Did you know that Community Orchard Volunteers planted 21 dessert apples, 5 cooking apples and 6 other fruit or nut trees at the Orchard?





Apple Day was started by an organisation called Common Ground, with the aim of creating understanding and appreciation of English apples and orchards, and their place in our lives and landscape. The campaign sparked enthusiasm for regenerating old orchards, and planting new ones. Inspired by the success of the movement, a group of volunteers got together and established Ratby Community Orchard.

The first apple to ripen in the orchard is 'George Cave' in early to mid August...it should be eaten immediately! Apples for late harvest in mid October include 'Adam's Pearmain,' D'Arcy Spice,' and 'Rosemary Russet.'

RATBY VILLAGE SOCIETY


The annual Sunday afternoon outing took place on 18th July, with a visit to Holdenby House, gardens and Falconry Centre in Northamptonshire. The house, built in 1583, is not normally open to the public, but the gardens, picnic and flying display of birds of prey were enjoyed by members.

Society member and local historian Derek Seaton fascinated the audience at the August meeting with a detailed account of the history and architecture of that 'Victorian Jewel@ Leicester's Town Hall. commencing with its predecessor, the 14th Century Guild Hall. When built in the early 1870s, the Town Hall housed both the Police Station and Fire Station. The Fire Station owned no horses, and so when need arose one had to be commandeered from a passing cart!

The Square, with its replica of an Oporto fountain, was designed by the same architect Mr F.J.Hames.

The October meeting, on the 19th, will be the Village Quiz, from which proceeds are donated to the Rainbows Hospice Charity.

WASTE AND RECYCLING

Following a feature from a local resident in the last issue, Councillor Boothby has submitted a detailed response. Lack of space prevents us printing this in full, but here follows an edited version;

- Every household now has a Government-led duty to recycle as much as possible. By the end of October every household will have a brown bin for garden waste, blue box for glass/tin/bottles and bags for paper and clothing. By the end of November a cardboard and plastic monthly collection will be on trial. This will reduce the amount of rubbish in your wheelie bin.
- Families with 5 or more members are entitled to a 360 litre bin.
- Going back to a weekly collection with no recycling will cost £7million over 7 vears...a 36% rise in Council Tax!
- The Government charges £200 for every tonne of unsorted waste dumped in landfill.
- We are running out of landfill sites.
- The wheelie bins will protect rubbish from scavenging by wildlife.
- You can purchase an additional 240 litre bin for £50 a year, 70p a week, or upgrade to a 360 litre bin for £30 a year.

Editorial note:

According to campaign group Friends of the Earth (FOE), the UK only recycles around 14.5% of household waste. We are unlikely to meet the Government target of recycling or composting 1/4 of waste by 2005, and we are near the bottom of the EU League table. Countries such as Germany and Austria already recycle over 1/2 of household waste FOE says, 'The Government must provide more support and funding for councils, to ensure that every household has a comprehensive recycling scheme.

Did you know:

- The average household creates around a tonne of waste each year, and it's rising.
- Each of us throws away 7 times our own • body weight each year.

So, Ratby folk, we should all make an effort to recycle. After all, who wants to live on top of or next to a landfill site? If we carry on as we are, that


RATBY BROWNIES



WARTIME MEMORIES IN LEICESTERSHIRE LIBRARIES

Leicestershire County Council's Library Services are supporting the BBC WW2 People's War project by promoting it through a range of events and providing free internet access in all libraries for anyone who wishes to contribute their own memories. The People's War project is a website dedicated to capturing people's personal stories in a lasting archive to help future generations understand the sacrifices made by a nation during world war two.

You can contribute your own memories or a story that has been passed down through the family. If you know how to use a computer and have your own email address you can set up your own personal page on the website where you can write your stories. If you are not very confident with computers you can still contribute to the WW2 People's War project at your local library.

Stories can be about any aspect of World War Two. You might remember life as an evacuee, or taking part in the D-Day landings. You (or a member of your family) may have been in the armed forces, worked in a munitions factory or have memories of vour childhood in wartime. There are plenty of stories already on the site - you could read some of them for inspiration. The web address of the People's War site is www.bbc.co.uk/ww2. *****

The first event at Glenfield Library will be on September 15th. Ben Beazley, author of 'Leicester at War', will join our regular visitors to Browsers corner. The session will run from 10am to 11.30am. Everyone is welcome. Please come and share your stories and memorabilia with others.

Other events in libraries during the autumn will include story gathering sessions, with wartime memorabilia provided by museums; talks on 1940s costume, life in the land army, wartime local history; wartime recipe tasting; quizzes; family activity days; displays and People's War website internet sessions. Look out for details of events locally.
