

Farmers and animal dealers should ensure that records for animal movements and accurate identification are complete and up-to-date if disease control is to be effective.

At a recent meeting of the County Council's Agricultural and Environment Committee, Mr J McIntyre, Divisional Veterinary Officer with the Ministry of Agriculture Fisheries and Food reported that in the South West of the Country incidents of Tuberculosis in cattle had increased in 1993 by over 100% compared with 1992. Whilst in Leicestershire and the East Midlands there were very few incidents, the rapid turnover and movement of animals across the Country meant that the disease could spread to this area. In this situation it was vitally important for animal movement records to be completed and maintained in order for disease tracing and control measures to be effective.

The same holds true for warble fly infestation of cattle of which there were two recent consignments of imported cattle from France where the infestation was detected. Since 1988, Great Britain has been virtually free from warble fly but in 1993 the disease reappeared through imports.

I, like most others, have recently received my 94/95 Council Tax demand and am appalled at the overall 20.3% increase and in particular the Parish increase of 41%.

I appreciate that in the previous year no increase was made but this alone could not justify a rise of this magnitude.

It seems to be poor housekeeping if local authorities cannot contain expenses at the current rate of inflation which we are told is 2.4%.

It would be most enlightening if those responsible at County & Parish level, who after all are accountable for spending <u>our</u> money could explain, to us all, the need for increases of this size at this time, keeping in mind other new taxes people are facing.

DATES FROM FAMILY BIBLE

Anyone who has looked back in time, locally, will have come across the Lee

family. Most commonly mentioned seems to be Jimmy Lee's cottage which was opposite the shop now occupied by Ratby T.V. The last piece of walling was knocked down recently when the controversial road widening scheme was implemented. This brought Jimmy Lee's name to the fore once more and prompted enquiries which have led to this article.

ELIZABETH ANN. 'OLD COTTAGE'

James (Jimmy) Lee was born 23.4.1860 and in 1884 he married Martha Patricia Harris (born 18.1.1864). They had four children, Elizabeth Ann Lee (born 6.10.1889); Bertha Lee (19.3.1892); Herbert Lee (7.2.1895) and James Owen Lee (7.4.1901). The family are said to be 'Chapel'.

In 1934 they still lived in 'Old Cottage' and celebrated their Golden Wedding. Apart from this, his great grandson knows nothing of Jimmy and Martha but would love to find out more, to share with his family and to pass on to his own daughter.

Elizabeth Lee married Fred Herbert and had a daughter Avis (now Avis Caseley living in Glenfield).

Bertha Lee married Herbert Jordan. Their children were Sid and Owen Jordan. Sid of course still lives in the village.

James Owen Lee (known as Owen) married Gertrude Richards.

Herbert Lee was apparently always called

'Jim' although he hated it. He married Gertrude Violet Cullen (Vi). Their children were Barbara and Dennis (who lives at Markfield). Herbert (Jim) lied about his age to get into the Army and fought at Passiondale, Ypres and spent his 21st birthday on the Somme. Back in Ratby he worked for many years at 'the Wolsey' and when he retired at 65 he set up a 'fruit & veg' stall on Leicester Market. Later he moved to the shop from which Geoff Widdowson still sells 'fruit and veg' today. Prior to this the shop had apparently been a dining area for the chip shop. (Send in your memories please).


