




WE ARE PROUD! 100th EDITION OF WOT and GROUP SCOUT LEADER COLIN PAYNE WINS A MEDAL


Our 1st Ratby Group was formed in 1984, with the first meeting held at the Church Rooms. Only a small group for a start, but word soon spread and numbers increased.

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RATBY VILLAGE SOCIETY

At the March Meeting member Mr Derek Seaton delivered a detailed, illustrated talk on the history of the properties, dating from about 1860 onwards, which line London Road, in Leicester. He began with the Old Toll House near Victoria Park and ended at the Stoneygate Tram Terminus.

The large, architect-designed villas were mainly occupied by families whose prominent heads were owners of manufacturing businesses, commercial enterprises, or were professional people. These included Thomas Cook, and Mr and Mrs Ezra Astill, formerly of Ratby, whose son Ewart was a first class cricket player for Leicestershire and England.

During the last fifty years or so many have been turned over to commercial use or demolished in favour of blocks of flats.


In its heyday London Road was said to be the second wealthiest road in Europe.

The Royal Mail

I t is not widely realised that services for the general delivery of mail did not commence until 1635, during the reign of Charles the First, when the Royal Mail was opened up to all- at least those who could afford it! Formerly it was for the use of the government only.

Mr Derek Smeathers from Northampton gave a most informative talk at the April meeting. In 1840 the standard rate of one penny for any distance was introduced. At first letters had been charged on the distance involved and the number of pages. Envelopes were not in use at this stage, and it was the recipient who paid the charge!


Letters were delivered by a man on horseback at an average speed of 1-1/2 miles an hour. This was increased to 10 mph when mail coaches were introduced in 1784, but these were shortlived, because by 1845 the faster railway trains secured a monopoly for carrying the mails. Research into the date of Ratby's first Post Office is still ongoing.




SCOUTS KEEP ON GOING UP

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

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GO FOR IT NEIGHBOURS

Two residents of Ratby, David Hulme and Chris Woodward, who just happen to be next door neighbours have each taken on separate adventure fundraising challenges this year.

Earlier this year, David decided that because of his experience with Prostate Cancer, he wanted to raise funds for a cancer related charity through an adventure activity. He is now beavering away on behalf of Cancer Research UK (registered charity number 1089464). He has been accepted to participate in one of the charity's 'Ultimate Challenges', the final part of which will see him in the Andes of Peru at the end of September. He will be with a group of fellow fundraisers and will be trekking for five days off the beaten track through the Andes and along the Sacred Valley alongside the Urabamba River. The route, between Cusco to Machu Picchu, reaches an altitude of around 4500 metres in places.

Several hundred people will be taking part in a series of challenges in different countries throughout 2003 and these are expected to raise over a million pounds for the charity.

David explained that his challenge is in three parts. First he has to raise at least £3,000 for the charity (he hopes to raise more). Then he is improving his walking fitness to a required standard through a personal training programme. Lastly, he will then take part in the exhausting five-day high altitude trek itself. Which for a 65 year old is not to be taken lightly!

As one of his fund raising activities, David's two daughters have produced a 'Towns & Cities' quiz sheet. Priced at £1 they can be obtained from Ratby's Alliance & Leicester Building Society. Also courtesy of the Rev. Richard Worsfold, David will have a Tombola-style prize stall at the Parish Church Garden Fete on June 28th.

Chris, who over the years has raised thousands of pounds for both local and national charities, is busy raising funds for 'UNISON's' 2003 Charity Appeal'.

One of 35 riders nationally he will be travelling to New Zealand's South Island in November to compete in a coast-to-coast mountain bike challenge.



Organised by UNISON Holiday Club in conjunction with UNISON Welfare the event will benefit three registered charities:

- UNISON Welfare (reg. Charity no. 1023552)
- Community H.E.A.R.T. (reg. Charity no. 10521817) and the
- National Deaf Children's Society (reg. No. 1016532).

