FAIRTRADE IN RATBY

What is Fairtrade?

Fairtrade differs from standard trade in five main ways. As a Christian organisation, committed to fairtrade, Traidcraft

- ✓ focuses on trading with poor and marginalized producer groups, helping them develop skills and sustainable livelihoods through the trading relationship;
- ✓ pays fair prices that cover the full cost of production and enable a living wage and other fair rewards to be earned by producers;
- ✓ provides credit when needed to allow orders to be fulfilled and pays premiums to be used to provide further benefits to producer communities;
- encourages the fair treatment of all workers, ensuring good conditions in the workplace and throughout the supply chain;
- ✓ aims to build up long-term relationships, rather than looking for short-term commercial advantage. What does that mean for me?

This Christmastime, be encouraged to spend your money in ways that help rather than exploit the poor. A selection of fairtrade goods is on sale at the back of the Parish Church each Sunday, and can be purchased on Saturday when the church is open. Alternatively, visit the JUST Fairtrade shop in town, 10 Bishop Street, just along from the Post Office on Town Hall Square for a wide range of fairtrade goods.



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

Ratby Parish Council TRAFFIC AND PARKING



There are some longstanding issues with regard to traffic and parking problems in the village. As mentioned in the last issue of WOT the September parish council meeting considered all these matters in some detail with Paul Gardner, representing Leicestershire County Council. The highlights are as follows:

Main Street - The widening of the pavements, improved crossing arrangements and new railings are all part of a programme to make it safer for children walking to school. In turn, it is hoped that once it has been made safer, it will encourage more parents to walk their children to school, rather than drive, as this will help parking problems at school opening and closing times.

Groby Road and Main Street approach to school - Continuing the safety theme, the request for some form of traffic calming has been accepted and it is now in the "reserve scheme" which means that it will happen this financial year if there is sufficient funding. If not, it will be carried forward to next year. There will be full consultation as to the actual form of traffic calming.

Chapel Lane, Church Lane, Berrys Lane - Detailed draft plans are being drawn up to alleviate the parking problems in these narrow streets. Again, full consultation will take place, in particular with the emergency services and, of course, the residents.

Weight restrictions - Many residents feel that the weight restriction in the village is often abused (not counting the local business vehicles). We have been advised that we need to record details of lorries breaking the rules - registration number, time and date, company name if possible - and report them to the Trading Standards office. If you want fewer lorries going through the village, please help by letting the parish office have details of lorries that you see.

Taverner Drive roundabout - It is acknowledged that this is more of a menace than a help at present and the county council are going to review this to see how it can be improved.

For a full list of the matters we discussed, why not look at the minutes of the meeting, which are at the Library for the public to see?

CLEAR YOUR WINDOWS!

Anyone who has replaced a window, installed a central heating boiler or had a conservatory built since April could be breaking the law! This rather alarming statement is due to new rules that require building

regulation approval from the Borough Council. Failure to get approval could lead to a fine of up to £5,000 plus the cost of altering the "improvements" to comply.

The new rules are intended to cut emissions and help meet environmental targets (set at the Kyoto summit). All new windows, predominantly glass doors and roof lights, will have more rigorous standards but replacing panes or parts of rotten frames is excluded. There are also new standards for conservatories, new central heating boilers and hot water tanks. Historic buildings and

conservation areas are exempt (but it may be worth checking with the borough council). There are two routes you can follow - the first is to use an approved firm who will also provide a certificate stating that the work is compliant. For windows, doors, etc, it is recommended that you use a firm that is a member of Fensa (the Fenestration Self-Assessment Scheme) and for heating use a member of Oftec (oil-fired), HETAS (solid fuel) or Corgi (gas). If you carry out the work yourself you need to get building regulations approval from the borough council. It is estimated that the new rules will add about £120 to the cost of windows but between £600 to £1,400 for a new house. Don't be tempted to cut costs by not gaining approval as when the property is sold the buyer's solicitor will ask to see the certificate!

Ratby Parish Council In the last issue of WOT we explained what the council does. Now meet... THE COUNCILLORS

ELAINE MOORE (Chairman and Publicity Officer): Elaine has lived in the village since 1986 but for many years business interests kept her away except at weekends. She gave up work in 1997 due to her health but prior to that her career in the financial services sector took her all over the world. She joined the council in 1999. She is also a classical singer and is married to John.

MERLE JOYCE (Vice Chairman and Planning Officer): Merle was born in Coalville and has lived in the village for 47 years. She married a local lad, Colin, and they have two sons and two grandchildren. Merle worked mainly in payroll during her working life and was finally persuaded to join the council in 1996. Well known in the village, she is also a Governor for Ratby Primary School.



KEN HUNNYBUN (Leisure & Recreation Officer): Ken moved to Ratby from Groby in 1996 and his two sons and their families live in nearby villages. Keen to get involved in the village, he was elected to the council in 2002. Most of his working life has been as a Youth Justice Manager for the county council. In his spare time he is a keen sailor and singer of sea songs and chanties (yes, this is spelt correctly).

LAURANCE "OZZY" O'SHEA (Member of planning sub-committee): Ozzy

moved to the village in 1988 and is married with four children between 15 and 25. He has been in the police force for 27 years and has been on the council since 1996. He has also been a school governor at Alderman Richard Hallam Primary School for 16 years. In contrast to all this, his interests include camping and caravanning.



ALAN WITHERS (Member of planning sub-committee): Alan is well known in the village, either from his walks or because he is taking photographs. A "postie" for many years, he has lived in the village since 1986 and joined the council five years ago. Apart from his role in planning Alan leads separate projects for the village, including the Swannington Railway Commemorative feature and the soon to be published Ratby Millennium Photographic record.

TONY DALY: Tony has been on the council for seven years and recently retired as chairman after a six-year period. He and his wife, Maria, have a smallholding and stables just outside the village, where they have lived for 18 years. He recently also retired from his own telecommunications business and has a family that includes six sons, four daughters and 13 grandchildren (the more the merrier!).



MICHAEL BALL: Michael is well known for his historical knowledge of the area and is proud of the fact he can trace his family associations with Ratby back to the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. RATBY VILLAGE SOCIETY

A return visit of Ken Day, that most imaginative of photographers, to the August meeting gave a detailed look at the beautiful city of Florence, with its marble clad Romanesque churches, and romantic, if somewhat austere looking stone castellated Moorish style Palaces. Her narrative, told with a delightful sense of humour, made the trip come alive for the enthralled audience.

RATBY CO-OPERATIVE BAND AUTUMN 2002



Our next big concert is our annual Celebration Concert, at Bosworth College on Saturday October 5th at 7.30 pm.





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RECIPE

APPLE and ORANGE CHUTNEY

Ingredients

1.80 kg cooking apples, washed and peeled 2 oranges, washed

450 gr. Raisins

450 gr. Onions

900 gr. Sugar

1 level teaspoon ground cloves

1 level teaspoon ground nutmeg

845 ml malt vinegar

Method

1. Halve the oranges and put juice to one side

2. Finally chop orange peel, apples, onions and raisins and put into large pan with 550 ml vinegar

3. Cook gently, covered, until ingredients are soft.

4. Dissolve sugar in remaining vinegar, then add to apple mixture with orange juice and spices.

5. Continue cooking over low heat until there is no excess liquid when wooden spoon is drawn across the base of the pan.

6. Pot while hot into warmed jars, filling each jar to the top.

7. Chutney improves with keeping, taste after 6-8 weeks.

Use vinegar proof tops, as metal will corrode.





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
