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

The long period of drought has had an impact on the village pond this year, and families who came along for the annual pond dipping on August 3rd were disappointed to find there was only a small patch of water. Neill Talbot from Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust was present again to help us identify our discoveries. He told us that the drought would have the most impact on damsel flies and mayflies. This year's new discovery was a goldfish, something we don't want in the pond as it will eat a lot of the wildlife. The goldfish was removed and taken to a garden pond. Please villagers. Do not dump domestic fish or pondweeds into this natural wild life pond, as it will destroy the environment.

25 Years Celebration

May I congratulate the WOT team, past and present, on their 25th anniversary. It is an achievement to be proud of and I wish them well for the future.

The realisation that the magazine is 25 years old did make me feel a little ancient since I well remember its beginning.

As members of the Parish Council at the time, Malcolm Hill and I produced a village news sheet to inform the parish of current council affairs. This was an A4 sheet, copies of which were left in local shops for the public to pick up. Although it was a good idea in principle, we were concerned that information was not getting to enough people.

On a day just over 25 years ago the Parish Council received a letter proposing a village magazine and asking we would be prepared to support it. The initial reaction was mixed - didn't we already produce a news sheet and didn't we have a duty to spend public money wisely? However it didn't take long to realise that this was an opportunity to obtain the circulation required without increasing costs. The magazine was likely to be more interesting and readable than the council news sheet Furthermore any profit that was made from advertising would benefit the local scout group and so it was agreed that this was a project to be supported.

I'm sorry to see that WOT does not carry a regular item from the Parish Council. This is a great opportunity to reach far more people than those who regularly attend meetings, or who would seek out and read the council minutes. Perhaps the editor could ask the council if they would be prepared to produce a small item for each WOT issue. I'm sure it would help promote interest in local affairs.

The WOT volunteers, from the editorial staff to the delivery team deserve a pat on the back for the sterling (and unpaid) work they have done over the years. When WOT first

their own (although we still have young people delivering newspapers) or perhaps it's because we're all busier than we were 25 years ago. Even so, it would be nice if more young people could be encouraged to help with the deliveries (just one round every two months). So if you are a Scout and don't deliver WOT - how's about it?





Over the last twenty-five years of 'Wot about Ratby' we have reported on a wide range of village






1st RATBY SCOUTS

It was the largest amount donated any by local group towards the purchase. 

RECIPE

Silver Celebration Syllabub Serves 4


Ingredients;

125g (4 oz) crushed ginger biscuits 50g (2 oz) pale brown sugar Juice of one lemon 2 tablespoons sweet sherry 2 tablespoons brandy 300ml (1/2 pint) whipping cream White of one egg

Method:

- 1. Whip cream with egg white until it holds its shape.
- 2. Combine remainder of ingredients and gently fold into the cream.
- 3. Divide between small individual dishes and chill.
- 4. Remove from fridge just before serving and decorate with chocolate shavings and/or glace cherry or slivers of stem or crystallised ginger.

In 2010 the Society was able to donate a substantial amount of money to the Great Central Railway plc, helping it to build a new café bistro at Quorn station.

The official opening ceremony on July 23rd this year was performed by Antiques Roadshow expert valuer Paul Atterbury, who also writes railway books.

GCR President Bill Ford introduced the local dignitaries, and Hoz introduced Paul Atterbury, who made a speech and cut the red ribbon to officially open the splendid forty six seater retrostyle Butler-Henderson café. Hoz handed over the keys, and Paul then ceremonially unlocked the door.

A RATBY CHILDHOOD Part One

My name is David Jones. I was born at 43 Station Road, Ratby on 9th July 1941. I lived there, along with my Mum, Dad and brother unti 1962, when we moved to a new house a little further up the road.

Number 43 was an end of terrace House with three bedrooms. Two bedrooms had fireplaces, rarely used unless someone was ill. shared the middle room with my brother Brian, six years older than me. He left home to do National Service in 1953.

The back bedroom was used by Granddad's brother Uncle Jack (Pickering). I remember he had a wooden leg. When he died was put into the cupboard in my bedroom. I use to be too scared to go into that cupboard, knowing it was there.

Downstairs were two rooms and a kitchen. The front room had a three piece suite, piano and sideboard. It was only used at weekends. The middle room had table, chairs and easy chair, and a chaise longue. There was a coal fired cooking range, a radio which ran off an accumulator, and gas mantle lamps in every

Our kitchen had a brown sink and cold water tap. In one corner was a brick and cast iron water boiler which was used on wash day and to fill our tin bath once a week. Outside we had a large wooden barrel for collecting rainwater for washing clothes. Next to that was large metal mangle with wooden rollers and a ZINC dolly tub with punch.

We had a coal house on the side of the house, and the coalman would drop the deliver in the yard, and my Dad and I would stack it all by hand into the store. Slack, the small bits of coal and dust would sometimes be mixed with vegetable peelings to bank the fire up at night, making the coal go further.

When I was very young we used to share the pan toilets which were in a block at the back