Combining cycle training with his usual running; Chris said, "My route across South Island will involve covering an average of 58 kilometres a day over six days. There has not been any mention of the hills to date, but I know there must be a few. We have been spared going over the Southern Alps by bike, but the itinerary refers to a mountain road that's only open part of the year and New Zealand is famous for its undulating, albeit picturesque scenery! Why this challenge? For me it has to be the ultimate. Equally important is the fact that <u>every</u> penny raised will go to benefit children."

David and Chris are extremely grateful for the tremendous generosity that has been extended to them both in support of their respective causes including that from many local individuals and businesses. RATBY LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

March Meeting:- This was held on Friday 28th and during the first half of the evening we were enthralled with a latest digital technology presentation by Richard Mackinder on the subject of the Archaeology of Bosworth Field. Many aspects of the relatively small battle were dealt with, these included the subject of the logistics and support services required to get the armies to the area and then to keep them fed and watered. At the end of the presentation, we were left to ponder as to whether the recorded accounts relating to the battle are factual or not. In conclusion, it was really a question of 'watch this space'.

During the interval, there was an opportunity to view displays of photographs of Ratby people in the 1930's. A display of recent archaeological finds and a copy of the 1770 Enclosure Map, plus aerial photographs of Ratby in 1970 were also on show.

After the interval, Doug Harwood presented a case study of the Burrough Field in 1770. Maps and photographs were presented to show how the present landscape reflects the events of 230 years ago.

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





PARISH PLAN STEERING GROUP **PROGRESS REPORT**

The steering group consists of 25 active Ratby residents, with a smaller core group who have had more time to progress the work since the first meeting in February 2002.

The work is in two parts;

Parish Plan

The main feature of this is an appraisal that will be carried out by questionnaire. This project is supported by Hannah Ferguson from the Leicestershire and Rutland Community Council and financially by the Countryside Agency.

The group are now drafting the questions, using information gained by the Planning for Real project described below.

The questionnaire will be delivered to all residents, hopefully at the end of August, if drafts are received back in time from consultation with organisations such as Councils and the Police.

Offers of help to deliver and collect questionnaires welcomed.

The responses will be fed into a specially designed computer programme for analysis. Help with this also welcome.

The findings will be submitted to service providers and other relevant agencies to inform the future planning for Ratby.

Planning for Real

A second, but no less important exercise is Planning for Real, supported with funding and resources as well as practically by Nicole Ricard and the Leicestershire County Council Community Unit. Many villagers came to view the 3-Dimensional Map which was displayed in the Church from March 15th, and previously in Ratby School.

A total of 317 comment cards were placed on the map, many of which received approval or disapproval stickers from other villagers.



The comments have been sorted into topics. There were 121 responses on environmental themes, ranging from preserving the green environment to issues about waste bins.

93 cards were on transport issues such as bus services and traffic calming.

Problems with noise, drug misuse, policing and vandalism were the subject of 26 responses. There were only three references to housing, focussing on homes for the young or elderly.

There were requests for more services for older people, including chiropodists and hospital car service.

Village toilets and allotments featured in the 42 responses under the heading of local services. Other requests were for sports facilities, social security centre and community work space. Young people's needs were identified as a skateboard area and out of school clubs.

As you can see there were a wide range of concerns to be included in the questionnaire, creating a lot of work for the Steering Group! Help would be most welcome.



Ratby Parish Council TRAFFIC CALMING

As has been reported previously, draft plans for traffic calming have finally been drawn up. This follows a long campaign that included a residents petition and many months of us pestering the county council. The plans cover the whole of the village, on the understanding that slowing the traffic on one route would simply move the problem elsewhere. The draft plan also tackles the problems with the roundabout at Taverner Drive and the difficulties when exiting Chapel Lane into Station Road. Over the last few months, the parish council and the emergency services have been asked to comment.

We are now at the stage where we need your views!

