Previously P.C. Moore has worked in city centre areas and he says he is enjoying the challenge of meeting new people and building up relationships as a community policeman.



## **KEEPING CHILDREN**

## press recently highlighting stranger danger following the horrific

murders of 3 young children in 5 days earlier this month.

Many parents living in large towns and cities are usually aware of the dangers of leaving prams and pushchairs outside shops, which normally make provisions for parents by

offering facilities such as floorspace for pushchairs etc.

Children living in a village such as Ratby are not exempt from these dangers, children as young as 6 and 7 years of age have been seen

wandering around Main Street after 6 o'clock totally unsupervised by

anyone, let alone a parent, oblivious to all sorts of dangers which could arise, i.e. abduction. In the same context, pushchairs have been left outside the local shops with the baby or child inside, whilst personal possessions such as purses, cheque books and child benefit books are taken inside. whilst it is very difficult trying to negotiate swivel wheels up 2 or 3 steps, it is not impossible, particularly with the help of the shopkeeper concerned who wants your custom, and are happy to oblige. Several expressed concern that parents do leave their pushchairs outside - they do not agree with this practice.

Whilst there are parents who are always aware of these and other related problems, unfortunately there are some that are not.

We need to educate ourselves to enable our children to learn to deal with danger WITHOUT FRIGHTENING THEM and to help them learn about their own personal safety without fear.

Ratby Library contains several books on these and other related topics; in addition there are several leaflets which can be obtained from the Crime Prevention Unit at Beaumont Leys Police station (tel. 530066).


Alternatively KIDSCAPE, a registered charity founded in 1984, devoted to the protection and safety of children, have recently published a booklet which has ideas about what children may need to know to stay



There has been much publicity in the safe from a variety of dangers, but these are kept low-key and nonsensational. The booklet is entitled "KEEP THEM SAFE" and is obtainable from this address (enclose a S.A.E.) Our

children have certain rights, and one of them is the right to be safe!

## Vandalism

The Council is concerned about the level of vandalism that has occurred during the summer. Much of the damage costs less than our minimum insurance cover, but altogether adds up to a considerable sum - money which comes out of Parish Funds - FROM YOU, the Community Charge payer. This means that everyone is having to pay for damage caused by a small minority. Some of these vandals are young children living in Ratby. Do you always know where your children are, and what they are doing?

### Wildflower Meadow

The Parish Council is intending to apply for a grant towards the cost of creating a wildflower meadow, following a successful meeting with representatives from Leicestershire Landmark Project

Following a positive response to our proposed scheme, published in the last issue of WOT, the Council has decided to put the plan into action immediately.

Dogs owners please note: Dogs should be on a lead through the area of play equipment, and owners are expected to clear up after them. Posts will be erected to mark a dog free area at Ferndale Drive Recreation Area.

### Borough Council Report

Councillor Fraser reported on Planning Issues, and told the Council that he would be fulfilling some of the duties of County Councillorr Mrs Pat Butler during her absence through illness.

Councillor Fraser expressed interest in being involved with the Council's discussions on youth issues.

### Allotments

### Bullocks Grazing

A local resident has expressed concern about a notice at the entrance to a footpath. The sign on the gate to Holywell Farm warns of bullocks grazing. This sign is intended only to alert walkers and remind them to close the gate. The bullocks are not dangerous.

## Under age drinking

This Council and other local people are concerned about the increasing numbers of very young people drinking alcohol. This is sometimes taking place in the village streets and play areas.

The police are obviously concerned. Local shopkeepers sometimes have problems identifying the age of young people, and in any case, older youths sometimes buy drink to share amongst a group.

Local schools, Brookvale High School and Groby College have education programmes to discourage alcohol drinking. BUT the ultimate responsibility lies with you, the parents. It should not be too difficult to discover whether your young children or students are involved, and prevent it from happening again.

## Flower and Music **FESTIVAL**


A lot of people worked hard on August 31st 1991 to ensure that the Ratby flower and Music Festival was a resounding success.


Village organisations such as the Womens Institute and British Legion as well as many individuals produced some striking floral displays in the Church, all on the theme of music.

## PEOPLE AND PLACES Cliff and Elsie Lissaman

The Lissamans were both born and brought up in Ratby, and both worked in the hosiery industry.

Elsie worked in the Wolsey factory on Stamford Street from leaving school. she was a'runner-on' for Bradley Moore. Working hours were from six in the morning to six at night, for 25 shillings a week.

She recalls that her fingers used to get red raw and that they all had a job keeping up with Bradley Moore and Wilf Marvin. Occasionally they would deliberately make a mistake so that they could stop for a rest! Joyce Bott, Norah Stubley, Carol and Diane Plane and Elsie all worked on the same lot together. Once, Lawson Moore, manager at the Wolsey leaned over to fix a machine and got his tie caught. The girls cut it off! Working there was like being part of one big happy family, and they enjoyed lots of laughs together.

Elsie's dad worked for "Shipman's", and in the summer holiday he and his workmates whitewashed the Wolsey factory walls.

Cliff's dad also worked at the Wolsey, and they lived just across the road.

For some years Cliff was very involved with the Working Men's Club. He was secretary there from 1948 - 1952, and again from 1957, continuing a family tradition. (His father was secretary before the war).



As secretary, Cliff was involved in organising club outings, such as the trip to Trentham Gardens (which featured in an earlier 'Wot') and the annual Christmas Dinner for the old people.

