It's been great to see more families coming along together, and we've been able to share in some baptisms, welcoming babies as the newest members to the Christian families.











#### THE 'COMET TRAIL'

Horace Gamble has sent in this photograph of the commemorative feature now in place at the start of Ratby's 'Comet Trail.'

The memorial was funded by the Leicestershire County Council Heritage Grant, Ratby Parish Counc and Everard's Brewery. It was designed by Hoz Gamble, and built by Cawrey Ltd.

The trail starts adjacent to The Railway Inn, which Hoz informs us was originally named 'The Whitwic Colliery Arms' from 1833, when it was built, until c. 1862 when it acquired its current name.

The plaque reads,

1832-1966. This bridleway, 'COMET TRAIL,' is formed on the track bed of the Leicester and Swannington Railway, the first steam operated railway in the Midlands, and was engineered by Robert Stephenson, whose father, George, drove the first train-through Ratby- on 17<sup>th</sup> July 1832, hauled I the locomotive 'COMET.'

The wrought iron track was carried on stone blocks. Two of the originals are here displayed.'

# "RATBY 2000"

The long awaited photographic history of the village was finally launched at the beginning of February. The specially bound books are the work of the millennium photographic project team, led by Councillor **Alan Withers**. The project started with the intention of recording events that took place in the village during 2000 but developed into a pictorial history of the village, covering its long and colourful past for "the first 2000 years". **Horace "Hoz" Gamble** 



has largely written the text, with contributions from local historians **Denis Green** and **Arthur Stevenson**. The huge

task of compiling and editing the book fell to **Keith Wevill**, who has moved to Bradford since the project started. The book is a beautiful record of the village and can be seen at the library or at the parish office. Congratulations to all concerned!

# WAR MEMORIAL



We have reported previously that work is needed to repair, clean and refurbish the War Memorial. Unfortunately, the last time this was done the cleaners used a solvent that has caused pitting in the surface of the angel. We have received notification that our

application for a grant to restore the memorial has been accepted and we understand that previous damage can be reversed. At the time of writing we have not yet heard how much money we have been allocated but the parish council has already set aside funds to match the funding we are given. Work should start soon.

# SWANNINGTON RAILWAY



A permanent feature is now in place to commemorate the railway that once passed through the village. To remind you of the history...

In 1829 a Bill was passed in Parliament for a railway to be built between Leicester and Swannington, to meet the increasing demand for coal deliveries in Leicester from the mines in the north of the county. The contract went to Robert Stephenson and the first train travelled the route on July 17<sup>th</sup> 1832, the first steam railway to be operated in the Midlands. The locomotive itself was the Comet, driven by George Stephenson, Robert's father. The railway was finally closed in 1966 and the trackbed is now the bridleway

between Ratby and Glenfield. The wrought iron track was carried on stone blocks and two of the originals form part of the commemorative feature. This project to provide the village with something to act as a reminder of the railway's history has been led by **Alan Withers** and **Hoz Gamble**, who also supplied the design – our thanks to both.

It was hoped to have the bridleway named "Comet Trail" with roundels along the trail explaining the history. To do this we need the agreement of Glenfield Parish Council as the path goes beyond our boundary but at present they are reluctant to use this or any other name. We are continuing to pursue this with them.


#### TRAFFIC & PARKING

**Traffic calming on all through-routes in the village** – The council has discussed the initial plans and the emergency services will now be asked to comment. Your turn will come soon – watch this space.




Parking in Church Lane, Chapel Lane and Berrys Lane – Again, the council approved the draft plans and we are waiting for the version that will be discussed with the residents who are affected by the suggestions.

Star Trak – We have been informed that we are to have one (possibly three) of the new style bus stops that supply computerised information as to when the next bus is coming.

There will be a public meeting to discuss the possible development of Ferndale recreation ground into a proper community park (e.g. seats, flower beds, new play equipment for the children). Part of the discussions will also centre on possible activities – such as the long awaited skatepark – and security.

The Parish Plan steering group will be issuing everyone a questionnaire, asking how you feel about different aspects of the village and asking what you would like to be changed or improved in the future.



