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GOODBYE JULIE and THANK YOU!

'Julie's Hairdressing' was one of the first businesses in the village to advertise in Wot about Ratby, and it has featured in every issue since number 1. Julie tells us that customers, especially people new to the village, have come in after seeing the advert in 'Wot.' So it was especially sad for us to learn of Julie's imminent retirement. And fitting too that we celebrate her support for the village over all the years.

Julie opened the Ratby salon in 1972, and when the premises came up for sale in 1984 she bought them. She refurbished and extended the salon and has run the business successfully ever since. Apparently the cottage was built on four large boulders, which were revealed when work was done on the floors. Pictures on the salon walls reveal that it has a similar business for many years. In 1910 it was a Barbers.

Having trained in Lancashire, Julie moved down to Leicestershire with her family, and she has been transforming women's hair for fifty years. Michelle has worked with her for twenty six of those years, since leaving school, and can't imagine what she'll do without Julie.

'I'll miss it,' says Julie, 'but I've been thinking about it for a while, and finally made up my mind. I've enjoyed meeting people, working with Michelle. We have a laugh. In the early years,' she says, there was a stronger sense of community in the village. All sorts of folk used to pop their head round the door just to sav hello.'

(In fact someone did just that during our interview!)

'Customers came down from 'The Wolsey' on Saturday mornings and we all had a chat and a ioke.'

Julie recalls the customers expected from Cardinal Brooch on Station Road, who rang at Christmas to say 'We're just having a drink, be up in a bit.'

As well as the salon, Julie and Michelle have made home visits to elderly customers who can no longer get out.

Don't worry if you are one of Julie's clients. She tells us that she will still be in business until the premises are sold! But we hope for her sake it won't be too

long.

Many of Julie's clients have been coming since she opened, and are now in their 80s and 90s. Mainly women, but she and Michelle occasionally cut client's husband's hair. And people come from not just Ratby, but surrounding villages too. Julie intends to enjoy more holidays and find

time for her hobby of Cross-stitch. She would like to thank all of her customers for their lovalty over the years. 'I'll miss them,' she

And we thank her for her support of this magazine, and wish her a happy and healthy, much deserved retirement.

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WASSAIL!

On Saturday 11th January 2014 members of the Ratby Orchard Group were joined by the Ratby Cooperative Band, friends and guests to enact the ancient rite of Wassail at the Community Orchard, Jubilee Green, Taverner Drive. Wassail is an ancient southern England ritual that is now becoming a tradition here in Ratby. The purpose of Wassailing is to awaken the apple trees and to scare away evil spirits to ensure a good harvest of fruit in the autumn.

Yes it sounds a little strange I know, and my family nodded sympathetically when I explained what happened. What do you think? The event started with a gathering at the Railway Inn on Station Road. (Originally the ticket office of the Ratby Railway Station on the Leicester to Swannington Line). The wassailers then processed to the orchard behind the Wassail King, Steve Boud. Shouts of Wassail from the King received shouts of Wassail and the banging, blowing or rattling a variety of instruments by the assembly.

Once in the Orchard a circle was formed around a designated tree and the King recited the toast to the tree.

Here's to thee old apple tree. That blooms well, bears well. Hats full, caps full, three bushel bags

An' all under one tree. Hurrah! Hurrah!

This was followed by the singing of two wassail songs, Gloucester Wassail and the Farmer's Anthem, accompanied by members of the Ratby Band. Mulled cider was then passed around in a sycamore wood wassail bowl. Each drinker shouting wassail and flanked by sentries who turn their backs to the drinker. All present then joined i the shouts of 'Wassail'. The final act was to place pieces of toast in the trees and to fire a shotgun to wake the trees up. No! of course we didn't have a shotgun, but some extremely good replicas of a Winchester Rifle made by Alan Sims. The shots? Well these were a party popper fixed to the barrel and a number of Christmas Cracker snaps tied to the finger guard. The mulled cider was finished off and an orderly retreat made for a few more drinks at the Railway Inn. All agreed that it had been a lo

Members of the Group have carefully tended the Orchard since it was planted 10 years ago. This harvest is open to Ratby residents to pick when the fruit has ripened.

A board with information regarding each tree and when the apples are ripe enough to pick, is situated in the orchard. The committee wish to thank the members of the Ratby Co-operative Band for their support and all the 'wassailers' for attending.

The Ratby Local History Group committee is delighted that the tradition is being kept up and Michael Ball commented that one of his ancestors when arrested for discharging a firearm in the village, claimed in his defence that he was celebrating Wassail.

February 12th 'Health Matters in the Community.'


March 12th 'The Work of a Magistrate.' April 9th 'Leicester's Prefabs/Village Cinemas.'

Thank you to those groups and individuals who did support the venture.



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
VALENTINE PEPPERMINT CREAMS

Ingredients for 350gr /12 oz creams

- One egg white
- 12 heaped tablespoons icing sugar
- Few drops peppermint essence

Method

- 1. Whisk egg white until just frothy
- 2. Beat in 10 Tbs. icing sugar
- 3. Beat in peppermint essence and remaining sugar.
- 4. Sprinkle a little sifted icing sugar onto a board and roll out the mixture to 1 cm thick
- 5. Cut into shapes using a heart shaped cutter if you have one. Leave overnight to harden
- 6. If they are a gift for someone special wrap in cellophane and tie with ribbon, or layer in a pretty box lined with tissue paper or similar.
