It was a cold and wet Sunday afternoon but people both young and old still turned out to place a coin on the Tsunami Money Trail in Windmill Close.


Some came alone; some with family, friends, dogs and even men took time out from the big match on TV!

Once again members of Ratby Community Orchard Group have performed the traditional 'Wassailing' of the apple trees. The event took place on January 8<sup>th</sup>, being the Saturday between Epiphany and Plough Monday.

The group gathered for wassail songs at the Railway Inn, where they were joined by musicians from the Leicester Orphean Orchestra. The Orchestra has been in existence for 44 years, playing as a full concert orchestra, or a small group on a donation basis. usually to raise money for other causes. Members give their time for free. They will play at weddings and other functions too, for a donation,

The 'Wassail' musicians were Charlotte Rafaluk and Wesley Hawryliw (both of Ukrainian descent). Russell Leighton - Whyte and Helen Sullivan.

The musicians led the group as they sang and played their way to the Orchard, where the Wassail was performed using the traditional Wassail Bowl filled with mulled cider.





The initial subscription was set at £5 and will be reviewed when the allotments are available. The Parish Council welcomed this new development and agreed to donate £50 towards the initial administrative expenses. ## FERNDALE COMMUNITY PARK

The Parish Council adopted the recommendations of the Ferndale Park Development Group to accept a tender for Phase One of the Community Park from Willy Albans. This phase will lay out the basic ground works for the pathways and activity areas. The cost of this phase is £57,000. Grant aid has been received from a variety of sources to add to the £10,000 from the Parish Council Budget and £24,000 from housing developments in the village. Further grants are being sought and the Development Group will be arranging moneyraising events in which villagers will be able to participate. This will further enhance the possibility of getting grants.

The Parish Council thanked the Development Group and the architect Sarah Ashmead for achieving this position in such a short time. The group will welcome anyone who is interested to join them, particularly now that some practical work will soon be required.

#### A PLEA TO DOG OWNERS

The Parish Council has received numerous complaints about dog waste being left on footpaths around the village. This actually constitutes an offence for which there are heavy financial penalties.

The Council does not really want to take heavyhanded action and asks dog owners if they would please remove their dog's waste from the public areas in the village.

The Council is aware that the bins (10 more have been provided over the past 6 months) are not being emptied regularly, so an alternative contractor is being sought. In the meantime could you please use your own waste bin and not the general rubbish bins around the village?

#### **RATBY PARISH PLAN PARTNERSHIP**

The Ratby Parish Steering Group has now been constituted as the Ratby Parish Plan Steering Group in order to develop the Action Plan that resulted from the questionnaire completed by many residents in the village. The Partnership will work in conjunction with the Parish Council and all other village groups. Anyone is welcome to attend the meetings, and the Agenda for every meeting will be posted on the village Notice Boards. Minutes of the meetings will be lodged with Ratby Library.

Activities for village Youth were agreed to be a priority Action Point from the Parish Plan. Four young people attended and shared their concerns that there was nowhere for them to go in the village where they could meet their friends in a warm and friendly environment. Members agreed to investigate possibilities to provide a Youth Club.




### **CHRISTMAS CONCERT**

## **BISHOP TIM VISITS RATBY**



## EASTER TRADITIONS

#### **Pagan Origins**


The word Easter is thought to have evolved from Eostre, the name of an Anglo-Saxon goddess of fertility and springtime. The date of Easter is determined, like its pagan festival equivalent, by the lunar calendar.

#### The Easter Egg

Eggs have been associated with Easter celebrations since ancient times The egg was a symbol of fertility and new beginnings, and. Christians adopted this to represent the rebirth of Christ.

#### Painting eggs

This tradition goes back to the Middle Ages and is still an important custom for many Christians. In Germany it's traditional to paint eggs green and eat them on Maundy Thursday while in Greek and Slavic cultures eggs are dyed red as a symbol of the blood of Christ. Decorations became more elaborate with colourful patterns, images of animals and flowers.



#### Hot cross buns

Buns marked with a cross were eaten by the Saxons to honour their goddess Eostre - it is thought the bun represented the moon and the cross the moon's quarters. To Christians, the cross symbolises the crucifixion.

#### Simnel Cake

Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter, beginning on Ash Wednesday. For many Christians, this is a period of fasting and repentance in preparation for Easter., culminating in a feast of seasonal and symbolic foods. In the late 17th century, girls in service brought a rich fruit cake called Simnel cake home to their mothers on the fourth Sunday of Lent. The cake was enriched with marzipan and decorated with 11 marzipan balls representing the 12 apostles minus Judas, who betrayed Christ.

## **NEW LAW AFFECTS DOMESTIC ELECTRICAL INSTALLATION WORK**

As of 1<sup>st</sup> of January 2005 it is a LEGAL Requirement for electrical & non-electrical personnel carrying out domestic electrical installation work to comply with Part "P" of the building regulations. This affects everyone, al home owners. DIYer's, all tradesmen and all electricians

Electricians registered with a government authorised competent persons scheme (i.e. The NICEIC) can self certify their own work. an electrician or person is not registered then they must notify your local council BEFORE work commences and under go the relevant inspections which will entail a fee. (Similar to getting Planning Permission)

This New law covers all these things:

- Anv new circuits and Rewires.
- Fuse Box Upgrades
- \*New and alterations to Kitchen and Bathroom electrics
- New and alterations to garden electric's
- \*New and alterations to out buildings like garages, sheds and greenhouses.
- \* Electric heating systems including floor and ceiling heaters
- + Low Voltage lighting systems.
- Swimming Pools & Sauna's
- ·Very minor works (i.e. Changing a light fitting) are not covered by these new rules unless in one of the above areas. But work should still be tested and inspected fully with the proper test meters.

If the person installing electrics in your home is not registered then you must ask yourself the question why and are you going to risk a large fine and/or enforced re-work if they don't get council permission? Fines can be up to £5000 per non-compliance.

## RECIPE WATERCRESS SOUP

#### Ingredients

е		
	12 oz / 340 gr potatoes	
	1 medium sized leek	
	1 oz/28 gr butter	
	1 pint chicken stock	
	Salt and pepper	
lf	½ pint of milk	
٦	1 bunch of watercress	

## Method

- 1. Peel and cut potatoes into chunks
- 2. Wash and slice leek
- 3. Fry vegetables in butter for about 5 minutes to soften but not brown.
- 4. Add stock and simmer for 45 minutes with lid firmly on pan.
- 5. Remove from heat and stir in the milk.
- 6. Wash watercress and remove coarse ends of stalks. Chop.
- 7. Stir watercress into soup and season to taste.
- 8. Sieve or liquidise until smooth.
- 9. Serve hot with a swirl of cream in each bowl.
