

CHRISTMAS PAST

Village memories c 1910-1920, as told by Alf Hunt to Ratby History Group

Alf was born in Berrys Lane Ratby in 1904.

'I used to go with my mother to Leicester in a brake pulled by two horses, and because there were too many people inside I would sit on the top whatever the weather, along with my brother and friends. My mother used to shop at Leicester Market for lunch, which was usually a cockerel and a variety of vegetables. She made the Christmas pudding herself and put a silver threepenny piece in for the lucky one.

I remember we sang carols and had the Christmas stories at Chapel and school. I used to go Christmas sensing along with a few friends to Kirby Muxloe, to "the big houses." The "toffs" were more generous on Christmas Eve, possibly because they were quite happy after a few drinks. On one occasion me and my friends were invited inside to sing, and I remember they had a lovely big fire and it was very posh. The money we received was spent on chocolate from a machine on the wall at Ratby railway station.

When I first started working at the pit, aged 14, I remember on my first Christmas, walking home with a crowd of miners. They stopped at a Botcheston pub, (probably 'The Greyhound') and because I was too young I had to sit outside guarding the presents they were taking home for their families. I remember they came out of the pub very merry and sang carols all the way home I had two brothers and three sisters, and we each used to hang up a long stocking on Christmas Eve. On Christmas morning there would be an orange, an apple and some chocolate inside each one. We were never given toys as my Mum and Dad couldn't afford them. We didn't give each other presents either.

Sometimes we would visit our grandparents in Stamford Street on Christmas Day. I don't remember doing anything really special over the Christmas period. Boxing Day meant the left over cold meat to which they added pickles. The Quorn Hunt used to meet sometimes and we used to follow them up the Burroughs.

The LDF (Local Development Framework) certainly got a few people stirred up. So much so that HBBC decided they needed to make a special presentation in the village on the day before their travelling exhibition arrived at the library. The presentation was duly made immediately before the October parish council meeting. Judging by the numbers of people who had enquired in the parish office the council booked a larger room for its meeting and advertised the HBBC presentation throughout the village. Sadly only five people heard the clear explanation of the consultation process, the content of the various documents, and the likely affect on Ratby. It is to be hoped that more interest will be expressed in the Village Design Statement which starts shortly with a village meeting and results in a document which is an adjunct to the LDF etc. **Grounds Maintenance**

The most high profile item of business for the council at present is preparing to go out to tender for grounds maintenance, both *mowing and tree work*, for which a specification is being prepared. All your contributions to this process

will be appreciated even though they may not appear in the final specification. *This council chooses to act on the basis of available knowledge*, so share yours with the Clerk by mid-November please. Our thanks to the three people who have already contributed. **Reduction in Disturbance**

Our thanks go also to PC Justin Hayes and his colleagues for the reduction in drink related disturbance in the village. Please continue to be vigilant and report any drink or drug related incidents to the police on 222 2222 (ext 0344) including as much detail as you can. 
RATBY LOCAL HISTORY GROUP


Dear Editor, 'Mill Drive Post Box'





Annual Parish Meeting

The Local Government Act 1972 decrees that every English Parish must have an annual parish meeting between 1 March and 1 June. A parish meeting is <u>not</u> a meeting of the parish council it is a meeting of the local government electors for the whole parish – where will we find a room large enough to hold such an event?

A parish meeting may discuss and pass resolutions on the public activities and policies of any local authority, public body, government department or public service <u>provided that they</u> affect the parish specifically.

If the parish has a parish council then the Clerk to that council will assemble the agenda which must be published up to 28 days (depending on the nature of the discussions) before the meeting.

The annual Ratby parish meeting will be held on Wednesday 23rd April 2008. Notice of the agenda will be posted on Wednesday 26th March 2008.

Ratby Rates

The parish council has agreed to ask for a precept of £93,000 for the forthcoming year 2008/2009; this is an increase of just 28.61p per elector for the year.

SPEED HUMPS!

Complaints about these have hit the National Press, with those in Mere Road, Highfields, Leicester making it onto the list of 10 worst!

Roy Holloway writes;

Drivers, especially bus drivers, who are complaining of neck pain, are getting more frustrated with speed humps. According to research by an on-line car buying guide an overwhelming majority of motorists want to see them removed. The survey concluded that they result in an annual repair cost of £235 per car. 1 in 8 cars suffer suspension damage that can be directly attributed to speed humps. (figures from Warranty Direct)

The government claims that for every mile an hour cut from driver's speeds, the chance of an accident drops by 5%. However in Barnet the local council removed all speed humps and recorded 14.9% drop in accidents in the following first 6 months.

Is it not time that these humps were removed, and a 20 mph speed limit imposed in the village?

What do you think? Would motorists obey a 20 mph limit? We have heard complaints about the large number of road signs cluttering up the village entry routes. Have we gone too far? Editor.