Another public meeting will be held to discuss the traffic calming proposals.

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# RATBY LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Our January Meeting:- During the first half of the evening, Dennis Green took us on an imaginary journey through Ratby as it was back in the 1930's. We 'travelled' the length of the village from Big Brook (Rothley Brook) to the Groby Turnpike. On the way we called at Bill Pickering's Grocery, where fruit and vegetables would be left out on the pavement overnight without any fear of them being stolen. Across the road was Mrs Toon's Tripe Shop. Past the notorious Billiard Hall and on to Billy Burton's Barbers Shop where there was a choice of styles to be had, either short back and sides or a basin cut.

We learned about French onion sellers, all berets and bike clips, and of the ostlers walking through the village alongside their immaculate stallions. We also met up with Mrs Holloway and the Travelling Theatre and then went on to the Bulls Head where the landlord, Teddy Wallsgrove, welcomed the Quorn Hunt with a traditional stirrup cup. There were lots of other interesting stops and tales on the way all presented by our expert local raconteur and historian.

During the interval, there was an opportunity to view a marvellous collection of old photographs of Ratby people. A display of recent archaeological finds and a copy of the 1770 Enclosure Map, plus aerial photographs of Ratby in 1969 were also on show.

Doug Harwood then concluded the meeting with a talk during which he used information from the Enclosure act to describe aspects of Ratby's landscape just prior to its implementation in 1770. The locations of the former village gates and of surviving pre-enclosure hedges, roads and footways were outlined.

March Meeting (Friday 28<sup>th</sup>):- At the time of going to press, Richard Mackinder is due to speak about the Archaeology of Bosworth Field and Doug Harwood is to continue with information about the 1770 Enclosure Act.

More about this will appear in the next WOT!

Our Next Meeting – This will be held on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> May in the Village Hall at 7.30pm. The first part will be of our AGM, followed with a talk by on 'Episodes in a Village's History-Ratby', by Michael Ball.




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Several members of the 1<sup>st</sup> Ratby Cub Pack, with some parents and helpers, went on a day trip to the National Coal Mining Museum at Caphouse Colliery in West Yorkshire. The trip was organised by Ray Lander, and the 57-seat coach was filled to capacity.

The highlight of the day was a guided tour of the 135 metre deep underground workings. This involved a 750-metre journey along some of the 'roadways' of this now non-productive colliery. Some members of the group managed to crawl through the typical mine-working tunnels in which the miners of old spent their working lives. The museum also has lots of above ground displays depicting the mining industry from the late 18<sup>th</sup> century, and we found it interesting and enlightening.

The Museum is well worth a visit, and what's more, it is all free once you get there!





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# RECIPE HEREFORD APPLE CAKE

#### Ingredients

150g/6 oz raisins 100g/4 oz sultanas 50g/2 oz chopped mixed peel 2 tablespoons medium cider 225g/8 oz plain flour

 $\frac{1}{2}$  level teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 level teaspoon mixed spice

 $\frac{1}{2}$  level teaspoon cinnamon

 $\frac{1}{4}$  level teaspoon allspice

100g/4 oz margarine

150g/6 oz caster sugar

2 large eggs

225g/8 oz cooking apples, peeled and cored 25g/1 oz ground ginger or chopped stem ginger.

Grated rind of one lemon A few crushed sugar cubes

Well-greased 8" round cake tin Set oven to 170 C/325 F/ 160 C Fan/ GAS 3

#### Method

- 1. Soak raisins, sultanas, peel in cider for 1 hour
- 2. Sift flour with soda and spices
- 3. Cream fat and sugar
- 4. Beat in eggs, one at a time, following each one with a spoonful of flour.
- 5. Fold in remainder of flour.
- 6. Fold in coarsely grated apples, drained fruit, ginger and lemon rind
- 7. Turn into prepared tin, level the top, and sprinkle lightly with crushed sugar lumps
- 8. Bake in pre-heated oven for 10 minutes
- 9. Turn onto wire tray until cold
- 10. Wrap in foil for 48 hours before cutting.
