Your help to make this competition a continuing success is vital. Make a note in your diary - "July 18th" Charles Rogers

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
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1lb fish fillets (white, smoked or mixture)

Salt, Pepper, Lemon Juice

1 medium sized onion

- 4 tomatoes or 2/3 tablespoons tinned tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons grated cheese
- 2 tablespoons fresh breadcrumbs

Portuguese Fish

Method

- Heat over to 350°F, Gas 4, 177°c
- Trim and skin fillets and season with salt, pepper and little lemon juice
- Chop onion
- Peel and slice tomatoes 4.
- Arrange fillets in fireproof dish. Arrange onion and tomatoes on fish.
- Mix together crumbs and cheese and sprinkle to cover fish, onion and tomatoes.
- Bake in middle of oven for approximately 30 minutes. Scrivener

It is not within the Committee's terms of reference to discuss individual cases. These should always be referred to the Area Commander at Hinkley Police Station, Supt. P. McHugh.

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




Here and there on the grassy stream banks Lody's Smock was in flower.

On Easter Saturday four members of the Society -Chairman Dennis Green, Secretary Hoz Gamble, Vicar Rev. Michael Hardy and Churchwarden Alan Spencer - planted three commemorative silver birch trees in the churchyard as part of the celebration of the 21st Anniversary in 1995.

The April meeting was addressed by Mr. David Mutton, an amateur (in the best sense of the word) weather forecaster whose prognostications have been published in the Leicester Mercury for over twenty years.

He brought along various pieces of technical equipment used in the trade and showed slides of measuring instruments and weather stations. It had been hoped, forlornly, that he may have shown photographs of cloud formations, giving their omens, so that we lesser mortals could make our own predictions and dispense with the seaweed!

Doctor of Geology Helen Boynton delighted a large gathering at the May meeting with two "mini-talks", one on Gemstones and the other on Fun With Fossils both of which could have been expanded many times over. Her first topic was on birth stones, allied to the signs of the Zodiac, and surprisingly the audience was fairly split between the Twelve divisions. Samples of these stones (except the diamond!) were on view, some rarer than others. One curious fact emerged in that the Opal changes colour dependent upon the amount of moisture in its immediate environment.



Turning to fossils it was revealed that the Groby slate headstones in Ratby churchyard contain some extremely ancient specimens, as do the 600 million year old rocks in Bradgate Park, pre-dating the previously held belief that no living creature was in existence at that period of the earth's evolution. The most fascinating exhibit - in a jam jar - was a dinosaur egg; fortunately a little too old for it to hatch out in the Welfare Hall! Such was the interest engendered by her talk that many members held Dr. Boynton in conversation for more than half an hour after the meeting had ended.

An 82 Year Facility to End?

In July 1914 Ratby Parish Council negotiated with the Should the fencing prove to be impracticable for eit. Landowners to lease ground to the rear of Plough Inn for reason the Parish Council would have no option but to use as a Recreation Area.

For many years this lease has been renewed on an annual basis, and attempts to extend the lease for a longer term or What a sad reflection this is on present day circumstances, alternatively to purchase the land have proved unsuccessful.

Because of the uncertainty for continued tenancy, the the present day youngsters responsible for the closure. Parish Council have considered it inadvisable to extend the range of play equipment which is confined to a slide and Charles Rogers four swings. Maintenance of the area has always been accepted by the Parish Council as their responsibility.

The position of this Recreation Ground is extremely significant, occupying a central location in the Village and very important to residents of the Stamford Street/Markfield Road area who are able to use it for the benefit of themselves and their children, thus avoiding the necessity to cross busy roads to reach the distant Ferndale Drive area

Many of Ratby's senior citizens will have memories of their enjoyment of this Recreation Ground when they were younger.

After 82 years of minimal problems, the area is now being mis-used. Large quantities of broken glass litters the ground on a daily basis which has resulted in doubling the maintenance staff employed by the Parish Council to clean this. In addition motorised vehicles are being driven around the ground and to within six feet of the play equipment. Both of these activities are of course highly dangerous, and the position is described as "an accident waiting to happen".

