RATBY PRE-SCHOOL




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RATBY CROW PIE CARNIVAL

It probably seems to have taken far too long to reach this point but we had to make sure the money was to hand before placing the order. So let's rejoice about what is happening now and look forward to what is coming soon.



Ferndale Community Park Group

It is with sadness that I must inform you that the Ferndale Community Park Group (FCPG) was dissolved at a meeting held in April.

Prior to the group being dissolved we received two hastily written letters from Ratby Parish Council (RPC). One being an apology and the other a letter of support, we are not sure why. The apology contained so many errors in its detail that it was deemed worthless. The letter of support was seen as unconvincing.

The FCPG has tried to convince the RPC that the plans, drawings and costings previously agreed to, are adhered to at all times. However, some members of the RPC seem to think that they are qualified to change every aspect that they come across. They clearly are not! It is this unnecessary interference that gives us no confidence that the RPC will deliver the park that was professionally designed at a cost of £15,000 and hence our decision to dissolve the group.

Did you know that some of our Parish Councillors live outside of our village, and don't always see things as we villagers do?

The ratepayers of this parish need to put some pressure on the RPC to complete this project to the professional plans, drawing and costs already agreed.

Phone, write, email and visit the council office and demand that this park be completed. For the second summer running the children of Ratby have no equipment to play on in Ferndale Park. This is unacceptable for a village of this size.



With your support we managed to raise over £600. This money has been handed to the council as a donation, for the specific use in the Community Garden aspect of the park. An area in the park for all to enjoy. The money will be held in the councils' accounts, for all to see. The account is accessible by the public on request.

The FCPG would like to thank all those who supported our events.

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RAY LANDER 1928 - 2006

We at 1st Ratby Scout Group are very sad to report that we have lost a fantastic member and friend Ray Lander.

He started scouting many years ago at St Barnabus Church with his wife Eileen. They were later involved at St Chad's, Coleman Road where, always ready to help out Ray would drive the van to camps.

In 1971 Ray set up a Scout Group in Ellistown, where he "acquired and did up" a hut for the group. Whilst doing that he also provided them with a mini bus. This is how Ray was, his whole life was for Scouts. The present Group Scout Leader said how much they thought of him, he couldn't find adequate words to describe what Ray had done for their group. Ray was definitely "the man" at Ellistown.

We all feel the same at Ratby. He was always at hand to help the group in every kind of way. He would do serious stuff, fun stuff, he would make fantastic games, creating all the equipment himself. He organised gang shows, his ideas were prolific and never ending. He taught boys and girls how to canoe (which was his thing) and also how to shoot rifles. Nothing was ever too much trouble for Ray.

Over the years Ray provided for the Ratby Group, 12 canoes, a mess tent and a container for storage. He spent many hours, "doing up" the hut in Martinshaw Woods for scout use, only to see it vandalised and burnt down.

People who knew Ray over the years in Scouting have all said the same, "what a super person he was, what an inspiration to the groups with which he was involved, always willing to help". A warden at Johns Lee Wood said, "he oozes with Scouting" it was so true.

During his long illness the Scouting Medal of Merit was arranged for Ray for his wonderful works to Scouting but unfortunately he passed away before it could be presented to him. The medal has now been passed onto his widow, Eileen.

We will be placing a plaque in Ray's memory in the Church Rooms, alongside that of another great Scouter, Trevor Sleath.

All in the 1st Ratby Scout Group will miss a genuine and dedicated man for everything he did for the children, leaders and group.


RATBY { SCHOOLCHILDREN'S WILLOW WONDER

VILLAGE SOCIETY NOTES

In May 26 members of the Village Society enjoyed a talk by Jacky Shepherd on 'Working with the National Trust'. Since retiring she has been a volunteer, mainly at Sudbury Hall in Derbyshire. Her time is spent variously, as a room steward, tour guide, in the shop or with the education team, as Sudbury houses the Museum of Childhood. The house is also famous for its staircase carving and plasterwork, every ceiling being different. Some of the slides showed the intricate detail and quality of this work.

Though involved with the more serious aspects of security, health and safety regulations etc., it was obvious that the job had many lighter moments. Jacky said that she enjoyed talking to people and answering questions. The information which she had learnt about the house was often added to by knowledgeable visitors. We were all amused by her statement that the item most often appearing in the 'Lost and Found' category was 'my wife'!

With its flexible hours, pleasant environment and stimulating company, this would seem to be an ideal job. The only drawback is distance. The two nearest N.T. houses are Calke Abbey and Sudbury Hall ; there are none in Leicestershire.

At our June meeting the talk was given by Fiona Ure. She is an ex-nurse who now works for the Leicester Museum Service as Assistant Keeper in the Home and Family Life section. She told us about 'Old-fashioned Remedies', through the ages, starting in the mediaeval period. At that time doctors dealt with the four bodily humours and treatment involved cauterisation with hot irons and blood-letting with leeches applied!

Many 'cures' were based on superstition as with laying a crooked sixpence on the gum for toothache, in the belief that the Devil cannot use crooked things. So we learnt the origin of the nursery rhyme 'There was a crooked man'. Herbal remedies were popular, with the

'wise woman' being a very respected member of the community, until the sixteenth century when many were accused of witchcraft. Apothecaries and barber-surgeons developed into the modern chemists and it was interesting to hear the history of Jesse Boot's shop which started as a herbalists in 1807 and was the first of a large empire.

Fiona brought with her many exhibits for us to handle, which led to much discussion as to their use and added to a fascinating evening. It was interesting to note that many old remedies such as herbalism and even maggots for wounds and leeches for swellings are enjoying a come-back in modern medicine. Perhaps there is something to be said for them after all.

Our next two meetings, on the second Tuesday of each

month, in the Village Hall at 8pm. are 15th. Aug. 'Smile please, Say Cheese!' 19th. Sept. 'British Hedgehog Preservation Society.

New members are always welcome.