Although the proposals will be welcomed by many we do recognise that not everyone will give their support - one resident has already said, "Oh, but that means I will have to slow down through the village" - but this is the opportunity for you to find out what is proposed and to make your views known. Join us at the public display of the plans that is to be held at the beginning of July, when representatives of the county council and the consultants who have devised the plans will be on hand to answer your questions. Watch out for the publicity telling you where and when this will take place ...

"HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?"

Ratby Parish Council LOCAL ELECTIONS



Thank you to everyone who voted in the borough and parish elections at the beginning of May - we understand that about one

third of people entitled to vote actually did so. The two newly elected borough councillors for the ward of Ratby, Bagworth & Thornton will have their work cut out in the months to come First of all, they are from opposing political parties, Chris Boothby for the Conservatives and Ken Hunnybun for Labour. Secondly, they

are both from Ratby, which means they will need to manage their constituency in such a way that the other two villages receive the same level of service, particularly in terms of accessibility to the councillors. Thirdly, both Chris and Ken have also been voted on to our parish council! We congratulate them on being elected and wish them both every success. To complete the picture, Rob Fraser continues in his role as County Councillor.

YOUR NEW PARISH COUNCIL

The newly elected parish council has made the following appointments. Elaine Moore has been re-elected unopposed as chairman and Atul Jobanputra, known to most people as the local sub-postmaster, has been appointed vice chairman. The Planning sub-committee is set up with Merle Joyce retaining her role as chairman, working with Laurance "Ozzie" O'Shea and new councillor Alan Blanchard. Similarly, there has been no change in the chairmanship of the Leisure & Recreation sub-committee with Ken Hunnybun staying in the post, now working with newly elected councillors Kathryn Lupton, Avril Sutton and Chris Boothby,

assisted by Atul and Alan when their other duties permit. The council already have many plans for the coming year but, in order to succeed, the overriding need is for the community to get involved...

But no politics here!

An aspect of the council that is vital to its success is that it is strictly non-political and this will continue, even though the opposing borough councillors are both now serving on the parish council - they have agreed to leave their politics at home where parish business is concerned!

Despite the best efforts of the council's publicity officer, many villagers are still not aware of what the parish council actually does. RE-CREATION OF THE RECREATION GROUNDS

We are hoping people will get involved in the development of the two recreation grounds at Ferndale Drive and Burroughs Road, now renamed community parks under new terminology!

The borough council has set aside £1 million solely for the development of parks in the borough. The parish council has already heard a presentation at to what is possible and we want to take advantage of the assistance and grant funding that is available. The first step is to organise a *public meeting* at which ideas for

development can be discussed. The long awaited skatepark also needs to be discussed with the public, from an environmental point of view (i.e. noise) and we should also think about security (such as CCTV), as the parks are where the majority of anti-social behaviour in the village takes place.

We are also about to carry out a review of all the existing play equipment, most of which is either in need of replacement or refurbishment, and this too will be a project for the current year.

It would be a shame if these projects collapse due to lack of support from the community. Look out for the notices informing you of a public meeting. Come along, hear more and get involved...

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Cancel milk and papers but don't do this in front of a shop full of people.


Ask a neighbour to make sure that your mail is pushed through the letterbox. Or for a charge, you can get the Post Office to hold your mail.

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RECIPE

LAMB with SWEETCORN

Ingredients

4 lamb chops, trimmed 450 gr (11b) potatoes, peeled and sliced 1 large onion, peeled and sliced 1 teaspoon mixed herbs $\frac{1}{4}$ pint stock 300 gr (11 oz) can of sweetcorn salt and pepper to taste

Method

- 1. Brown chops on both sides in a little fat and place in casserole dish
- 2. Brown slices of onion and potatoes and cover the chops
- 3. Cover with stock
- 4. Sprinkle over herbs, salt and pepper
- 5. Cover with lid or foil
- 6. Cook for $\frac{3}{4}$ hour in oven 175C/350F/Gas4
- 7. Add drained sweetcorn and cook for further 30 minutes.
