An exhibition of member's hobbies at the May meeting showed a varied range of interests, including tapestry, needlework, decoupage, watercolours, photography and literature, all executed with noteworthy skill and patience.

For the June meeting Mr Derek Smeathurst of Northampton gave the second part of his trilogy on the history of Postal Services, mainly featuring the role of the railways from 1840, when the first mail coaches were conveyed on flat wagons at 40mph, to the travelling post offices which sorted mail en route.

What could you do?


- Hold an apple related stall at the event


FORTNIGHTLY REFUSE COLLECTIONS

Ratby's domestic refuse collection is shortly to change to a fortnightly pattern and it is understood that many village residents are unhappy about this arrangement. Health hazards are clearly one of the prime concerns. Other points relate to the size of bins used in relation to household size, together with problems associated with folks missing a collection for one reason or another and then having to wait a further two weeks.

This change as implemented by Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council as part of their new waste handling and recycling scheme will eventually apply to the whole of the Council's area. We understand that residents in many other residential areas are also very concerned about the new arrangements.

A village petition against this change has been organised and this will be available for signing at most of the shops in Ratby until August 28th. This completed petition will then be duly presented to the Borough Council Mayor.



Grade 1 (999) Emergency response

Our First publication - No1 in a Series of Books on the History of Ratby is now available initially through contacting Doug Harwood - Tel No 2394168. Other points of sale are yet to be announced. The variety of contents of this 110 page vividly illustrated book deal with:- Ratby's Railways, Samual Deacon clockmaker and son of Ratby, Memories of Desford Lane Corner and The Village in 1770 on the eve of the Enclosure Act.

Our May Meeting – This took place on Friday May 21st 2004 in the Village Hall and the first part was in the form of our AGM. After this, Michael Ball gave a talk entitled 'The Tax Man Cometh', in which he began with a description of Ratby in the Plaque Year of 1349. We soon discovered that in the year of the first Poll Tax (1377), Ratby's population was 113 of whom 85 paid 4d per year tax. Everybody over 14 years old were eligible to pay. This was increased in 1381 to 12d for everyone over 15 years, a move that led to the Peasants Revolt. We also heard about the Hearth Taxes (1660/66), after which there was only time for a brief word on Window and Brick Taxes, plus a look at data and documents relating to other facts about the 17th century. Michael promised to continue the story next year.

- Use a spy hole to see who is calling.
- LOOK at the person carefully.
- Ask to see their IDENTITY examine the card/evidence carefully.
- If you are not sure ask them to come back, or call a neighbour to help.
- BEWARE OF MORE THAN ONE PERSON.
- If the caller says they are from the GAS. WATER or ELECTRICITY, ring the company to check before you let them in.

AN HONEST TRADER WILL NOT MIND IF YOU CHECK THEM OUT.

These people are cunning, they may be smartly dressed men or women, or children.

NEVER BE AFRAID OR ASHAMED TO TELL SOMEONE IF YOU ARE WORRIED ABOUT A CALLER WHO HAS VISITED YOU AT HOME.

IF IN DOUBT DON'T LET THEM IN. CALL THE POLICE.





RECIPE

HARVEST PASTIES

Shortcrust Pastry

6 oz /170 gr. plain flour 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz/42 gr. Lard 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz/42 gr. Firm margarine Cold water to mix Pinch of salt

Filling

2 tablespoons (2x15 ml.) oil 4 oz/113 gr. Diced carrots 4 oz/113 gr. Diced celery 4 oz/113 gr. Diced leek or onion 4 oz/113 gr. Peeled chopped tomatoes 1 teaspoon Marmite 1 teaspoon Worcester Sauce Salt and pepper 1 beaten egg

Method

- 1. Set oven to Gas 6/200C/400F
- 2. Make pastry and leave to cool
- 3. Heat oil and gently cook vegetables
- 4. Remove from heat, stir in Marmite, sauce, salt and pepper.
- 5. Leave to cool
- 6. Roll out pastry and cut into 4 rounds
- 7. Divide vegetable mixture between rounds
- 8. Brush edge of pastry with little beaten egg, and draw up the sides to centre. Press firmly to seal.
- 9. Place on baking tray. Glaze with egg.

Bake in centre of oven for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to Gas 5/190C/375F for a further 10-15 minutes until golden brown.


