

APPLE DAY IN RATBY


Father Rufus and Father Joseph from Mount Saint Bernard's Abbey were the special guests for Apple Day at the Community Orchard on October 22nd. They had been invited to officially unveil the two new interpretation boards at the site.

The link with the Abbey was established a year ago, when the Orchard group was looking for local apple varieties. They discovered that the monk after whom it was named had propagated a 'St Ailred' apple at the Abbey. Sadly, there were no longer any trees of this variety at Mount Saint Bernard.

The group obtained two cuttings for propagation from the National Apple Collection at Brogdale in Kent. One of the young St Ailred trees was presented to the Abbey; the other planted in the Community Orchard. See page 2 for picture!

The unveiling of the Boards was the highlight of the event, which included apple tasting, freshly pressed apple juice, and a chance to try home made apple pies. The more adventurous could attempt to shoot the apple from Isaac Newton's head.





What remains a mystery is when the north porch was added. The main door of the majority of English churches is always on the south side. The south door at Ratby still exists, and may become the main





Update on our Traffic Petition

By the end of October, 700 signatures had been collected on the petition to ask the Leicestershire County Council to look at our traffic problems. This is with a view to having a form of traffic calming on the route to school along Groby Road and Main Street. The reluctance of some people to sign the petition, as they do not want traffic humps in the village, has been disappointing. We appreciate this concern but we repeat, at this stage nothing has even been discussed and the method of any agreed traffic calming is a long

way from being decided. The petition is merely a way of calling attention to some of the problems we have in the village and we feel that the safety of the children should be the first issue to be addressed.

We are continuing to ask for signatures and our target is 1,000 names, which will be about a quarter of the population in the village. The next stage is for Councillor Rob Fraser to take this to the appropriate committee at the County Council – the next meeting is 12th December.

Snippets...

- Our Member of Parliament the Rt. Hon. Stephen Dorrell MP has made two visits to the village in recent months. The first was to the Parish Council meeting in August and the second was to hold a surgery in September. We hope to see him again in the not too distant future.
- Mr Dorrell is investigating whether there can be a change in bus route to take villagers direct • from Ratby to Glenfield. He is waiting for a reply from the County Council and will also be in touch with the bus company. We will keep you informed of progress.
- At the time of writing, the plans for 51 Wimpey houses to be built on the Station Road site (garage, bus company and land behind) has not yet been discussed at the Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council planning committee.
- A POD may be arriving in Ratby watch out for the signs.....



RATBY CRIME UPDATE FROM PC228 VARNEY

In recent weeks there has been a marked upturn in offences of Burglary in Ratby. There have been reports from many locations throughout the village and, as a result, I would like to ask all of the village residents and businesses to raise their awareness to this crime.

On our part, you should have noticed an increased police presence in the village in an attempt to reduce the crimes committed. This has included targeting of suspects, and stop checks of vehicles travelling in and out of the village.


Clearly, since the clocks went back and the inclement weather has arrived, the days are progressively darker. This in turn naturally leads to us drawing our curtains earlier and being less likely to be pottering in the garden or out walking. As a result, the conditions become more suited to people who are up to no good or who do not want to be seen.

Another thing to bear in mind is we are now approaching Christmas and the more organised households may already have bought expensive presents for family and/or friends. Again these can be rich pickings for a burglar and force-wide historical figures prove that the amount of burglaries committed increases around the Christmas period.

I would ask that any suspicious people, vehicles or door-callers that you consider require immediate action are reported on 999. For less urgent reports, call the local police on Leicester (0116) 2222222. Or, alternatively leave your Beat Officer, PC 228 Varney a voicemail message on (0116) 2485675.

Anybody wishing to give anonymous information relating to a crime, is invited to ring CRIMESTOPPERS on freephone (0800) 555111. This number does not show up on your itemised telephone bill. You can remain anonymous and if your information leads to a conviction you may be entitled to a cash reward.

Overall, there is no need for undue concern. With sensible, common sense measures we can vastly reduce the opportunities available to these people. Please be reassured that burglary is Leicestershire Constabulary's top priority, and the net is closing in on those responsible.