It became necessary for the Parish Council to check its legal responsibility in the event of an accident occurring and they were advised that the Insurance Policy will be withdrawn unless the area is made secure (i.e. fenced).

Apart from the cost of fencing (probably thousands of pounds) permission is needed from the Landowner for this to be installed, and again it has to be considered if an outlay of this amount can be justified on such a short term lease.



Help us to forget ourselves and help other people with all the skills we have learnt on this camp.


Thank you for giving us our great ideas for the obstacle course and for the fun time we spent on it.


We must all think of Baden Powell, who was brought down to earth to invent such a good scheme called Scouting and we will always think of him as the real leader of Scouts.

Consumers in Leicestershire are being warned by the County's Watchdogs of the potential problems of buying from doorstep sellers. Leicestershire County Council's Trading Standards Department has been alerted that rogue traders are operating in the area, using the usual trick of the trade to sell shoddy, poor quality carpets.





WHAT DO YOU WANT FOR YOUR COMMUNITY

Can you imagine what your village or parish will be like in the next century and, if so, do you like what you see?

If you feel that there are aspects of life within the community which could be improved, perhaps you should consider participating in a Village Appraisal; a survey of your community which provides an opportunity to discover the past, document the present and plan for the future.

A Village Appraisal allows everyone to have their say on local issues by finding out what people want for the place where they live or work. An Appraisal can help you to identify potential threats and take appropriate action, can be used as evidence to influence decision makers on issues affecting the community and is a good way to identify opportunities for new community initiatives.

The Village Appraisals Initiative was established in Leicestershire by the Rural Community Council, who have just published a comprehensive Village Appraisal Information Pack - a step-by-step guide which should prove invaluable to groups who are interested in involving themselves in the future of their community.

Nicole Rickard, the L.R.C.C. Rural Officer, says "We can provide advice and practical support throughout the process, we may even be able to give you a grant to help cover your printing and publicity costs! A Village Appraisal should be a 'stepping stone' to action, and new projects arising from recent Appraisals in Leicestershire including village crime-busting initiatives, new low-cost housing and environmental improvements, to name just a few".

An unscrupulous sales gang described the carpets they were selling as "New High Quality Fibre Bonded" but an unsuspecting purchaser later discovered their new carpet contained no fibres and was more like cardboard cushion flooring.

You are advised to be extra vigilant when dealing with uninvited callers selling their wares. Doorstep sellers can be very determined and will try to pressure people into buying their products. Advice to customers is 'don't be afraid to say no', if you need time to think it over and compare prices elsewhere, tell the trader - an honest salesperson will understand.



As advertised in the last issue of the Wot Magazine, we advised the people of Ratby that we had invited a guest speaker to our next meeting which was on the 16 April 1996.

Unfortunately, Mr. Kevin Lewis of Harboro Portas was unable to attend.

We were, however pleased to see several members of the public at our meeting and when Graham Stanley reported that the Crime figures for March 96 were 54 as opposed to 22 for the same month in 1995, the people at the meeting felt alot of this was attributable to the fact that Ratby's local Police Man was not as visible in the area as was his predecessor.

One particular area in Ratby suffering at the moment is the bottom of Ferndale Drive adjacent to the car park of the Ferndale Drive Play Area, which seems to attract gatherings of noisy and trouble some youths.

Unfortunately, Constable Mason was not at this meeting, so he was not therefore available to comment. So it was groups decision that we would write to Inspector Lloyd Wells, Area Commander McHugh and Chief Constable Keith Povey, to register our concerns and demand that our village gets what it needs from the police.

A copy of this letter has also been sent to Mr David Treddinick MP, our County Councillor ... Mr Robert Fraser and our Borough Councillor ... Mr Robin Bennett.

We, the Neighbourhood Watch Society, have invited these officials to our next meeting, so if you the public have a concern, and would like to raise it with these people, please come along. If you can bring a note of the time and day when you are disturbed by these youths, it will help the Police get better understanding of our problems.

The Parish Council hosted a meeting on Tuesday 26th March for Councillors to meet and discuss with The Youth workers to explore the possibility of sourcing funding and suitable location for young people to meet and have organised activities. A follow-up meeting open to all interested parties and the general public has been arranged for 7.30 pm 14th May in the Welfare Hall.
