



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Parish Clerk

Residents of Ratby will have been aware that the Parish Council Office has not been open normally for some months due to the Clerk's extended period of illness. Business has been maintained as far as possible by opening on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings, staffed by the Chair, Merle Joyce and the Vice-Chair, Sue Neilson, assisted by other Councillors when required. This has not been an easy time for the Council but at the time of writing the Parish Council has advertised the post and applications are being received. The closing date is the 6th December 2004 and interviews will be held as soon as possible thereafter.

Allotments

More than 20 expressions of interest have been received from residents keen to rent an allotment. Meetings have been held and currently a group is engaged in setting up an allotment association. The intention is that the association will be open to anyone interested in gardening whether they have an allotment or not. For instance it will be possible to purchase cheaper seeds etc. through the association. Interested? Then contact the Parish Council office, leave your name, address and telephone number and Councillor Ken Hunnybun will contact you.

Ferndale Community Park Development Group

The meeting to have been held on 18th November 2004 was snowed off, but this will only briefly postpone the next stage of the development. The architect, Sarah Ashmead has now produced the details and costing for the first phase. This will include the main ground preparation, a re-sited toddlers area and the long awaited skate board area. The estimated cost for this is £45,000 and will be put out for tender as soon as the Development Group has given it the go ahead.

Ratby Parish Action Plan

It seems a long time since the Ratby Parish Action Plan was launched in June 2004 and you could be forgiven for thinking that nothing has been happening. Well nothing could be further from the truth. With the summer behind us a group, representative of a number of village organisations, met on 1st November, 2004. The meeting was given a review of the 24 Action points of which the first was this very meeting. It was agreed that The Ratby Action Plan Partnership (a suggested title) would provide an overview and promote procedures for setting up small, time-limited workshops with a specific brief to carry out particular actions. Membership of the workshops will only be for the period of its operation and it is intended that residents with appropriate skills, experience and enthusiasm will be recruited.

Not all action points need to be set up by the new 'partnership'. Some action is already underway i.e. The Ferndale Development Group, the Allotments Association and the Ratby Community Panel. There is no intention for the Partnership to 'take over' these groups but it will however be able to provide support and act as a link to these and any other village group, if required.

Marny is already planning some refurbishment, with the aim of creating 'a safe, happy, lively and friendly pub.' And they are hoping to encourage team activities, perhaps Skittles, Pool, cribbage or even dominoes.

Watch out for other new ideas too! Plans are afoot to establish a variety of live entertainment on Fridays, perhaps with comedians, and there are rumours of blues or jazz evenings.


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RATBY PRE-SCHOOL In the Church Rooms

Our Last Meeting - Mr Alan Reed came along on October 1st and gave a very entertaining and informative talk on the ways the Victorian Music Hall reflected social issues in the UK between 1850 and 1900.

Alan explained that Music Halls evolved after 1843 when the laws controlling drinking and smoking in public were relaxed. This led to concert halls being established alongside pubs and later to the introduction of purposebuilt music halls.

We listened to many old recordings of songs by famous artists of the day, many of which featured the variety of social problems prevalent within the 'working class' at the time; such as poverty, homelessness, unemployment and alcoholism etc.

The evening was enhanced by some spontaneous audience participation in many of the songs, culminating in a general sing-song at the end – a first for the History Group.

Our November Meeting - at the time of going to press, this is arranged for Friday November 26th Tony Squires will present "A New Appraisal of Charnwood Forest".

This will be followed by "The History of Geary's Bakery" by Charles Geary.

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

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NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Seasonal Warning: It is unfortunate that each year at this time someone's Christmas is spoilt when thieves make off with presents after these have been left visible in cars or within sight through windows at home.

Please take extra care this year, have a Happy Christmas and don't be a victim!

Wheelie Bins and Tools: Residents are asked to consider the use of wheelie bins as climbing aids, enabling criminals to gain access over fences and flat roofs etc.

Ladders and garden tools can also be used by criminals for this purpose.

Please take steps to ensure that bins are safely stored away out of sight at the rear of your property and that garden tools are locked away These simple steps may avoid you becoming a victim of crime.

Burglar Alarms:- Police are warning residents not to buy burglar alarms from door to door salesmen or telephone canvassers, even if told that these systems have Police approval. Reputable companies do not sell in this way. In some instances people have signed contracts costing thousands of pounds.

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COOKING WITH CHILDREN

There are many reasons why children should learn to cook. Cooking reinforces fundamental school lessons. Measuring ingredients and multiplying serving sizes is direct maths application. Reading recipes improves reading and understanding of language. Studying nutrition labels can be linked to health and health sciences.

'Porridge is a regular breakfast in my home,' says my neighbour, Jane. 'I never realised porridge is good for reducing cholesterol until Amanda told me.' Amanda, her nine year old daughter loves to help with the shopping, reading the labels and choosing meals and snacks.

Getting children interested in cooking isn't always easy. Activities such as computers and television compete for their leisure time. The key lies in making it interesting, allowing them to get on, dirty the kitchen and become engrossed in what they are doing.

Many children leave home when they are 16-18 years old, either to enter university, college or independent living. Cooking teaches children to have patience, manage their time and money. It can also be the right time to stress the importance of healthy eating. Children may have so much fun mixing a cake or chocolate chip cookies that they will forgo ready-made packets that may be filled with saturated fats and preservatives. Resourceful parents fully involve their children in the act of shopping, cooking and meal preparation which will allow them to realise how much work goes into putting a meal onto the table. Families juggle many activities these days, and mealtime offers the ideal opportunity for all to gather together. Making children an essential part in the process of cooking will teach them to be at home at cooking time, to rely less on parents, and to value the work that is involved in preparing a meal. Parents can benefit too by getting assistance in the kitchen, and having children around the dinner table

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RECIPE SIMPLE CURRY

Ingredients

 $\frac{3}{4}$ 1lb/340 gr. cooked lean meat

2 onions

2 cooking apples

2 oz/60 gr. Butter

2 level tablespoons curry powder

½ pint stock, according to the meat

1 tablespoon gooseberry jam or marmalade

1 tablespoon of chutney

1 tablespoon soft brown sugar

Juice of 1 lemon

1 oz. /30 gr. Sultanas or raisins

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt (optional)

6 oz. Patna rice

Method

- Heat the fat in a large, heavy frying pan
- 2. Slice the onions, and fry gently to soften but not brown, about 10 minutes with lid on pan.
- 3. Add curry powder and fry to absorb the fat.
- 4. Add peeled, chopped apples, fry gently until soft.
- Add stock and other ingredients
 (except rice +meat) and simmer for 20
 minutes. Use as it is or strain if
 preferred.
- 6. Remove skin, bone and gristle from cooked meat, cut into cubes.
- 7. Add meat to mixture and reheat thoroughly until boiling. Then pour into a casserole.
- 8. Serve with hot, cooked rice, and pieces of lemon and a variety of chutneys in separate dishes.
