### WOLSEY

MORE ABOUT THIS LOCAL **BUSINESS FROM** Mr ERNEST HILL

I was an employee of Wolsey Ltd for 46 years. After the War I became manager of the Printing Dept., so dealt with all 16 Wolsey Factories in the British

Ratby, and King Street in Leicester were originally 'Sydney Tyler's hosiery Manufacturers,' later amalgamating with Walker Ltd, and all factories took the name of Wolsey.

Ratby made underwear and socks. Mr Lawson Moore was manager, he was an excellent boss, knew all his work force by their Christian names, and he took an interest in their well being. He was a popular man in the village, a Parish Councillor, and fondly known as 'The Lord Mayor of Ratby.'

Ratby had their own cricket team, as did my printing dept. Mr Moore arranged a match for one holiday. When we arrived we were welcomed by Ratby Brass Band and almost all of Ratby turned out to watch, a very festive occasion.

A Mr Fretter, mechanic at Wolsey Abbey Park Mills sometimes went to service machines at Ratby, I wonder if this could be the Mr Ferritti mentioned in the magazine?

In 1970 Wolsey was taken over by Courtaulds Ltd and several Wolsey factories closed

### What was £10 worth in 1931?

In 1931 the sum of £10 would pay for 2 people for a weeks holiday. Train fare to Yarmouth was £1and 5 shillings, with a shilling extra to book your seat, £2 for full board at a boarding house, £1 and 14 shillings to spend; a holiday for £5 each. This was when ice creams cost just one old penny

The best seats in the cinema were one shilling and sixpence, dances 2 shillings or half a crown. Wages averaged £2-5s to £3 for a 48-hour week.

A weeks groceries for two people would be about £1 to £1-5s. A rented house 7s-6d to 10s weekly. Not much left from one wage, but I think we enjoyed ourselves, perhaps more than people today when money is a little more plentiful.

Thank you for those fascinating details. Food for thought there, does an increase in money really buy us extra happiness, in a country where we work longer hours than the rest of Europe? Any views?



### 'WOT'S HAPPENING WITH RATBY PARISH CHURCH?'

The roof is finished! But inside it is a different story. The floor (which was taken up during the dry rot works) is to be relaid in June/July after the installation of new heating pipes and radiators. We will then have an empty church with bare plastered walls awaiting pews, chairs - and DECORATING!! This is where we hope the skilled people of Ratby will come in!

One recurring question over the past 2 years has been why local skilled people were not being given the opportunity to volunteer their time and help with the restoration work, as has happened in the past. In fact this was not possible, due to the scale and complexity of the task and the need for expert eradication of the dry rot. However, the essential redecoration work does now provide the opportunity for local involvement. So, anyone with experience of decorating at platform/ladder height is invited to form a decorating team during the late summer/autumn. This is your chance to be practically involved!

Even with the decorating complete, there is still the need to reinstall pews and furniture, construct an internal disabled access porch and deal with the halfblocked up South West window that has been sadly vandalised in the spring. Whilst informal use of the church may begin in September, formal reopening is still unfortunately quite a way off. There will, however, be an opportunity to view the empty floorless church on the afternoon of Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> June when we will be giving restricted access during our strawberry cream teas afternoon, starting at 3.00pm.

We have been awarded grants totally some £160,000 for the urgent repair works, but this does not cover items such as redecoration, which is why volunteer decorating help and support for fund-raising events (such as the vicarage evening Jazz Concert on 7<sup>th</sup> July) is crucial.

The senior citizens of the village seemed to enjoy it very much.



### REPORT OF ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The annual parish meeting was held at the village hall on April 24th and started with the Parish Council Chairman, Tony Daly, welcoming all those present and giving his report for the year ending in April. He reminded listeners of some of the activities and functions of the Parish Council, including support for local organisations. One of the things the council has concentrated on this year is traffic and parking (see separate report). Special mention was made of PC Reg Varney and how welcome it is to have a local policeman who is regularly seen patrolling the village. The crime figures reported for the year show that Ratby is in a better position than neighbouring villages with regard to the overall level of crime. Later in the meeting a presentation was made on behalf of the local Neighbourhood Watch, another organisation supported by the Parish Council.

It was pointed out that Ratby is earmarked for growth in the Borough Council future development plans. All planning applications are submitted to the Parish Council for comment and *every site* is visited before the Borough Council is given our recommendation. Unfortunately, the Borough Council do not always listen to our opinions and it was sad to see the garage, shop and carwash go, but at least the Parish Council were able to influence the final number of Wimpey houses to be built and preserve some of the wetland.

The advantage of the council having its own office was mentioned and particular thanks were given to the Clerk to the Council, Mrs Maureen Martin. She carries out her role in an excellent manner and we are lucky to have her. Thanks were also given to Simon Ingall, the maintenance worker who is responsible for the upkeep of the play equipment at Burroughs Road and Ferndale Drive.

