Ratby Sports Club recently received the deeds to their property from the brewery. Mike Webber, Club Treasurer has sent us this interesting article.


The Earl of Stamford's Estates.

In 1875 The Right Honourable George Harry Grey, 7th Earl of Stamford and Warrington, owned large estates in Leicestershire, amounting to almost 6000 acres. They included Bradgate Park, and a Gas works in Groby, which for that time must demonstrate very up to date thinking! He also owned land in northwest Leicestershire, and received annual rents of £10,000 an enjoyable income.

Part of this land was 3 acres 1 rood and 20 perches of pasture that was to become Ratby cricket field. On January 2nd 1883 the Earl died. In a will dated 26th June 1875 he left his Leicestershire estates to his widow, Lady Katherine Henrietta Venetia Grey. The estate was to be managed by 3 trustees, and she would receive the profits and rents. In 1905 Katherine died, and for the next sixteen years the estate management continued.

Charles Toon

It is not entirely clear whether Mr Charles Toon was a cricketer or not. He was a 'beerhouse keeper' of The Railway Inn, Ratby, and sporting teams do seem to have connections with beerhouses. Be that as it may, it is certain that by 1921 cricket had been played in the village for many years, forty at least. On 10th September 1921, a piece of land known as 'The Cricket Field' was sold to Mr Charles Toon for just £300. At the time the land was rented by Mr Joseph Ball, farmer, presumably for grazing. Maybe Mr Toon thought that as he now owned the field he could keep the cows off the land and avoid clearing the field of cow dung ever again. Charles Toon died on January 16th 1926, leaving the land to his nephew, Sidney Marvin of 31 Stamford Street. Executors of the Will were his son Thomas, Blacksmith of Ratby, and Thomas Hutchinson of Kirby Muxloe.



The CO-OP Connection

Sadly, only three years later on 22nd February 1929 Sidney died, leaving no Will. It was not until thirteen years later that letters of administration were granted to Alice May Warden, daughter of Sidney Marvin, and wife of William Henry Warden. Thomas Hutchinson, sole remaining Trustee for the estate had to give permission, and it took a further five months before he signed the agreement.

Just eleven days after becoming the owner, Alice sold the land to George Glover, manager and secretary of the Ratby Co-operative Society for the splendid sum of £400. One of the Co-op Committee members was Mr H Warden, presumably a relative of Alice through marriage? Six months later George Glover sold the land to his employer, Ratby Co-op for £465, signing the conveyance as both seller, and buyer in his capacity as secretary of the Society.


Ratby Town Cricket Club Take Ownership By 1952 Ratby Town Cricket Club had been playing cricket on that field for nearly threequarters of a century, presumably paying rent all that time.

However, the Trustees of the Club, Lloyd Sutton, Henry Freeman, Clifford Prentice and Thomas Wilfred Shipman were very ambitious. After much discussion and fund raising the trustees were able to sign a conveyance transferring ownership of the field to Ratby Town Cricket Club for £550 on 24th June 1952. They were to be the sole owners for 30 years.

In the early eighties, the Trustees, now Clifford Prentice, Michael Shipman, Stuart Briggs and Ian McLeod decided they wanted to merge with Ratby Rovers Football Club to form Ratby Sports Club. New Trustees were required, and these were Michael and Ruth Shipman, Clifford Prentice and David Gowdridge

Ratby Town Cricket Club would cease to exist as a separate entity and so the ground was sold to the newly formed Ratby Sports Club for a nominal sum of $\pounds 1$.

The sale took place on 29th April 1983, the ownership of the cricket field passing to the Sports Club with whom it remains today






RATBY COMMUNITY ORCHARD GROUP

The varieties planted were Baker's Delicious and Beauty of Bedford. A first harvest is anticipated in four years!



We were given strips of wool to tie onto the trees where we judged pruning was needed, and then following advice and a check from Noreen the cuts were made.

The aim was to strengthen the trees and create healthy, easily accessible apple crops in the future. Damaged or diseased parts were removed, and one tree, which had, sadly, died, was replaced.



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


RATBY VILLAGE SOCIETY

VILLAGE APPRAISAL: WHERE ARE THE NEW FACES?

We thought we would attend the Village Appraisal meeting on 23rd January. The number of people there was around 30 out of approx. 4000 in the village. No one attended from any of the youth organisations (2 teenage boys came, instructed to come, we believe. They were not asked in the meeting what they would like in the village.)

