

By mid-October the heating system installation should be complete and the replacement floor should be down as well! This will finally allow the public access to the building again, in its empty and unfinished state. If you come and join us from the 21st October you will initially have to put up with plastic furniture, generously loaned from the recently closed Fosse Road Methodist Church! We are working towards reinstalling pews and purchasing comfortable matching chairs, but this will take some months.

Whilst a handful of residents kindly responded to the request for decorating help (see previous edition of WOT), there were not enough with the right qualifications to satisfy health and safety considerations, given the high level of scaffolding to be used. A professional team of decorators has therefore been smartening up the dustcovered plasterwork during September.

The church is holding a gift week in the week beginning Sunday 7th October as we seek to bridge the current shortfall of around £7,500. We shall then be giving people the opportunity to 'sponsor a chair or pew' as we work towards the internal layout of which plans are on display in the library.

It is 2 years since the launch of the '3 Steps to the Future' restoration

campaign and just 18 months since the building was closed. In that time, nearly a quarter of a million pounds has been raised to save the church. Whilst there is still a long way to go to complete the campaign, we now know at least that we have secured a watertight, warm and flexible building to serve the needs of the church and community for the next generation! Our thanks to all our supporters.

November is the best time of year for planting trees, the soil is still warm, and the dormant winter period allows them to develop a good root system.

If you are thinking about introducing a tree to your

garden, perhaps to provide shade, or as a visual feature, why not plant a fruit tree?


An apple, plum or pear, for example, will provide you with all year round interest. There is the blossom in spring, and the fruit to be harvested in the autumn. If you garden organically you will know there are no pesticide residues on your crop. Native fruit trees provide a wildlife haven for birds

and other creatures too.

Nowadays you can buy trees suitable for smaller gardens too, as well as varieties for training against a wall or fence.

And fruit trees are easier to grow than you might imagine. Contact the Orchard Group through the Parish Council for advice.

NAILING OUR COLOURS TO THE MAST!

Ratby Parish Council

The latest problem facing the village is the proposed installation of two satellite (cell phone) masts. Legally, there is nothing to stop the applicants from putting the masts wherever they want and the Council simply received "notices of intent" explaining that permitted rights were being exercised. We recognise that there is an increase in the use of mobile phones and that there are currently areas in the village where it is difficult to get a signal but the Council feels that the two locations chosen are inappropriate and a number of villagers agree.

The first proposal is for a mast 10 metres high

cabinet to be positioned on the highway verge

complete with antenna, dish and equipment

of Groby Road. Not only would this be visually intrusive but it is also on a direct school route. A petition signed by 106 residents has been sent to the Planning Department at Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council.

The second mast is to be 15 metres high (again with antenna, dish and equipment cabinet) to be located at Ena End House Paddock. (In order to see the announcement giving information about the application it was necessary to walk through nettles to see the notice pinned onto the back of a post!) A mast in this position would be completely unnatural as it is a woodland setting and, again, it would cause a visual intrusion. A petition with 114 signatures has been submitted to H&BBC.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO...

PETITION FOR TRAFFIC CALMING

This petition was signed by people who would like to see some form of traffic calming along Groby Road and Main Street, particularly around the bend approaching the school (coming from Groby). This was submitted to the County Council last December (!) and we are still awaiting a response... TRAFFIC AND PARKING SURVEY

Following the survey of all the parking problems in Church Lane, Chapel Lane and Berry's Lane a full report was submitted to the County Council in April. This has been acknowledged and is to be discussed at a forthcoming meeting...

HELP KEEP THE ROADS CLEAR: When visiting the village during the daytime, remember that you can park in the Sports Club car park.

PLANS TO MAKE THE VILLAGE MORE ATTRACTIVE

By the time you read this there should be stone planters at strategic points in the village, provided at a very reasonable cost by Alexandra Stone. There will be winter planting and plans are already afoot to make the village a very pretty place next summer...

RATBY VILLAGE SOCIETY FAMILY HISTORY

The traditional July Sunday afternoon outing this year attracted a record number of thirty participants. We travelled just over the border into Derbyshire to visit Melbourne Hall, a still occupied small stately home of charming proportions. It was the birthplace of William Lamb, a Prime Minister in Victoria's reign, who, as Lord Melbourne, gave his name to the city in Australia.

In the 17th century Thomas Coke employed royal gardeners to create a garden in the French style, with truthful. Those who gave details to the Registrar walks and vistas in geometric patterns, having many statues, but few flowers. The gardens have been restored in this style once again. One of the splendours is the delicate wrought iron arbour of 1708 for which its creator, Robert Bakewell became much in demand for his craftsmanship. Nearby is one of the finest examples of Norman Church in the country, which has fortunately undergone very little alteration since it was built in the 12th century.

RATBY NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

In three years Neighbourhood Watch has substantially increased its coverage of the village, passing on information about local criminal activity through co-ordinators to their street members. With the full support of the Police (and in particular our local beat bobby PC Varney) we have been able, among other things, to offer ideas on how to keep homes secure, and how to deal with unwelcome doorstep callers.

Neighbourhood Watch has also fostered awareness of the need to look out for our neighbours, especially those living alone.

Spreading the Word

However, in the firm belief that wider distribution of information must be beneficial, it is proposed that periodical Neighbourhood Watch Bulletins will be posted on notice boards and in some shops and pubs from September.

However, this is no substitute for your street being in a N.W. scheme with its own co-ordinator, and updates at regular meetings.

Dates of meetings are posted in Ratby Library. But the Bulletins will help to make information available to as many residents as possible.

RATBY CO-OPERATIVE BAND A LITTLE HISTORY

It is uncertain when Ratby Band was first formed. Until recently it was thought that the Band came into being in 1906, but recently discovered archive material suggests that a band existed in Ratby over one hundred years before that date.

Way back then band members could never have imagined the current successes. In the 1960s the rise to fame began with a climb from the fourth to Championship Section in just ten years. In more recent times Ratby Co-operative Band has been very successful, both at home and overseas. In 1988 the Band gained sponsorship from the Members Relations Department of The Co-operative Society, and a strong bond has developed. The Band Promotes the Society far and wide in exchange for solid support.

There are over one hundred Band members now, in various groups, and youth training remains an important priority.

RECIPE BAKED STUFFED LIVER

<u>Ingredients</u>

225gr (8oz) lamb's liver
75gr (3oz) streaky bacon
150ml (1/4 pint) chicken stock
Stuffing
75gr (3oz) breadcrumbs
1 small onion, chopped
1 large mushroom, skinned and chopped
1/4 tsp. Mixed herbs
1 tsp. Chopped parsley
Salt and pepper to taste
1 beaten egg

Method

- 1. Wash liver, cut into slices and toss in seasoned flour
- 2. Lay liver in greased baking tin
- 3. Mix stuffing ingredients and spread over liver
- 4. Place rashers of bacon over stuffing
- 5. Pour stock over
- 6. Cover completely with foil
- 7. Bake gently for 40 minutes in oven at 180 C/350F/ gas mark 4
- 8. Serve with jacket potatoes and baked jacket potatoes
