


# REMEMBERING THE CORONATION

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


Julie Thomkins made two super cakes, which we enjoyed with a glass of sherry after the tea

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
#### SCOUT BALLOON RACE

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


# **Journey to the Reading Planet**

Living on earth is expensive, but it does include a free trip around the Sun every year

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
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## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

#### Re Proposed Development

Having recently been made aware of a proposed development in the village we are once again left asking the question, why?

WOT!!- More proposed plans for developing Pear Tree Farm, this time with up to 500 dwellings plus industrial units.


This village cannot cope with the increase in traffic; you only have to look at Main Street to substantiate this.



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# RATBY IN THE 1920's

Local history group member and artist, Arthur Stevenson, has recently completed a series of annotated drawings showing various aspects of Ratby in days gone by. One of these superb drawings is shown alongside.

The creation of this drawing was prompted by a 1909 coloured (or rather tinted) photograph of the village taken from the top of the Woodman Hill ridge from a viewpoint approximately behind the goalposts of the present day football pitch. Arthur was able to relate the photograph to his own collection of material and memories relating to our village, hence the start of the series.

Many of the buildings and features shown no longer exist or are now known by a different name. Careful study of the sketch will allow the reader to pick out up to 20 actual named buildings which have long since gone. See if you can identify which these are, the answers are given on page 11.

Also shown, are many interesting features, which will be covered during the third part of a guided walk around old Ratby. This walk starts from the Church South Door on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> June at 2.30pm. Places are limited to 25 persons, if you are interested please telephone 2394168.

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# WIRLYBONES WOOD


Take a walk along the Burroughs Road towards Old Hays and to the left as you reach the ford you will see a set of entrance gates to the new 'Wirlybones Wood'.

The sign alongside the entrance details this newly laid out landscape feature being created by Cawrey Ltd as part of the National Forest. Cawrey's have donated 6 hectares of land for community use and have been involved over the last few months with all of the various associated works. Around 11,000 native broadleaf trees have been planted on the site.

The name 'Wirlybones' is derived from the local name for the area where Burroughs Brook meanders close to the point where it joins the Holywell Brook. This spot is also referred to as 'Bonio' by some Ratby folk. One of our local historians suggests that Wirly relates to the old twisting and turning nature of the brook, although it seems that it does not meander nowadays to the extent that it used to. Also, buried bones may have been found there in days gone by.

The sketch plan alongside shows how the wood will finish up at completion during the summer months. A new path is shown for those who want to go along and enjoy this new woodland area. This path allows walkers another access route between Burroughs Road and the Holywell Track via the existing footbridge on the R44 footpath. There will also be a second permissive path and a bridle-way included in the scheme.

The wood will provide an ideal border and buffer feature to any future development of the village to the north and western areas of the parish.



The landscaping, designed and carried out by Greg Thurlow, includes two new bridges crossing over the Burroughs Brook, plus scrapes to the lower levels of the site. These scrapes will enhance the existing wet areas and encourage a rich marshy growth and form an ideal habitat for water birds and animals. A pond is to be created and deep pools are to be formed in the brook to cater for fish and amphibians.

There will be other features such as Raptor Posts for the likes of Hawks and Kestrels, plus cover for the large variety of small birds and mammals which will be attracted to the area. John Cawrey tells us that he has spotted Woodcock and Snipe already and the author saw a Hare ambling across the permissive path.

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
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## RATBY COMMUNITY ORCHARD

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# **NEWS UPDATES**

<u>Skateboarding</u> – Progress is slow as we have been let down by third parties who have not provided promised information. However, we are continuing to push this ahead and hope to have more news in the next edition of WOT!



<u>Traffic Calming</u> – It is many, many months since a petition was presented to Leicestershire County Council asking for some form of traffic calming on the school route approach along Groby Road and Main Street. We have now been informed that this has been accepted as a "reserve scheme" which does not make it a high priority, but we are hopeful that this will still be actioned this year.