### TRAFFIC AND PARKING

Traffic and parking was the main topic for discussion at last year's Annual Parish Meeting (2000). On reflection it quickly became obvious that the problems raised would not be easily solved, nor could they be tackled all at once.

In the last twelve months the subject has been much debated and the police have been consulted over the main problem areas. At the instigation of a local resident one particular course of action was a petition to request some form of traffic calming along Main Street, particularly round the bend leading to the Primary School. We are still awaiting the outcome, following its submission.

More recently concentration has been on the area of Church Lane, Chapel Lane and Berry's Lane and a survey was carried out to find out what residents thought about the problems and to get their ideas for possible solutions. The results of the survey formed the basis of a report that has been sent to the Leicestershire County Council, the Borough Council and the Highways Agency to see what action they are prepared to take.

### **COMING SOON**



**Youth Activities:** We are very aware that there is nothing for young people to do in the village and previous initiatives have, for various reasons, come to an end. It is important that we try and tackle this issue but in order to start something new we initially need two things — volunteers to help and a venue for young people to meet in. If you are interested in hearing more, in getting involved or know of premises where we could meet, please contact the Parish Council Office.



**Ratby on the Web:** Little progress is being made in preparing a website for the village due to lack of available time and willing volunteers. If anyone would like to get involved with this project please contact the Parish Council office.



**Swannington Railway Feature:** One of the earliest railways in the country went through Ratby, taking coal to Leicester from the mines in North West Leicestershire. Stephenson's Comet was the first train to travel the route, in 1832. This historical event is to be recognised with a special feature (incorporating old railway sleepers) at the sight of the track and the bridle path is to be renamed Comet Trail.



**Millennium Photograph Album:** This is a photo album with a difference as it charts the history of Ratby through word and pictures. Over 300 photographs were collected from which the final selections were made. The collection will soon be available for public viewing at the Library and the Parish Council Office and it will also be available on CD ROM.

### **FAR-FLUNG FALKLANDS**

There are one hundred islands in the group, most of which are uninhabited, and some with only sparse populations. They are so exposed and windswept that vegetation is poor and one sheep needs ten acres for adequate grazing.

The varieties of penguins, seals, sea lions and birds are amazing, and Mrs William's skill with a camera showed them off to great advantage. Considering the barren nature of some of the islands, there were some beautiful, if stunted flowers.

Altogether it was an evening of discovery and one of sheer delight.





I read with interest the letter on page 10 in issue 87. I served on the Parish Council as a co-opted member for a brief period a couple of years ago.

Members of the Planning sub-Committee of the Parish Council gave freely of their time to comment on various planning applications and they put in sterling work. But I cannot recall many... indeed any... occasions when the Borough Council did not overrule Parish Council objections to some important planning applications.

During my brief time on the Council I recall we had a Labour Councillor with a Labour Controlled Council, and I was never of the mind that he would fight for the best interests of the village. Maybe we have only ourselves to blame?

It's no surprise to me that the Borough Council has allowed the building of homes on the ground behind the, now defunct, garage. Either they have better information as regards the flood plain issue or they simply don't give a damn about the potential flood problems, the loss of the garage amenity to the village, the increased pressure on schooling and the extras traffic the estate will generate in that area.

The principle reason I resigned from the Parish Council was that I saw it as toothless, and with little hope of growing any. My time was too valuable to me to be continually fighting lost causes. But I applaud those who continue to try.



### RECIPÉ RHUBARB FLAN

### Ingredients

Flan Pastry

5oz (175 gr.) plain flour Pinch of salt 2 1/2 oz. (80 gr.) margarine 1 oz. (25 gr.) caster sugar 1 egg, beaten

### Filling

8 oz. (225 gr.) rhubarb 4 oz. (115 gr.) caster sugar 1 small egg 1/2 lemon Caster sugar dredge.

### Method

- Make pastry, saving small amount of egg to brush. Save trimmings
- 2. Line a 7" flan ring with pastry, easing carefully to line firmly. Brush with egg and chill.
- 3. Wash, dry and trim rhubarb. Cut into small dice.
- 4. Put 4 oz. Of caster sugar and small egg into bowl and beat well. Add grated rind and juice of lemon gradually, and mix well.
- 5. Add rhubarb, mixing thoroughly to coat with sugar mixture and pour into flan case
- 6. Use pastry trimmings to make a lattice on the top.
- 7. Dredge with caster sugar.
- 8. Bake in pre-heated oven, Gas MARK 6 or 200 C/400 F for 30 to 40 minutes until firm.
- 9. Cool for 5 minutes before removing the flan ring **SCRIVENER**
