GROBY COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S GERMAN YOUTH AMBASSADOR

As part of my year as a UK-German youth ambassador. I was fortunate enough to take part in a conference in Berlin over the summer. The conference, with the other 49 youth ambassadors, both German and British, allowed us to share our experiences from throughout the year and evaluate our projects and achievements. The accommodation for the conference was just 20 minutes outside of Berlin and consisted of loads of amazing buildings and gardens! Over the two days we self and group assessed the year we had taken part in as ambassadors and even made videos including tips for next year's ambassadors. We not only worked hard but also had a bit of spare time, meaning we were able to explore a bit of Berlin for an afternoon which was brilliant. As well as doing the obvious tourist bits (the Brandenburg gate and the Reichstag building), the German ambassadors knew some of the guieter areas which were great to explore!

Throughout my year as an ambassador I organised a 'Great German Bake Off', helped out at a German Christmas workshop at Elizabeth Woodville Primary School and managed to set up a pen pal scheme for the year 10 (now 11) class. All the projects were really successful and I hope the pen pals will stay in contact! I've enjoyed every aspect of being an ambassador (even the few stressful bits!) and it's been great being able to promote something that I love, in terms of both the German culture and the language. I wish that I had another year to continue my ambassador role, but I definitely hope others from Groby Community College will consider applying this year as I can thoroughly recommend the experience!

A good crowd of families and interested adults turned out to explore what we might find.





BLENHEIM ORANGE A RATBY ORCHARD APPLE


A UK apple, discovered in 1740 by Kempster. at Woodstock in Oxfordshire. It was found growing against the boundary wall of Blenheim Park by a local cobbler or tailor who moved it into his garden, where apparently: 'thousands thronged from all parts to gaze on its ruddy, ripening orange burden.'

Originally named Kempster's Pippin it was renamed Blenheim Orange after approval from the Duke of Marlborough. It was widely grown in the 19th century and could still be found in markets in the 1930s.

Rarely seen for sale now, but it remains a valued amateur variety, found in old gardens.

It makes a strong limbed tree with very hard wood which was once used to make cog wheels for railways.


Can be harvested for cooking from early September, and as dessert apple October/December to January.

Thanks go to the volunteer drivers who made the occasion possible, and to everyone who joined in the fellowship morning.







Ozzie O'Shea presented the awards again at the end of the afternoon.


Although the Ratby Show was begun under the auspices of the now defunct Village Society, it will continue to be held each August in Ratby Sports Club.

BIRD FEEDERS CAN BE VIRUS BREEDERS

The Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust is asking people who feed birds in their gardens to be extra vigilant about cleaning their bird feeders after a severe case of Avian Pox was confirmed in Cropston. Avian pox is a skin condition that affects many bird species commonly found in gardens. It causes lesions, particularly on the face of birds, which look like warty tumours. In severe cases these lesions grow very large and can affect the bird's vision which ultimately results in a greater risk of predation or a slow death from starvation.

Neil Pilcher, Senior Conservation Officer said "This poor Dunnock was spotted in someone's garden hopping around under a feeder. From the photo we received it was clear that this was a severe case of Avian Pox.




The home owner in this case is very careful about hygiene issues with feeding birds and cleaned their feeders every week. This is excellent as it reduces the chance of the disease being spread to other birds using the feeders.

This case highlights the need for everyone to be vigilant as this was the first occasion that this bird had been seen in this particular garden. Therefore it is highly likely that it had been visiting other gardens and feeders in the area which are all at risk of spreading the disease if they are not regularly cleaned.

The Trust is calling on everyone who loves feeding birds in their gardens to get into the routine of cleaning their feeders regularly, ideally once a week. Infected birds are not always obvious and it is better to be safe than sorry. By feeding birds homeowners are encouraging birds to congregate in the same place time after time therefore increasing the risk of diseases being passed on. Simple good hygiene routines can allow people to carry on enjoying their garden birds without the risk posed by this and other nasty diseases."

The Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust recommend that the public should contact the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) for further advice or to report possible cases. The BTO are running a Garden Bird Health Initiative and they want people to report suspected cases to them so that they can track the disease across the country. They can be contacted at