Cliff is also well known for his years as a Bosworth Borough Councillor. He feels that one of his greatest achievements was in representing villagers who were concerned about the dairy cattle being driven to milking along the Main Street. This stopped when a new farm-access route was created.

Cliff was also a member of Ratby Parish Council. Many people in the village still turn to him for help and advice.

Since their retirement, the Lissamans have finally found time for their own interests and hobbies. They are both involved in the Free Church in Kirby Muxloe, helping to run a Charity Shop, and Elsie enjoys making home-made wine. One of her favourites is traditional Burnet wine, made with Burnet picked from the fields.

But they must be most famous for their fuchias! Together with next door neighbours Tom and Joan Toon they have the most spectacular floral display in the village!

Both couples began 12 years ago, sharing cuttings of plants. Cliff's interest was started when a friend from Narborough, a fuschia specialist, gave him a standard fuschia. He has propagated or grown as many as 51 varieties. Tom and Joan have added Begonias to their display in recent years.

The Lissamans and Toons were neighbours in the old Ratby prefabs before moving next door to each other on Bradgate Drive!



A warm and sunny weekend saw the very first family camp at Willesley Scout Camp site near Ashby-de-la-Zouch.



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# **UP THE BRICKYARD**

Ratby would have seen that the village consisted of some 80 houses. cost of £68 13s 0d. The specifi-Mostly they were constructed of stone, clay, wattle and daub and thatch.

Before the middle of the 18th century perhaps the only brick built buildings were the Plough Inn and the building of Nook, Woodley and Church farms. Documentary evidence that exists makes no reference to brick making within the parish prior to 1774, when a disbursement is made Richard Kinton of Berrys Lane, to the Constable and Surveyor of higways for the building of a brick kiln on Ratby waste at a cost of 2 shillings and 6 pence. The location Thomas Johnson of Groby, carpenter of the site of this kiln is not known but from later evidence to be taken by William Herbert of Ratby presented, good sources of clay existed to the south of the parish Johnson of Cheapside Leicester ironon the lands betwen the present Church Farm Estate and lower Station Road.

The first substantial evidence for brickmaking comes from a reference in the Bradgate Estate records. Between 1848 and 1857 the Earl of Stamford was making improvements to several of the Estate farms and cottages in Ratby. An earlier article in Wot related to improvements at the Bulls Head formed part of the building improvements at this time.

Two hundred years ago a visitor to The 1849 reference refers to a kiln and drying shed to be built at a cations were drawn up by Thomas Rudkin of Groby who acted as agent for the Earl of Stamford for work of this type.

> The document also makes reference to other craftsmen who were employed either in to building of the kiln and the drying sheds are listed below.

Blacksmith £3 11s 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d. Wm Sills of Ratby, carpenter £1 0s 9d. Thomas Keen of Ratby, wheelwright £2 0s 5d. £9 8s 2d. Other works were underfor a clay mill, and to Thomas John monger and Silversmith for miscellaneous irons, nails etc.

The actual site of the original kiln is unknown but some 200 years later the same site was occupied by the Walker family who are described in the 1857 census as brickmakers. The site of the clay pits and brick kiln operated by the Walkers - later known as the brickyard is now occupied by the buildings of Centurion Court.



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
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

It was good to see, reported in WOT, that Councillor Mrs Butler had presented over 1300 signatures on a petition to the County Council in protest against the proposals by David Haynes to enlarge Ratby out of all recognition. This shows that the people of Ratby do not want this enormous development appended to our village but petitions carry far less weight than individual letters. We all know that there was a petition against the building of the Hall of Worship and we can all see the outcome in the monstrosity now dominating the entrance to the villaage. Appeals have been made to the Ombudsman whose office is making investigations to ascertain whether Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council was out of order in reversing their original decision of refusing Planing Permission. An official rebuke for 'Maladministration' may be the result. Had everyone who opposed the scheme written letters of protest at the outset the result may have been entirely different. The Senior Band have made many friends in Holland over the years and as a result we were able to organise a trip with the Junior Band of the O.N.D.A. Christelijke Brass Band from Middelburg.

Two coaches were needed to transport the players, families and supporters and approx. half stayed in a hotel and the other half stayed at the 'Slobberduin' Youth Hostel.

The first couple of hours on the Saturday afternoon were spent on the beach with the O.N.D.A. Junior Band organising games for everyone, then we returned to the Hostel to have a rehearsal with the O.N.D.A. Juniors as we were to perform together at a concert on the Sunday. The owner of the Hostel put on a splendid bar-b-que in the evening to make the perfect ending to a very long day after all the travelling.

On the Sunday morning, after another session on the beach, we were given an interesting talk by Mr Engel Westveer which covered the different types of cheeses of Holland, St. Nicholas and the Delta Plan - the plan to keep the sea out ! The finale to the show was a 'This Is YourLife' tribute to the Conductor of Ratby Junior Band, Geoff Newman.

On Monday everyone went to 'Efteling, a theme park, where the Junior Band played twice during the afternoon, but also had time to enjoy some of the many rides and attractions there. The last evening was spent with an impromptu disco and dance session and generally everyone was unwinding and exchanging addresses with their new Dutch friends.

We returned to Ratby on the Tuesday, very weary, but very proud that we had taken such a young, well behaved, Band abroad, representing Great Britain, and further cementing the friendship of the Ratby Band and the Brass Bands in Holland. We are looking forward to the O.N.D.A. Junior Band coming to Ratby next year.