No one came from the School, Chapel, and only Atul was there from any village shops.

So how can these things work if nobody is bothered to attend such meetings?

It wasn't what we thought it was going to be actually, just a talk given by a representative from the Rural Community Council to explain what we had to do for an appraisal. Of course it was the same people attending, it doesn't matter what goes on in the village, no new faces come along to help/organise anything. Just the same 'old' faces over and over again. These folk will be the ones doing everything yet again. Why does this keep happening?

We get no joy from scout's families; the Brownies are closing from lack of interest in running a pack.

There are so many new young couples and families in the village now, it would be good to see them help and come up with new ideas.

It was suggested we need a Youth Club. Why? We've had one before. No one wants to help run it, and it would probably be vandalised like the play areas. Perhaps the Police Constable could do more, but we hardly see him. If the younger people/teenagers DO want something, then they need to make their point, backed up by their parents, on the appraisal forms, which are meant to be circulating to every house in the future.

We don't really need much more in the village do we? There are so many varieties of shops, churches, pubs, and sports club.

Maybe we could have one or two more post boxes and phone boxes. I believe the youths would like a skateboard area. OK the traffic can be a problem, especially double deckers coming down Danehill. But if we had double yellow lines there would be nothing to slow cars down, and where would people park on Station Road?

On reflection we think our village has much to offer at present, but the youth organisations could do with much more parental support.

There are few things in life over which we can have any influence – we can't decide how much council tax we pay or set the rate of interest on our mortgages. So why, when there is an opportunity to have a say in what happens, do so few of us want to get involved? The general rule seems to be that we leave things to others and then say, "Oh we didn't want that" when the result is not quite what we would like! On the other hand, as soon as something is suggested that directly affects us we develop a

bad case of "Nimbyism" (Not In My Back Yard) and are prepared to go to any lengths to put a stop to it.

VILLAGE APPRAISAL AND PARISH PLAN

The proposal to carry out a village appraisal has moved on a stage as the steering group has decided there may be more benefits in



producing a Parish Plan. An appraisal will still form part of the project, when everyone in the village will be asked for their views, but the Plan gives more scope

for research into the concerns of the community and provides a better tool for planning for the future development of the village. The project has the full support of the Parish Council, which will act as the accountable body once funds are applied for. At the early meetings of the steering group

SKATEBOARDING



There are currently no dedicated facilities for young people in the village and this is one of the subjects that will be tackled in the village

appraisal. Approaches have been made to the Parish Council by two groups of enterprising youngsters who would like a skateboarding area. The Parish Council has started making enquiries about the viability of having such a facility in the village. These things cannot be organised overnight and there are several parts to our research at the present time.

The first is to find out the extent of interest in the scheme and a questionnaire was circulated for young people to sign. This has been returned with 72 names on it but it has to be said that a good many of the signatures are from Groby and Kirby Muxloe (which already has its own skateboarding area!). If there are people in Ratby who have not yet signed the petition, please call at the Parish Council office and add your name to the list. The other parts of the research are to do with cost of equipment, insurance and, most important, health and safety. We will report progress in the next issue of WOT!

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

There are only nine Parish Councillors. With the best will in the world there is only so much we can do. Several ideas have been mooted and abandoned due to lack of resources and there are three current projects that need other people to help them move forward. Following consultation the new proposal is for Ratby to be joined with Desford and Peckleton, which is considered to be a more satisfactory solution.

RATBY LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Our Last Meeting – This was on Friday March 22nd. Richard Gill presented us with a very interesting illus talk about Memorials of World War 1.

The early part of Richard's presentation covered man differing types of memorials located around the west front battlefields. We ended closer to home with a low the Lutyens example in Victoria Park Leicester, toget with other memorials in villages around Leicestershir Unfortunately, he did not have a shot of Ratby's own version.

We also heard from Arthur Stevenson about his resea the 1921 sale of the Bradgate Estate Farms located in around Ratby.

Neil Glenister, our local Archaeological Warden, disp and described a Roman roof tile to us, this has recently recovered by David Ramsey from a quarry location or nearby farmland.

Neil also reported on the recent finds of the fieldwalk group from fields near to Martinshaw Wood. A fragm Roman pottery was found, but still not yet any evidenthe Roman Road believed to have existed close to the village.

Neil then updated us on the recent important discover Charlie Toon of an early 14th century Papal Bulla, only second to be found in the Ratby parish. The other was found near to Holywell Farm during the early 1900's.
