
And all of this was in aid of the Church's chosen charity, **Gift of Sight.** £510.20 was raised.

What better way to prepare for the real meaning of Christmas?



Hello!!! My name is Jamie Trusler. I am 16 years old, and I live in Ratby. I have been in St John Ambulance for 4 years, and am Leicestershire, Northamptonshire and Rutland District Cadet of the year 2014. I'm also a Sergeant and Trainer. I have trained 500 people in Basic First Aid in 1 day, which was nationally recognised. I have been invited to the Young Achievers Reception with Her Royal Highness Princess Anne next year.

This summer myself and 25,000 young people aged 16 to 17 years of age graduated from the National Citizen Service. The first week was residential, where participants are placed in localised groups with people you've never met before! Throughout the week you complete

team building exercises such as canoeing, raft build, abseiling and climbing.

The 3rd and 4th weeks were the heart of the project. Groups go out to the local community and make a difference, whether it be painting a local park, or raising funds for charities! My Social Action Project was at Warning Zone, a Leicester charity whose objective is to teach young people in year 6 important skills, car, fire and railway safety and cyber bullying awareness. Warning Zone has great potential, a view shared with the Mayor of Leicester. Our job was to promote the awareness of this charity and raise money for it! We promoted it on the Leicestershire Constabulary Twitter page, as well as ITV and BBC News.

100 people were selected to be National Ambassadors for the National Citizen Service, 0.04% of the 25,000 graduates, that's 0.001% of 16 to 17 year olds across the entire country!

I visited the House of Commons where I met the Minister of Civil Service and many MP's. After this I was one of 10 who were selected to visit 10 Downing Street. We toured the building and had a huge three hour debate with the Prime Minister's spokesmen and the Minister of Civil Service.

The photo is of me outside 10 Downing Street, as you can see, I was a little excited! We also met many great people, members of the NCS Trust, MPs, Ministers, Lily Cole, and of course the other 99 National Ambassadors!

Now my job is to change that horrible stereotype of young people today. It's a big task, but I'm determined to make a difference!

If I were to ask you this question: "What do you think of young people today?" You'll probably say 'anti social, criminal and violent.' (As did many people I asked at the village Craft Fair)

I want to change attitudes so that when you see a group of young people you don't cross the road to avoid them!

I have spoken to members of the Ratby Village Society and they are willing to invite young people to help them organize the next village fete, so that both generations can work together, and learn from each other! I need to now find a group of willing 16-17 year olds who will help me change the media stereotype.

In the centre of the room were displayed the paintings and art work submitted by local creative people.




