## HAVE YOU SEEN THE SIGNS?

There have been many signs in Ratby recently, the most recent and exciting being the one at the junction of Main Street and Desford Lane announcing our place on the map! But there have been other signs which give me cause for concern and a sense of foreboding.

Have you noticed the signs concerning our village library?

- Repairs half completed in a very dilatory manner
- Book shelves disappearing with consequent loss of the books housed on them!
- Other village libraries 'on-line' whereas Ratby still has a manual booking system and no access to Fax or Computer links to other libraries.
- A recent list of opening times stated that Ratby library will be 'under review'

When I first came to Ratby 29 years ago the only library service we had was a visiting van once a fortnight, which was fine if subscribers were at home during the day, but no good to working folk. The staff were great, but 10 minutes to browse for books seemed to pass with the speed of lightening! We fought to get permanent shelving in the Welfare Hall and evening opening hours. After a campaign which seemed to be losing, when County Hall miscalculated the cost, our then MP, Adam Butler joined the fight and at last we saw the opening of our library at the very centre of our community.

The library is not just a source of reading materials, and if you think it is, you haven't visited recently. It is used for research and is an information centre for local and national events and places to visit. The elderly can come into a warm, friendly atmosphere. For many it's a chance for a chat and vital contact with others, and with our librarians everyone gets a good cheerful welcome.

Placed opposite the school it's ideal for adults and children to visit, and can provide an extra source of information when homework has to be completed. Books introduced at an early age are fun for both reader and listener!

So we're 'under review' are we? I've heard those words before and I leave you to guess what they will mean. Already one letter to Chief Librarian Mr Peter Oldroyd has received a promise of 'a service' for Ratby in the future. I wonder if this means a library van visit once a fortnight? that would be a retrograde step.

What about users without their own transport? Public transport does not take Ratby residents anywhere near other local libraries. Has anyone at County Hall looked at a map and linked it with bus timetables?

Not everyone in the village is 'on-line' and the updating of the library with computer facilities would help a good many. We pay our Community Charges, but what do we see for it? Is our contribution going to fit out other libraries whilst we in Ratby are the 'poor relations?'

Well, I guess it's like post offices; 'use it or lose it.' If you are a user think about taking out an extra book, and if you're not a ticket holder then become one-it's free! You never know, reading might prove to be fun and a great release from 'the goggle box', or even a user friendly alternative to the computer screen!

If you feel as strongly as I do, please write to Mr Oldroyd at County Hall and let him know you care. It's no good complaining when they're sending in the crane and low loader to remove the building. If they get to that stage I'll be on the roof. Anyone care to join me?

# Road Rage at Parish Meeting

#### Where were the police?

Traffic and vandalism in the churchyard were the main causes for concern at the Annual Parish Meeting held at the end of April.

The meeting is for the presentation of the yearly review from the Parish Council and this year we included an open discussion to identify problem areas in the village, in particular with regard to traffic. The aim was to identify areas where action is felt to be necessary and to hear from the police what is realistic in terms of what can be done to alleviate the problems.

However, despite a specific invitation and plenty of notice, there was no police representative at the meeting. This not only created a feeling of dissatisfaction but salt was rubbed into the wound with the knowledge that a high ranking police officer and the local MP had attended a similar discussion in Kirby Muxloe.

#### Traffic troubles

Traffic and parking are probably the most talked about issues in the village. Over the years the Parish Council have tackled the problems though discussions and site meetings with the relevant authorities. This has led to improved road signs and a spate of mini-roundabouts but, in the main, the solutions put in place have not been effective.

Local residents pointed out the areas where there are problems. There was general concern at the level of speeding through the village, especially around the bend in Main Street (near Freeman's the butchers). Several comments related to not being able to see to pull out of side roads because of vehicles parked at junctions and it was also noted that vehicles exceeding the 7.5-ton weight restriction could often be seen in the village.

Ideas for solving the problems ranged from speed bumps and traps to a complete one-way system though the village. The view was also expressed that an ongoing police presence in the village would do much to deter speeding and illegal parking.

### Is nothing sacred?

People attending the meeting were shocked to hear of the damage that is being done in the parish churchyard. Recently, a small marble cross on a child's grave was smashed and a mature tree had its bark stripped off, which means it will die.

There is an ongoing spate of petty damage, normally to gravestones or trees, plus a constant litter of vodka bottles, lager cans, cigarette packets and other rubbish, mainly in one particular area of the graveyard. Roller blading across the graves and climbing over the trees into the Garden of Remembrance has also been seen.

