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
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MESSY MONDAY continued

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
CAFÉ 27 OPENS in RATBY

This exciting new 'place to go' opened its doors for the first time on Wednesday May 15th and was busy right from the word go! Local couple Yvonne and Vaughan Murray of Markfield Road had always wanted to set up a café in the village, and the vacant premises on the corner of Station Rd and Chapel Lane proved the perfect spot. Daughter Gemma is managing the café, assisted by Chef Neil, and friendly staff Melissa, Abbey, Kate and Ryan.

The milk bar and take-away counter were open. It's a light spacious area with room for buggies and wheelchairs. A ramp is available for ease of access. There are toilet facilities, including disabled access.

A display of cakes and pastries looked tempting, and there was a healthy salad bar along the counter. Customers on this chilly first morning all wanted hot cobs and warm drinks. Three Highway's Maintenance men came in for their lunch. They had been passing through from the A46 and looking out for a café. Sean the postman popped in for a bacon cob.

'It's just what the village needs, somewhere you can get something hot to eat,' he said.

A young assistant from Ratby Chemist came in for her lunch and a milk shake. Nowadays people are not tending to make their own packed lunches, so Café 27 will provide a much needed service for local workers. The café is also providing a packed lunch service for schoolchildren. Parents pushed for time can ring the night before and order the packs to pick up on the way to work and school. They will also offer delivering to local

The aim is for a village café atmosphere with proper coffee and teas. The seated café area is almost finished, and there'll be comfy seats, a cosy area and a children's corner for parents and young children calling by after dropping off older children at school

Older residents are not forgotten. There will be Senior Citizens specials. Gemma is promising good home-cooked food!



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Funding helps Ratby Sports Junior Football Club Grow the Game

Grassroots football in Ratby has been given a helping hand following a £5,000 Grow the Game grant, from the Football Foundation, the country's largest sports charity.

The grant will allow Ratby Sports Junior Football Club to further develop and invest in the future of the Club with new teams, coaches and improve the facilities for all.

Grow the Game funding increases participation in our national game by helping clubs to provide opportunities for new players,

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or training volunteers to support new players and teams.

The programme is delivered in partnership with all of the 46 County FAs and funded by The

So far Grow the Game has awarded 874 separate grants worth around £4.2m to grassroots football clubs. Analysis of the monitoring and evaluation so far predicts that this will result in the creation of 3,791 brand new football teams competing in FA-affiliated leagues, 72,872 new players participating each week and 10,959 new qualifications or courses being completed.

The key strength of Grow the Game is that its participation increases are sustainable rather than transient. Its grants create a solid infrastructure of teams and newly-trained coaches in which new people can start playing the sport, rather than simply providing temporary activity sessions, which are then vulnerable to drops in participation once the programme ends



RATBY PARISH COUNCIL

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - ANNUAL PARISH MEETING - 24TH APRIL 2013

This has been a busy year for the Parish Council and the village. You will recall that the Council coordinated the Jubilee Fun Day which involved many of the village groups and was a great success. The Council is currently organising a Coronation Carnival to be held on 27th May, together with many of the village groups and it is hoped that this will also be successful.

The village now has two thriving allotment sites, Pear Tree allotments in Desford Lane and the Taverner Drive site, both of which are leased to the Allotment Association.

The Council also provided an excellent skate park facility in Ferndale Park, with the support of various grants, i.e., Shires (Leicestershire County Council) Parish & Community Initiative Fund (HBBC), Harlow Timber, Markfield, Ratby & Groby Community Forum, Ratby Community Group. The remainder of funding was provided by the Parish Council.

This has proved to be very successful and feedback confirms that this is the best skate park in the county. However, this is slightly marred by the fact that a certain amount of vandalism has occurred on this facility, i.e., graffiti, some of which was extremely offensive. This has to be dealt with by professional graffiti removal experts. There have also been incidences of fire lighting on the area.

This was one of the most challenging projects ever tackled by the Council and hopefully this will provide many hours of enjoyment for the youth of the village.

