Ratby's Annual Show was held on Saturday August 10th at Ratby Sports Club. Once again it was a great community event, supported by folk of all ages. There were all the expected entries, from splendid garden produce, tempting cookery exhibits to home made wine. We particularly liked the children's miniature gardens. Rebekah Garratt won first prize for her garden, which was complete with pond and decking, and her brother George took second place with a 'children's garden' featuring a tyre swing and football net. There were some lovely floral displays, especially the exquisite fuchsia and some unusual handicrafts. The exhibits were displayed on the new tables, purchased by the Village Society with Lottery funding. These, together with new display boards can be borrowed by other village groups. Village Society Chairwoman, Faye Stephens said that participants had come from further afield this year, and she was pleased with the wider variety of entries, including a larger cookery section. The ladies on the tea stall reckoned they had been busier than ever. There was a cricket match between Ratby Town and Ibstock Town taking place too, so visitors to the show could sit in the sun and enjoy the match with a welcome drink.

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A GRANDMA'S DREAM COME TRUE

Mrs Eileen Berry, of Groby Road, mother of Julie Smith who owns Oaklands Riding School had held one last dream. She wanted to see her granddaughter Emily compete at The Horse of The Year Show. Julie's Daughter Lottie had achieved this in 2009, aged 14, when she rode with the Atherstone Hunt Pony Club Team on her liver-chestnut 13.1 hands mare Karenzer. The mare had been bought for her by Eileen in 2008.

Lottie has now lent Karenzer to her cousin Emily, and the pair have made Eileen's dream come true. They will be competing at this year's Horse of the Year show from Wednesday 9th October to Sunday 13th October.

Sadly Eileen passed away in July after being diagnosed with cancer in May. But the family feel that she will be there with them as she always has been. Despite not liking horses Eileen had always supported her grandchildren every step of the way, going with them to watch every competition and event at the Pony Club. She would have been justifiably proud to know that Emily will follow in Lottie's and Karenzer's 'Hoofprints.'

Julie has worked with Emily at Oaklands Riding School to help her to prepare for competition. The Atherstone Hunt Pony Club has done well to consistently gain a place in the show. They have had to compete against 374 other clubs through a round of competitions and championships in their local area and nationally.

The Pony Club Mounted Games were devised to promote team competition, requiring courage, determination and all round ability, together with the careful systematic training of their ponies. The Games are devised to produce a spectacular competition with 'ordinary children on ordinary ponies' as Prince Philip originally envisaged.

His sudden death was a great shock and upset to many, and it was sad to see the premises standing empty. And then along came local hair stylist Marie Taylor. She had worked part time at 'Kreative Look' in the village, as well as making time to transform the hair of patients at Glenfield hospital. Seeing an opportunity in her home village she slipped a note through the door of 'His and Hers.' Tony's brother contacted her. Both he and Tony's partner were keen for the salon to be reopened. And so it was that she found herself embarking on her new business, joined by Julie, a former colleague.

Marie has created a thriving business, and the salon is always busy. The team are soon to be joined by Cathekine who will take on new clients. Amy, who helped with shampooing and other tasks is now off to University. Some changes had to be made. Men now have to make an appointment as the salon is so busy, and Insurance issues mean that clients

can no longer be collected in a private vehicle. But this has not affected progress. It remains a friendly, reasonably priced salon. Many clients come as a result of recommendations. And many of the original customers have come

back after an initial reluctance due to the memories of Tony's time there. Traditional styling and sets are still available,

as well as all the modern styles, perms and colouring.

Marie started working as a Saturday girl at her local salon when she was just fourteen, and after leaving school she trained at Southfields College in Leicester. She says that she enjoyed the hospital work, as it was great to be able to help the patients to feel better, although it was tinged with sadness when people she had got to know well passed away.

'You can make a difference to people's lives,' she says.

Marie would love a larger salon, but for the moment she is happy to continue building the business.

She says she kept the salon name 'His and Hers' because 'It says what it is,' and because continued with the advertisement in 'Wot about Ratby; 'Because it goes through every door in the village and brings in new customers.' 'His and Hers' is open on weekdays from 9 until 5, (closed Wednesday) and on Saturdays from 8 until 12 noon. New clients welcomed!

Skills were carried out in all aspects of camp craft, navigation and team work.




The activities were canoeing, mountain biking, rock climbing, followed by an expedition around Windermere culminating in the conquering of Scafell Pike, the highest mountain in England.

This pineapple flavoured apple is another of the Orchard favourites. A russet variety, it was developed from Golden Pippin and introduced b Williams Nursery of Pitmaston, Worcester in the 19th Century.

Sweet and aromatic, it tends to be a biennial fruiter and heavy cropper, ready for picking late September to October.

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A perfect Autumn cake. Works well with cooking apples such as Keswick Codlin or Lord Derby from the Community Orchard. Try eating it for pudding with clotted cream!

Ingredients

- 225g butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
- 450g cooking apples
- Finely grated zest and juice 1 lemon
- 225g caster sugar, plus extra for dredging
- 3 large eggs
- 225g self-raising flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 25g ground almonds
- 1 tbsp demerara sugar

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/fan160°C/gas 4. Grease a deep 23-24cm spring-form cake tin and line with baking paper. Peel, core and cut the apples into 1cm pieces, and toss with the lemon juice.

2. Using an electric hand whisk, cream together the butter, caster sugar and lemon zest in a bowl until pale and fluffy. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, adding a little flour with each addition to keep the mixture smooth.

3. Sift the remaining flour and the baking powder into the bowl and fold in with the ground almonds. Drain the apple pieces well, and stir into the mixture.

4. Spoon into the prepared cake tin, lightly level the top and sprinkle with the demerara sugar. Bake in the oven for 1 hour or until wellrisen, brown and a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. If the cake starts to look a little too brown, cover with a sheet of baking paper after about 45 minutes.

5. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes.