This is not a new problem and the police have been informed on several occasions. Again, there was frustration that the police were not at the meeting to comment.

Since the meeting, the Chairman of the Parish Council has taken the following action:

- He has met with our MP, Stephen
   Dorrell, and it has been agreed in
   principle that a further public meeting
   will be held, which Mr Dorrell will
   attend. This is likely to be in
   September.
- Our Borough and County
   Councillor, Rob Fraser has been made aware of the feelings of the people at the meeting. He will also attend the proposed Public Meeting.
- A letter has been sent to the **Chief Constable** asking for his comments

Many favourable comments have been received about the Ratby Millennium village sign, now a striking feature in the centre of the village. Changes have already been made. There is now a new signpost and the free car park sign has been moved so that the view of the sign is not spoiled in any way.

'Local Yokel' in your April issue may rest his case, but he stirs up many memories for this 'former local yokel' in his notes on the old Co-op.


I was born in 1907 in The Railway Inn. My parents were customers of the Co-op, Member No.195. I had to give the number when I did the shopping. I remember well some of names Yokel mentions, the Hirons, Suttons, Gearys and Greens.

A Freeman kept a greengrocers in Station Road. The newsagent was Worths, and nearby sweetshop, Grewcock.

Our schoolmaster was Mr Butler, headmaster, followed by Mr Baker who did service in the Middle East during the 1914-18 war.

I seem to remember the Post Office, not far up from the Co-op, was run by a lady whose name was Duncannon, or similar sounding. My family left Ratby and came here in 1922, so my memories are rather distant, but still hold a fond corner in my heart. I wonder if Mrs Foulds, who was not Mrs Foulds when I knew her remembers me?

# FIRST WORLD WAR MYSTERY

From late 1917, small, generally rail connected, explosive storage magazines were authorised by the government and built by the Midland Railway. A standard magazine was 319 feet by 108 feet, with two loading platforms, built of breeze block type material. A single track led to the site, where each of two roads held 15 trucks. The daily capacity being 7 full trucks and 3 empties. Magazine capacity was 2000 tons. Shunting was done by hand.'

Two such magazines were built at here, Ratby East and West. To avoid confusion the M.R. changed the names to Groby and Ratby. The finished works were inspected by Colonel Pringle of the Board of Trade on 14th August

1914, and subject to a small improvement to the trap-points, their use was sanctioned. The magazines were for sale on April 1st 1922. On 14th December 1922 the Midland Railway purchased for £800 sidings at Desford Junction that had been provided for magazine traffic.

### Nothing of them is shown on post-war Ordnance Survey maps, because they would have been dismantled.

So much for known facts, kindly supplied by Mr A E Overton, a railway historian from Nottingham. The exact sites have yet to be discovered.



### FROM TRAVELS TO TRAVAILS?

No stranger to RVS audiences is Mr Brian Jeffs, whose audio-visual presentations are always welcomed for their quality and professionalism. Two slide projectors ensure a fade-in-fade-out continuum, synchronised with a commentary and appropriate musical backing. Among the sequences shown at the March meeting were visits to Cornwall, Italy, France and Norway, followed by an offbeat 'Advertisements at Night'

Newly co-opted committee member Alison Emerson was prevailed upon to give the vote of thanks.

Seven members showed selections of their own slides at the April meeting. From the Isles of Man, Wight and Skye we went to the exotic Cook Islands, New Zealand and Australia. # RECIPE FRUIT and NUT MUESLI and FLAPJACKS

### MUESLI

### Ingredients

4 oz (113 gr.) oats

1 oz (28 gr.) bran

2 oz (57 gr.) chopped dates

2 oz (57 gr.) chopped apricots

3 oz (85 gr.) mixed nuts (almonds,

brazils, walnuts)

1 grated apple

### Method

- 1. Mix first five ingredients in a bowl
- 2. Leave covered in refrigerator overnight
- 3. Serve with milk for breakfast, with added apple.

This will keep for 2 weeks if covered in the refrigerator.

## FLAPJACKS

### **Ingredients**

4 oz (113 gr.) brown sugar

4 oz (113 gr.) hard margarine

1 tablespoon golden syrup

1 egg, beaten

#### Method

- 1. Melt together sugar, syrup and margarine
- 2. Pour on to Muesli (not with apple)
- 3. Add egg and mix
- 4. Spread into lined, buttered tin 11"x7"
- 5. Bake in oven at 180 C/350 F/Gas 4 for 20 minutes until golden brown
- 6. Cool for a few minutes then cut into bars.
