
# RATBY COMMUNITY ORCHARD ANNUAL POND DIPPING

### **RECYCLING IN RATBY**

The recycling sacks for plastic and cardboard are lightweight even when full. On collection day the sacks from several households are gathered together on the pavement to await collection.

Because the sacks are so light the draught from passing vehicles whips them up, sometimes taking them into the road. If each sack is not tied securely at the top the contents are strewn about, causing more problems than they solve.

Ratby Village Society Anti-Litter Group has contacted the Borough Council to ask if the system can be improved. We received an immediate, courteous and helpful response, saying that time is needed if the system is to be fairly judged, but they will be reviewing it in twelve months. We suggested collection boxes, similar to the ones used for glass, but it was explained that the cost of these would need careful consideration and nothing can be promised.

From the recycling point of view it is working extremely well. It will help enormously if villagers would please tie up their sacks securely. Our suggested method is to tie the tabs at the top in pairs diagonally.

# RATBY WOODLAND GROWS


Woodland Trust's Burroughs Wood and Pear Tree Wood have recently been complemented by the newly planted Old Hayes Wood, covering some 12 hectares (30 acres) of land at Old Hays Farm.

In partnership with the National Forest and Forestry Commission four like-minded owners of the land conceived the scheme, which they now manage.

- n Planting of native species such as oak, ash, silver birch, numbering almost 7000 trees began in December 2008 and was completed by the end of March this year. Over 300 of the trees were planted by the children of Ratby Primary School, assisted by teachers and helpers. They will be able to check on future growth through a system of numbering.
- Six wildlife ponds are being created on the site,
  which is bordered by improved public footpaths
  it with bench seats and information boards,
- together with a number of bat and owl boxes.

This is a particularly praiseworthy gesture on the part of all individuals involved, to conserve and enhance the local countryside, not only for the benefit of wildlife but also for the many who appreciate and enjoy the beauty of nature.