Council was also involved in yet another appeal by Bloors to develop on green wedge land opposite Groby College. Both Ratby & Groby Parish Councils combined efforts to prevent this development and Borough Councillors and the Clerk gave evidence at the appeal. However, we have since been informed that Bloors have requested a Judicial Review in an attempt to overturn the Appeal decision.

The Parish Council also made several donations: Victim Support (Pride Alarms), Ratby Village Society, British Red Cross, Vitalise (Help & Support for local disabled people & carers). It also provided Diamond Jubilee commemorative medals for pre-school and primary school children. In addition, the Council has also purchased Coronation commemorative medals for these children, which will be distributed in due course.

Vandalism is still occurring in the village. The castle slide at Burroughs Recreation Ground had to be removed as it was badly damaged. Replacement of the equipment will be considered after the new lease is in place.

Swing seats at Ferndale Park have also been damaged. It appears that this has been caused by some dog owners allowing their dogs to bite the seats!



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Trees

- (a) To mark HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, the Council has planted a Cooper Beech at Jubilee Green. Stepping Stones awarded the Council a grant towards the cost. The brass plague. granite block and the new Jubilee Green signs were funded entirely by the Parish Council.
- (b) Bradgate Lions approached the Council and offered 140 trees. These have been planted among an already established copse on the Balance Pond Field. Planting took place earlier this week and it is hoped that these trees will be left to mature. Previous sapling planting was not left to mature, having been pulled up less than a week after planting.

Dog Waste - Litter

(a)Dog fouling is still a big problem in the village, despite numerous dog waste bins through the village. Articles have been put in both the Local & Wot by the Borough Councillors and the Parish Council asking dog owners to take responsibility for their animals and clear up after them.

(b) Litter - the litter, particularly in the parks is horrendous, despite valiant efforts by the Maintenance Man. There are now two extra litter bins located by the skate park in Ferndale, so there really is no excuse for dropping litter.

Our thanks go to the litter pickers who regularly 'pick' throughout the village.

Flower Tubs

Our thanks also go to those villagers, who plant and care for the tubs/planters throughout the village. This is done voluntarily and is much appreciated by the Parish Council.

Bench

Thanks must also be recorded to thee Knighton Trust who kindly donated a bench to the Council. This will be sited on Jubilee Green

Owl Seat

Olive Smalley

It is with great sadness that we report that Mrs Olive Smalley passed away on 8th April 2013. Her funeral took place at Mintlyn Crematorium, Kings Lynn on the 24th April.

In 1974 Olive M. Smalley was part of a group of four public spirited residents in Ratby who repaired part of a wall between Station Road and Desford Lane. As a result the Ratby improvement committee was formed, Olive becoming an active member.

At the A.G.M. on the 27th January 1976 the name was changed to the Ratby Village Society. Olive was voted on as the secretary and served as such and on the committee until she and her husband John moved to Heacham, Norfolk.

Olive carried with her the Village Society's aim of conserving the best aspects of the village and surrounding countryside whilst serving on the Parish Council during the 1980's. She chaired the Council for a period of time. Along with a group of like-minded people she helped establish practices for running the council, providing a firm foundation for later councils to build on. Her particular forte was in planning and letting the population know what was going on. She displayed a tenacious quality at a time when it was difficult to persuade the local

authorities to inform Parish Councils of pending planning applications.

She played a full part in village planning consultations and was diligent when attending public inquiries when undesirable developments threatened the village.

Her interest in Ratby did not fade after moving to Norfolk. A friend recalls her enquiring after the 'Coronation' cherry trees at the primary school which, in her capacity as a school governor, she had helped retain when the intention to fell them was expressed. One or two still adorn the playground.

Olive is survived by her husband John who also served on Ratby Parish Council as well as Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council for many years and two sons to whom we send our best wishes and commiserations.

ORCHARD PLANS

Members of Ratby Community Orchard Group recently spent time on site inspecting trees and determining future plans for the Orchard. Pruning has been undertaken, and it was decided to continue with this action. In some cases trees will receive more comprehensive pruning to help us to produce bigger apples, and in some cases to create clearer pathways through the site.

The group will arrange to meet with the Parish Council to discuss future developments. Regular working afternoons were put in place to ensure that necessary maintenance could be achieved.