<u>Parking Problems</u> – A survey was carried out in April 2001 among the residents of Church Lane, Chapel Lane and Berrys Lane, looking for ways in which parking could be improved and, specifically, how to ensure that emergency vehicles are always able to get through. We have finally heard from the County Council on this issue and a site visit is to be organised at which the problems can be looked at again. More news (hopefully) next issue...

<u>Parish Plan</u> – The next initiative of the steering group could be to build – with your help – a 3-D model of the village! This will give people the opportunity to really see what the village looks like now and to comment on what they would like to see happen in the future and what additional amenities they would like to have. At the time of going to press the group are booked to hear a presentation on this subject at the end of May.

## PEAR TREE FARM

Misinformation and rumour are always dangerous and often distressing. By now, there are probably several stories circulating about future development in the village so this is to set the record straight:

- Cawrey Limited, Building Contractors and Developers, have drawn up a draft proposal for future development in the village on the Pear Tree Farm land that John Cawrey owns.
- Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council and Leicestershire County Council are aware of the draft proposals but these are only at an early stage and it will be several months before the proposals are in a form that will be ready to be presented to the public. However, John Cawrey is happy for people to see the proposals in their current state and can be contacted at his office telephone 2390600.
- The Parish Council do not feel there is anything to be gained by having a public meeting at this stage as there are too many unanswerable questions and too much uncertainty over what will be the actual content of the final proposal.
- When the proposal is more defined the public will be given full opportunities to comment, including viewing the plans and attending a public meeting at which the proposal will be presented and views exchanged.
- The Parish Council is not taking a stand for or against the draft proposal at this time, as initial views are not unanimous and, again, we are waiting for the final proposal.
- We will keep you informed as the matter progresses.

# "HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?"

# GRASS CUTS AND CUTTINGS

There have been several complaints about the state of the grass cutting in the village. Apart from the land that is owned by the Parish Council, this is the responsibility of the Leicestershire County Council Highways Division. We contacted them to ask why the cut grass is not collected but left to die (which looks

a mess) and why the cuttings are often left on the pavement. The reply is that the grass is cut to Local Authority guidelines and there is no requirement to pick up the cut grass. However, they have agreed to an inspection to ensure that all the guidelines are being complied with.

# KEEPING RATBY TIDY

We were recently contacted by the Ratby Primary School Eco committee. As part of their Eco project they carried out a survey and reported that we need more litter and dog waste bins in the village. We responded by asking them to suggest locations for the new bins and they involved the whole school in checking and suggesting new locations – as you can imagine there were rather a lot! We are now involved in checking the locations and condition of existing bins, before we agree with the school where the new ones should go. We are then hoping to work with them to develop a campaign to encourage people to actually *use* the facilities that are there.

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# RECIPE MEAT LOAF

### Ingredients

8 oz (225 gr.) lean minced beef 4 oz (110 gr.) pork sausage meat 3 rashers of streaky bacon finely cut up 3 oz. (75 gr.) fresh breadcrumbs A little salt, pepper, grated nutmeg Chopped parsley Medium sized egg, beaten.

#### Method

- 1. Grease and line a 11b bread tin with greased greaseproof paper, overlapping the sides of the tin.
- Put beef, sausage meat and bacon into a large bowl with breadcrumbs and spices.
   Mix with a fork until evenly blended.
- Add sufficient beaten egg to thoroughly moisten the mixture and pack into the prepared tin. Press well down.
- 4. Cover completely with the overlapping paper.
- 5. Cover with foil, firming the edges to prevent excess moisture.
- 6. Place the tin into a baking tin with  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches of water, and place into a preheated oven, Gas 5/190 C/375F for 75 minutes. Can also be cooked by steaming for 3 hours.
- 7. Turn out when completely cold. Remove the paper and serve sliced with green salad, tomatoes and pickles.