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PRESTON CHICKEN CASSEROLE A delicious one pot meal!

Serves 4 Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil 1kg (2lb 3 ½ oz) chicken pieces (8, such as thighs, drumsticks.

1 onion finely sliced

2 garlic cloves, crushed

2 celery sticks, thickly sliced

2 carrots cut into 2cm (3/4") chunks

2 leeks, cut into 2cm chunks

600g (1lb 6oz) potatoes, peeled and cut into large chunks

1 level tablespoon plain flour 600ml (1 pint) hot chicken stock

2 rosemary sprigs Half a lemon

Method

- Heat oil in a large flameproof, lidded casserole. Season chicken pieces. Brown all over for 10 mins. Remove and set aside.
- 2. Drain fat from pan, return 1 tablespoon back to the pan.
- 3. Preheat oven to 200C, 180C fan oven/Gas 6
- Add vegetables to the pan, stirring for 5

 10 mins. Stir in flour. Cook for 2 min.
 Pour in stock. Season well.
- 5. Return chicken to pan. Add rosemary and squeeze over lemon juice. Drop lemon half into pan. Cover and bring to boil.
- 6. Transfer casserole to oven and cook for 30 40 minutes until chicken is cooked through and the sauce is piping hot and thickened.

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BE AN EGG-CELLENT GARDENER

Gardeners are being urged to take extra care this spring. The promise of warmer weather gets many of us thinking about trimming or removing garden greenery, but at the same time our feathered friends are busy building their nests, laying their eggs and munching their way through caterpillars and other pests. Although all nesting birds have legal protection under the Wildlife and Countryside Act from the moment they start building the nest until the young have fledged, it only takes a moment for a nest to be accidentally destroyed. Birds such as robins, sparrows and blackbirds are in decline and need all the help they can get, especially after a harsh winter.

Neil Pilcher from the Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust said, "We ask everyone to be careful as dense hedges such as Leylandii are good nesting sites, but any hedge, tree, shrub or ivy should be quickly checked just before starting work. If not doing the work themselves, householders should ask their contractor to check for nests too. If in doubt, the work should be postponed until the end of August when the breeding season is over."

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FLEXIBLE LEARNING CENTRE FUNDED BY DAVID WILSON LAYS FOUNDATIONS FOR FUTURE SUCCESS

David Wilson has given his backing to a new centre designed to help students develop basic construction skills at Groby Community College. The programme will be in partnership with Leicester College where expert teaching and progression routes at post 16 will help support those students wishing to access construction apprenticeships.

The new Flexible Learning Centre at Groby Community College will open in September 2013. Made possible by an £80,000 donation from the David Wilson Foundation, the new purpose-built Centre gives students the perfect opportunity to study the three main trades – bricklaying, plumbing and carpentry – in a realistic working environment with all of the tools and equipment linked to each trade available to them.

The centre will provide access to up to 50 students each year. Vocationally based courses delivered by the Centre include the City and Guilds Level 1 Introductory Certificate in Basic Construction Skills, with students taught by staff from Leicester College. In addition to Groby Community College students, the Centre is also used by Brookvale High School who share the campus with the college.

Endorsing the new Centre, David Wilson said: "A key aim of the David Wilson Foundation is to help young people acquire construction skills for their future. This new Construction Centre is the perfect example of that aspiration in action, giving young people an ideal introduction into the construction industry and the skills needed to succeed."

Commenting on the future success of the Centre, Sue Varnam, Groby Community College's Curriculum Leader for Flexible Learning said: "The grant from the David Wilson Foundation has given the students who need it most on our campus an exciting opportunity to follow a programme in construction, which will play a part in significantly engaging those students who find it hardest to secure proper progression routes at college and long term employment."

"Not only will students develop knowledge and understanding as they work towards their qualifications, but they will also gain skills that will prove invaluable in their future careers." Groby Community College's Principal, Robert Coles, said: "We are so very grateful to The David Wilson Foundation in helping to make this Construction Centre a reality. This opportunity will help some of our most vulnerable students gain a real insight into the world of work and will help to provide them with relevant skills which will support them in securing long term jobs and a prosperous future."
